he messaged Eisenhower to send representatives to the Pentagon and State Departments "at the earliest possible moment."

Eisenhower himself will go to the White House for a conference Nov. 17, Truman said.

WASHINGTON — President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower is expected to name a Southerner—and possibly a Democrat—to his Cabinet in recognition of the unprecedented vote he rolled up in Dixie.

While the general hardly has had time since his landslide victory in last Tuesday's election to make progress toward picking any Cabinet member, friends here said they believe he will make it clear by such an appointment that he intends to deal the South in on his administration.

Eisenhower's three top supporters in the South were Governor James F. Byrnes of South Carolina, Robert Kennon of Louisiana and Allan Shivers of Texas. None of them may want a Cabinet post, but all might be consulted about the selection of a Dixie colleague.

Funeral services for James Garfield Barnes, 74, life-long resident of Douglas County who passed away Friday following a prolonged period of illness, will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary, Sunday, at 2 p.m., with the Rev. He retired about nine years ago and moved to Dillard where he had made his home until his death. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Grace Barnes, Dillard; four children, Lee Barnes, Dillard; Rex Barnes, Roseburg; Mrs. Stanford (Helen) Buell, Dillard, and Mrs. (Cliff) Blanche) Aten, Roseburg. He is also survived by a brother, Edward Barnes, Oakland, Calif., nine grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Oil Discovery At Camp Cooke Forces Closure

CAMP COOKE, Calif. — The discovery of oil on this 84,000-acre Army camp has caused it to be placed on an inactive status for possible use.

The camp, one of the largest in the nation, is owned almost entirely by the federal government. Sub-surface mineral rights were retained by the owners when the property was acquired during the national emergency before the start of World War II.

Exploration and exploitation of the mineral rights were suspended during the war and until it was legally ended early this year. The Union Oil Company then moved in and has conducted successful drilling operations.

The 44th Infantry, Illinois National Guard division, which is now training recruits here, will move next month to Ft. Lewis, Wash., near Tacoma.

The disciplinary barracks will be retained, and patients and staff of the hospital will be transferred to Letterman General Hospital in San Francisco and Fitzsimmons Army Hospital in Denver, Colo.

MAXPORT, Fla. — Rescue was never in doubt to the 11 Navy men dumped from a blimp into the Atlantic Ocean 35 miles off South Georgia Friday afternoon.

A freak accident caused the trouble while the blimp K11 was taking part in anti-submarine maneuvers. A window on the side of the cabin suddenly popped out, hit the right propeller and ripped through the bag and out the top. Except for that they felt they would have made it back to their Glynn Naval Air Station near Brunswick, Ga.

The 11 men were joking and happy when they stepped ashore just before midnight at the new aircraft carrier basin near the mouth of the St. Johns River here.

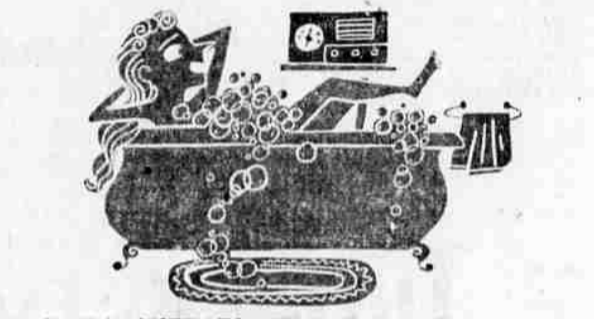

YOUR BODY

Nutrition means nothing more or less than the nourishment of our bodies. Through good nutrition we provide for the proper growth, maintenance, and repair of our body tissues. Nutrition in this sense, makes us what we are. It is our "internal environment."

Health does not have to be graded as just normal or average, but may also be above average, or buoyant and vigorous. It is now definitely known that merely adequate dietary amounts will afford protection against any important deficiency disease and will give average grades of nutritional well-being, growth, body structure, and functioning. But it is also clear that more than the minimum amounts give substantial benefits in improved well-being and superior general health. An abundance of the right food will also give something of equal importance—a reserve to draw upon. If you eat wisely, you will find it easy to maintain this reserve and to enjoy vigorous good health, from a nutritional standpoint.

The things we need for nourishment include water and a vast variety of chemical substances, which are grouped into classes. These classes are the proteins, carbohydrates, fats, minerals, and vitamins. We need the proteins, minerals, and water for the construction and maintenance of our tissues. Proteins provide energy also, although this is not its most essential task. Water, minerals, and the vitamins serve to promote and regulate the many chemical reactions of the nutritional processes of all our tissues.

The name protein comes from the Greek word signifying "that which is of first or prime importance." The principal value of proteins is that they provide the nitrogen, in the form of amino acids, which is essential to the upkeep of every part of our body structures. They are of primary importance as the material of which protoplasm (living substance) is made. There is no storehouse for protein in the body, so protein must be given daily.

Proteins in foods vary as to quality and value to the body. The differences in value among proteins depend upon the amino acids of which they are composed. Although there are only about twenty to thirty amino acids, a great number of proteins are formed from them.

In general, the amount of protein desirable should measure 10 to 15 per cent of the total number of calories consumed daily.

Fats are chemical substance found in plant and animal matter. They are the most concentrated forms of energy, providing more than twice as many calories as carbohydrates. Fats are needed in the structure and functioning of all tissues, in particular of the nerves and brain. Under the skin, fat serves as an insulator for retarding loss of body heat. Body fat deposits constitute the most important source of energy for use in periods of food privation.

Carbohydrates are, in general the various types of sugar and starches. Essential vitamins and minerals found in foods containing carbohydrates are to a great extent removed when foods are refined and processed. Some of the most striking examples are refined flour, pure sugar and polished rice.

Carbohydrates should be taken only sparingly by individuals attempting weight reduction. (P.D. Adv.)
