**Prematurely-Born Baby Survives Short Time**

A baby born prematurely at four months at Douglas Community Hospital lived under oxygen nearly 12 hours.

This is considered in medical circles as an extremely rare situation, and only through the immediate use of oxygen was the baby kept alive, it was reported.

The tiny infant, perfectly formed for its age, was 8 1/4 inches in length and weighed seven ounces. Born at 1:50 p.m. on Nov. 5, the baby lived until 11:10 that night. A birth certificate was made out and footprints were taken.

The premature birth was attributed to the physical condition of the mother, who was ill. Names of the parents were withheld.

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**Eden Counters Vishinsky's Inhuman Demands To End Korean Prisoner Deadlock**

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden laid down Tuesday four principles for settling the dead-locked prisoner of war issue and asked Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky if he would accept them.

In a broad policy speech before the U. N. assembly, Eden turned down Vishinsky's proposal for a new commission to end the Korean war as of "no help over our present difficulty."

Vishinsky told the political committee Monday he would "not budge" on the Communist demand that all prisoners be repatriated.

"Mr. Vishinsky said he believed in the unconditional repatriation of prisoners of war without screening and, to quote his words, without excess," said Eden.

"He did not, however, say whether in his view those who genuinely fear for their lives should be forced back at the point of the bayonet."

"I am encouraged by his lack of precision on that point. I hope therefore he will examine my four principles and consider carefully whether or not they are acceptable."

Eden gave his four principle for settling the prisoner issue:

"First: That every prisoner of war has the right, on the conclusion of an armistice, to be released."

"Second: That every prisoner of war has the right to be speedily repatriated."

"Third: That there is a duty on the detaining side to provide facilities for such repatriation."

"Fourth: That the detaining side has no right to use force in connection with the disposal of prisoners of war. In other words, after an armistice, a prisoner of war may not be either forcibly detained or forcibly repatriated."

Addressing himself to Vishinsky in the assembly hall, Eden said:

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**Dead Or Alive Soldier Awarded Service Cross**

SOMEWHERE IN KOREA — Dead or alive, M. Sgt. Omer Willette Saturday was awarded the distinguished service cross for his last flaming night patrol.

The Army lists the husky, dark-haired veteran of two wars as killed in action. But Sunday night, his sister in San Francisco, Barbara Jackson, received a phone call from someone who sounded like the sergeant.

The man identified himself as Willette and said he was calling from Tokyo. "I'm all right," the voice said. "I'm wounded but I'll be home soon."

The Army found no trace of any such telephone call and a search of U. S. hospitals in Japan yielded no record of the sergeant.

However, the mystery was heightened by the fact that the sergeant's body never was recovered. During the heat of a terrific patrol skirmish the night of Oct. 15, Willette was dropped by Communist burp bullets. Two fellow soldiers slithered over to him, examined him and assumed him dead. But a later patrol which went out to recover his body failed to find it.

So there was a great stir among his buddies in Company A of the 14th Regiment, men who deeply respected and liked the adventurous, nerveless sergeant who had fought his way around the world and who volunteered often for patrol duty.

M. Sgt. William Locklear, Boise, Idaho, said: "Omer was a real fighting man, a favorite in the company. This was his second tour in Korea. He told me once that he was erroneously reported killed in action in the second World War. He was one of those characters you can visualize as getting back — if anybody could get back."

But Lt. William H. Tyler, who led a patrol out to recover the bodies of Willette and another man, said: "I found the body of the one man but Willette's body was not there. I think Willette is dead and that Joe Chink dragged him away. I think it was a false voice that talked to the sergeant's sister on the phone and just about the cruellest joke I ever heard of."

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**Crazed Mother Hurls Baby Into Fiery Furnace**

The baby suffered third degree burns on the back of her head, her back, arms and legs as the blazing coals ate through and ignited the blanket in which she was wrapped. She was listed in fair condition at a hospital.

**Social Security Pay To Polygamists Stirs**

PARIS — The Catholic bishops of French Equatorial Africa Tuesday protested payment of government social security allowances to African officials who are polygamists.

The bishops said in a letter published in the French press that some families are drawing money for 10, 20 or even 30 children.

This, the bishops said, encouraged officials to take more than one wife and put a strain on both public finances and public morality.

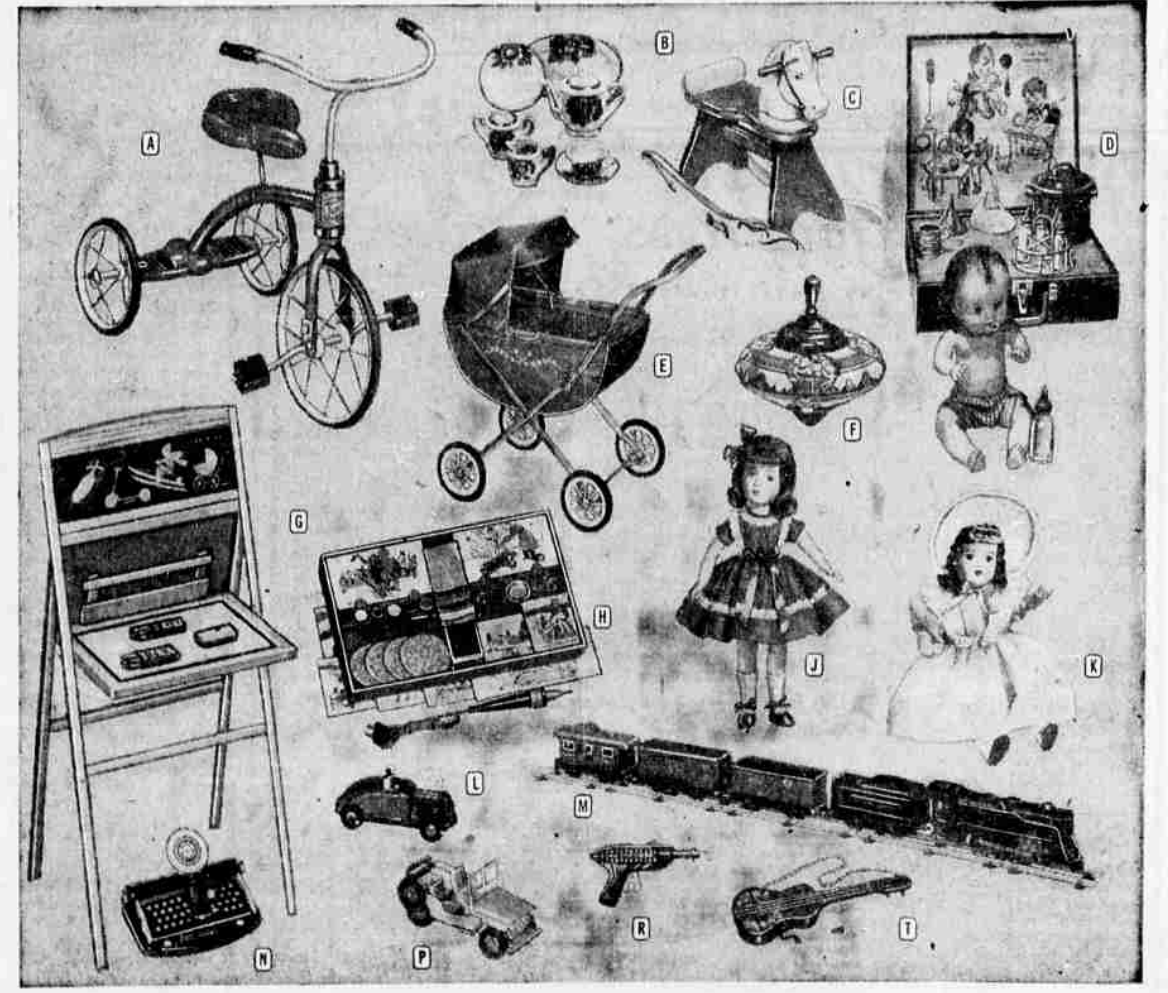
