No Fear Of Military Rule In U.S., Gen. Bradley Says

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all. It is the line across Korea a little over 100 miles long. It is on this short line that we have finally faced Communist aggression with military power in open conflict. Our ability to contain the advance of Communist frontiers probably will succeed or fail in large measure on this small peninsula.

"We had to draw the line against Communist aggression—and we did in June 1950. It was halted through the free world as a most courageous decision and one that was properly timed. If we had had the necessary military power at that time, and in the right place, Korea may never have occurred—and certainly would have been short-lived as a crisis. Our weakness only invited attack.

"I believe that that decision—as much as it has cost us—saved Southeast Asia from being overrun in 1950 and 1951. I also believe that our brave and courageous resistance gave a new breath of life and a new meaning to the authority of the United Nations.

"And further, I believe that our action in Korea may have prevented the Soviet Union's step by step aggression leading to World War III."

Plight Of Man Due To Himself, Speaker Says

Habitual and universal betrayal of moral standards cause most of the world's troubles. This thought sums up Man's "casual unfaithfulness" to Christian principles, according to Reverend Richard W. Hodge.

The Franciscan missionary is conducting a week-long "refresher course" in religion at St. Joseph's Catholic church. He told a capacity mission crowd last night that "Man is once more 'engulfed in a hopeless vortex of his own making.'"

Fr. Hodge, who served two years as full commander aboard the USS Salt Lake City during the last war, said religion is not a manner of praying, but a manner of living.

"Every desperate or heroic effort of man is, consciously or unconsciously, an exploration for the lasting solution to the problem of life." Whether it manifests itself in personal defilement, racial superiority, national dominance, aggressive war, violent social upheavals, charters or federations. All these things attest the "instinctive conviction" that "God's Eden exists" and that life itself is a "paltry investment" to expend in its quest.

Fr. Hodge said Socrates wrestled with this problem and supplied his own answer. "Should I study the course of the sun and moon and the stars, the causes of eclipses and earthquakes? No. There is one thing I want to know first: I want to know how I, as a man, ought to live and act."

According to Fr. Hodge, religion must be a part of everyday life: in the home, work-life, play-life. Starting at 7:45 each evening and ending Saturday, the mission is open to all Catholics in this area and their friends.

23 Forest Fires Blamed On Power Saw Negligence

CORVALLIS (AP)—Power saws featured as the cause of the operators need to use care, an Oregon State College study of 1951 forest fires points out.

by Dan D. Robinson, forest management professor, lists 23 fires caused by power saws in 1951. They burned 28,000 acres.

Dr. Robinson said, should have mufflers attached, spark plugs and wire connections should be covered, and fuel leak sources should be eliminated.

Much of the trouble, his report said, stems from fuel spilled on the hot motor, from failure to keep debris away from the hot exhaust, and general failure to keep the saw in top condition.

Rogue River Area Plans For Development Near

BOISE, (AP)—Plans are about complete for a portion of an irrigation and power development in Oregon's Rogue River Valley to irrigate some 18,000 acres and generate 28,000 kilowatts of power.

Harold T. Nelson, regional director of the Bureau of Reclamation said Tuesday.

"We have complete local agreement and the feasibility report is about ready to be reviewed by Oregon state officials and the Reclamation Bureau in Washington," he said.

After that, he said, it will be submitted to interested agencies and then to Congress for action. No estimate of the cost has been made as yet, he said.

Reinstatement Deadline On GI Insurance Cited

More than \$10 billion in lapsed G.I. term life insurance will be lost forever under present laws unless the 1,200,000 veterans who have permitted their policies to lapse reinstate them before the terms expire during the next 14 months.

Veterans Administration, in releasing the statement, said the policies involved are lapsed term National Service Life Insurance (NSLI) that were issued to two groups of World War II and post-World War II veterans.

The two groups are:

1. The 1,100,000 World War II veterans who took out term NSLI policies while they were in service during the last two months of 1944 and all of 1945; and
2. The 100,000 World War II and post-World War II veterans who took out term NSLI policies while they were in service during the last two months of 1947 and all of 1948.

The first group of 1,100,000 veterans have 8-year term policies and the second group of 100,000 veterans have 5-year term policies. Both terms expire sometime during the last two months of this year or during next year, depending on the anniversary date of each policy.

If veterans in either group do not wish to lose this coverage altogether, they must reinstate their policies before the terms expire. Otherwise, they will not be eligible for further G.I. life insurance coverage under Public Law 23, 82nd Congress.

Reinstatement Procedure

Reinstatement of lapsed term policies may be accomplished by applying to VA. A physical examination is required after 3 months of lapse and the payment of two monthly premiums also is required. One of these two premiums covers the premium for the month of grace coverage and the other is for the premium month in which the application is submitted to VA.

The term of a policy begins with the date it is issued and expires on the 5th or 8th anniversary of that date, depending upon whether it is a 5-year or an 8-year term policy.

The difference in the length of the term was determined by the Congress in 1945 when it stipulated in an amendment to the NSLI Act of 1940 that term policies issued on or before December 31, 1945, shall be for 8 years, while those issued after that date shall be for 5 years.

A new law, passed by the last session of Congress, permits policyholders to renew term Government life insurance every 5 years

WICHITA, Kas. (AP)—A Boeing Airplane Co. inspector from Seattle was stabbed to death by an unidentified motorist during a traffic argument late Tuesday night.

David E. McGaughey, 24, was fatally wounded after he blocked his assailant's car with his own and then went over to remonstrate with the other man on "how to drive," Police Criminal Investigator Les Wheeler reported.

He returned to his own car and told passengers he had been stabbed and died within a few minutes, Wheeler said.

Associates at Seattle said he went there from The Dalles, Ore., his birthplace, three years ago. His widow and two daughters, Linda Kay, 4, and Jeanne Marie, 2 survive.

UPSET KILLS DRIVER

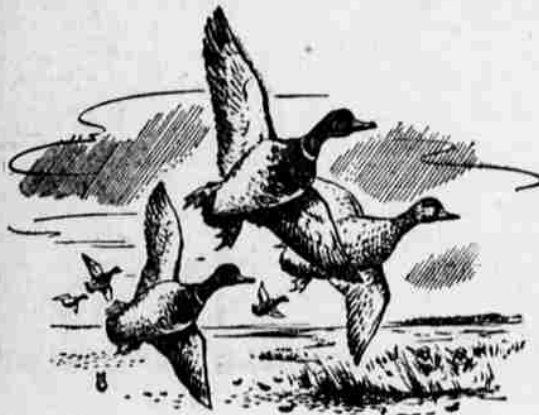
