

School Children Report Good Election Turnout

Three more Douglas County schools have reported good results in the schoolchildren's get-out-the-vote campaign, Kenneth Barneburg, school superintendent, reports.

Prior to the election schoolchildren reported the number of registered voters in their areas. Then, after Nov. 4, results on how many voted were obtained.

A Toketoe 60 were reported eligible and 60 voted. At Reedsport 85 percent were registered and the same percentage voted. At Camas Valley 178 voted as compared to 163 reported registered.

GRANTS PASS — Clifford S. Sparks, 54, organizer and president of the Illinois Valley Bank at Cave Junction, died in a hospital here Thursday.

He had been ill for several months and had undergone an operation for ulcers in April.

Sparks, who opened the Illinois Valley Bank July 12, 1950, previously had worked for the First National Bank, Portland, and was a former cashier of the Bank of Sweet Home.

His wife, Martha, who survives, was cashier of the bank at Cave Junction.

Oregon's 1953 Legislature, With Easy Program, Likely To End Work Under 90 Days

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The 1951 session, longest in the state's history, went on for 116 days.

It had more problems and did more work than any other Legislature. But when the lawmakers meet here Jan. 12, they won't have many difficult chores.

The 1951 Legislature bogged down under a heavy load of truck tax, school reorganization, reapportionment, veterans bonus, colored oleo, milk control, government reorganization and unemployment compensation legislation.

The new state budget might be a few million dollars in the red, but that could be remedied by a small state property tax.

No new kinds of taxes are expected because the voters, who always have the last say on tax bills, aren't in a mood to approve them. They showed that by the way they snuffed under the 1951 Legislature's cigarette tax bill last week.

The Legislature will work on plans to simplify the state's complex tax system, and to create a new department of motor vehicles. These measures won't take too much work because interim committees already have done most of the spadework.

A law to set up sale of liquor by the drink will have to be passed, but that shouldn't be a hard job because the Legislature will be able to profit by the experience of many other states. This law will carry out the mandate of the voters in the election.

Code Revision Tough Job

Another job, and it could be a hard one, will be to pass on the work of the state Statute Revision Council. It has worked four years rewriting all of the state's laws, and now the Legislature will have to pass on the work.

This will reduce the 10 volumes of state laws to three volumes.

Here, the lack of lawyers in the Legislature will be a handicap.

In 1951, because of the shortage of lawyers, the Senate had to reduce its two law committees to one. That created a severe bottleneck for bills.

Now the House either will have to reduce its two law committees to one, or else cut down on the size of each seven-man law committee.

Experienced Men Included

The House will have 10 lawyers, compared with 14 last time. It now takes seven lawyers to man each law committee.

The Senate will have eight lawyers, compared with seven last

time.

The new Legislature will be fairly experienced. Of the 60 House members, 36 have had previous legislative service. In the 30-member Senate, 22 have served in previous Legislatures.

It looks as though the Legislature could get through in considerably less than 90 days if it buckled down to work.

The 1943 session lasted only 59 days. Then in 1945 it went 69 days for a new record.

The 1947 session lasted 84 days, and the 1949 session 97 days. Then came the 1951 session of 116 days.

PORTLAND — Two Jefferson High School football players were kicked off the squad Wednesday and Coach Eric Waldorf revealed he had booted another player earlier in the week.

Jeff is the Portland city champion and plays its first state play-off game against Bend this weekend.

Waldorf said he had competent replacements for the three.

He said he dismissed Mac Wiebe, first string center, and Jack Klein, second string fullback, because they were arrested and charged with possession of beer. Klein, 18, paid a \$10 fine on his plea of guilty Wednesday. Wiebe, 17, was turned over to juvenile authorities.

Earlier, Waldorf said, he dropped George Remington, first string defensive back, for "disciplinary reasons." He did not elaborate.
