away from the law all of my life—all I want is a square deal. "I know no one will believe this story and that's why I beg for a lie detector or truth serum test so the truth will come out. "I ate a good meal tonight. May be it is the last one I'll be getting for a while anyway—frankly I need a break and I am plenty scared."

Roseburg Police Chief Stan O. Olson said Coffield phoned Roseburg police about 11 p.m. Thursday night saying he would turn himself in "if I can get cooperation and a fair break."

Local officers advised him to do that.

Less than an hour later Salem police advised that they had the man in custody.

Coffield was brought to Roseburg and lodged in the Douglas County jail here early this morning.

Baby Sitter's Slayer Convicted In 1st Degree

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP)—Billy Rupp Jr., 18, Yorba Linda bee-keeper, has been convicted of first degree murder in the Aug. 8 slaying of 15-year-old baby sitter Ruby Ann Payne.

A jury of eight women and four men returned its verdict last night after 28½ hours of deliberation. It made no recommendation, which means that if Rupp is found sane in his sanity trial next week he must die in the San Quentin Prison gas chamber.

Rupp was accused of killing the Payne girl after she resisted his advances. She was caring for the three children of Rupp's employer.

Rupp's attorney based the defense almost solely on the contention that the youth had suffered a brain injury early in life and was unable to premeditate a crime.

State Milk Boards Get Full Control Of Prices

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government Thursday issued an order giving milk boards and commissions in 12 states full control over prices of products covered by their regulations.

The Office of Price Stabilization said the action is being taken to comply with a provision written by Congress into the Defense Production Act. This says that OPS ceilings on fluid milk products must comply with price set by state agencies or state law.

OPS said that in the future the ceilings will move up or down in keeping with the state actions.

The 12 states which have agencies regulating milk prices include California, Montana, and Oregon.

OPS said the order will be effective Nov. 18 but will be optional until Dec. 15.

Portland Singer's Son Perishes In Fire Trap

PORTLAND (AP)—The 3-year-old son of a Portland singer died in flames that charred the lower floor of the singer's home here Thursday night.

The boy was James Rogers Turner, son of Cowboy Dallas Turner, a western-style singer on local radio programs.

Sudden flames trapped the boy in a bedroom downstairs. Three other Turner children and the father were able to reach safety.

Mrs. Turner was visiting friends at the time.

Trade sources said prices were running 2 to 7 cents a pound under last year's prices. Wholesale prices were quoted at 55-56 cents a pound for toms and 57-58 cents a pound for hens, compared with 57-58 for toms and 61-65 for hens last year.

The retail price was about 63 cents for toms and 69 cents for hens last year.
