Measure into the top part of a double boiler—
1 large egg white, unbeaten
1 cup brown sugar (firmly packed, free from lumps)
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup cold water

Stir to blend ingredients. Then place over continuously boiling water and beat steadily with rotary beater for 7 minutes, or until mixture holds its shape. Remove from heat and blend in—
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup seedless raisins or candied fruit, chopped
1/2 cup nuts, chopped

MULTNOMAH PUMPKIN PIE

1/4 teaspoon each nutmeg and ginger
1 cup hot water

Beat, or stir vigorously, to thoroughly blend ingredients. Pour into a—
9-inch unbaked deep pie shell

Bake on lower rack for 50-55 minutes* in preheated moderately hot oven, 375°. Cool, and serve topped with sweetened whipped cream or ice cream, 6 servings.

*Note: Pie is baked sufficiently when there is still a soft spot about an inch in diameter in the center. The heat contained in the pie will finish cooking the center so that it will be firm when served.

Stir-N-Roll Pastry

Stir together in a mixing bowl—
1 1/2 cups sifted Sperry Drifted Snow Flour
1 teaspoon salt

Measure in same cup and add all at once—
3/4 cup Wesson Oil (1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons)
3 tablespoons cold milk

Stir with fork until pastry clings together. Press into a ball, flatten slightly and place between 2 sheets of waxed paper (12-inch squares). Roll out gently until pastry circle reaches edges of paper. Peel off top paper, then pick up pastry and bottom paper by one edge (they will cling together). Place paper-side up, over a pie pan (9-inch diameter, at least 1 1/4 inches deep). Then loosen pastry at edges and carefully peel off paper. Ease pastry snugly into place. Build up a fluted edge as this pie is very full. Fill and bake as directed.

ROSEBURG ROCKS

All measurements are level. Sift flour before measuring. Measure into a large mixing bowl—
3/4 cup soft shortening (part butter for flavor)
1 cup brown sugar (firmly packed, free from lumps)
2 large eggs, unbeaten

Beat until ingredients are fluffy and well blended. Then sift directly into crowded mixture in bowl—
2 cups sifted Sperry Drifted Snow Flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon cloves


and add—
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup raisins

Mix until well blended and a moderately stiff dough is formed. Drop from teaspoon onto ungreased cookie sheets. Bake in a preheated moderate oven, 350°, for 12 to 15 minutes, or just until lightly browned. Cool thoroughly before storing. Makes about 3 dozen cookies.
