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Iowa U.S. District Attorney Quits

SIoux CITY, Ia. (AP) — Tobias E. Diamond, 76, U.S. district attorney for northern Iowa since 1940, has resigned under fire. Attorney General James P. McGranery announced the resignation in Washington Friday, saying it becomes effective immediately and will be accepted. He declined comment on whether the resignation was requested.

"There has been under way a department investigation of allegations of activities in a private civil case incompatible with Mr. Diamond's official duties as U.S. attorney," McGranery said. The case concerns a Miami, Fla., produce firm which charged two weeks ago that Diamond was using his official position in an attempt to collect a \$12,000 claim for a civil claim.

Diamond is the third U.S. dis-

trict attorney to resign or be fired as a result of the department's investigations of outside law practice. The others were Lester Luther, former district attorney at Topeka, Kans., and Howard Doyle, former district attorney for the southern district of Illinois.

America Voice Breaks Through Soviet Curtain

NEW YORK (AP) — The Voice of America overcame Soviet radio jamming Saturday to broadcast to the Russian people an open letter by former ambassador George F. Kennan defending American troops against Communist slander.

The broadcast of Kennan's letter began at intervals Friday and continued Saturday in all the Iron Curtain tongues.

A Voice of America spokesman said the Russians were jamming the broadcasts as they do all free world programs. But he added that a "saturation technique" was being used to overcome the Soviet jamming.

Kennan's letter is an answer to an anonymous letter received at the American Embassy in Moscow last August. The Russian letter accused Western troops of an "extremely low level of discipline," and cast aspersions on their morals and bravery.

The Russian letter, signed "Soviet People," asked for a reply "in the pages of the Soviet Press."

Both the Russian letter, which probably passed through Soviet censorship, and Kennan's reply were submitted to the Russian newspaper, "Pravda," the Voice of America said.

However, the Voice said "Pravda" did not publish them; and it was decided the broadcast would be the best way to reach the Russian people.

Among other things, the Russian letter said Americans and other non-Soviet troops of the West are "capable of playing the dandy, getting drunk, of engaging in debauchery" but are "incapable of fighting—a fact which was proved in the last war with German Fascism and is being proved in the war now going on in Korea and Indo-China."

Kennan's reply says the Korean action resulted from North Korean aggression and that the Western military goal there "already has been achieved."

The former ambassador continued that a series of operations carried out by American forces in World War II "against heavy odds and with severe losses are wholly unknown to you."

Korea Area Naval Operations Safe, Radford Asserts

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — A reporter asked Adm. Arthur W. Radford Friday if the Russian navy is capable of interfering with United Nations naval operations around Korea and got a brief "no" in reply.

Radford, who is U. S. commander in chief of the Pacific Fleet, was questioned at a news conference.

He did not comment further in his reply. The U. S. State Department said Thursday it will reject a Soviet protest against the U. N. "sea defense zone" around Korea.

Radford, who is making a three-day visit to India, as part of an East Asian tour, said that in Korea both sides were so well dug in that a general offensive could not be resumed by either side "without very heavy casualties."

The admiral commented that Japan, lacking a navy now, must sometime in the future "face the facts of life to protect itself against attack."
