Few fields concerning nutrition have developed more rapidly or given rise to a greater volume of literature than that of the vitamins. The first vitamin was discovered in 1912 by Dr. Casimir Funk, a Polish biochemist while he was doing research on the cause of beriberi, a vitamin B deficiency disease.

Vitamins are organic substances that are present in most natural foods in small amounts and are necessary for the normal functioning of the body—for its normal growth and health.

With the discovery, isolation and research of several vitamins, there has evolved the establishment of vitamin deficiency diseases. We are here concerned with the prevention of these diseases by emphasizing the need of body protection against a deficiency of these vitamins.

Vitamins are nutritionally essential. Small amounts of them exert powerful physiologic effects. The individual vitamins are fairly widely distributed in various natural foods. Their toxic potentialities are very limited even in extremely large dosage. The normal requirements for the individual vitamins are from small to very minute amounts, yet, without this amount, small as it may seem, we would die of insufficiency starvation.

Vitamin A is valuable to us because it promotes normal growth, especially in children, and is helpful in preventing infections, particularly of the respiratory tract. It aids keenness of vision, pre-

U. S. Declared Illiterate Nation

BALTIMORE (AP)—A Brandeis University professor says the United States is "the most illiterate nation there ever was" and blames it on "progressive" education.

Dr. Ludwig Lewisohn made the remark Thursday night in a speech before the associates of Brandeis University.

He said American schools had abandoned "the great discipline" of learning the great tradition of the world and its people, and added:

"We must have the historic view of mankind, without which people are at the beck of any demagogue."

Dr. Lewisohn said that Brandeis U. of Waltham, Mass., was following in the steps of such institutions as St. John's college of Annapolis, Md.

St. John's is noted for its course on the "100 great books," which focuses study on philosophy, science and languages of western civilization.

U.S., Britains Perfect Carrier Landing Deck

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States and British Navies have invented a new kind of carrier flight deck—a "side porch" runway angled off to the left side of the ship.

It is designed to make landing safer and easier for jet aircraft. And with the far end of the runway jutting over the port side of the carrier, the likelihood of a plane crashing into others parked on the flight deck, or into the carrier island, is greatly reduced.

The two Navies jointly announced that the new deck arrangement is being installed for test purposes on the Essex class carrier Antietam, at the New York naval shipyard.

The British, who thought up the idea, call it the angled deck. The Americans, arguing that "angled" might imply slanted or tilted—whereas the deck is perfectly level—tentatively call it the canted deck.

"We are open to suggestions," said Rear Adm. T. S. Combs, chief of the Bureau of Aeronautics. One newsman suggested the V-deck since the angled deck juts off from the regular flight deck to form a narrow deck. Other suggestions: side-porch deck, check deck, cockeyed cornice.

Combs said the conversion of the Antietam will cost around a million dollars but should result in even greater savings in terms of ship damage, reduced weight and savings of life.

Russians Claim Car Invention; Can't Keep Going

WASHINGTON (AP)—Russians claim they invented automobiles, but apparently they're having trouble keeping them running.

Some example of automotive repair service, Russian-style, was shown at the Kishinev winery says he waited three years for his truck to be repaired. Then he found that it had been "cannibalized"—stripped of parts to repair other trucks.

2. A ZISS truck, of the Kishinev Truzhenik collective, was delivered to a repair plant July 7 last year and more than 12 months later was still waiting its turn although in the meantime 6,938 rubles—nominally about \$1,744—had been paid in advance for repairs.

The situation is so bad, says the State Department, even Russians are becoming impatient.

The customers of the government-owned automobile repair plant at Kishinev, capital of the Moldavian Soviet Republic, finally complained. The situation was set forth in detail in a copy of the newspaper Soviet Moldavia received by the State Department.

A year ago the Literary Gazette of Moscow was complaining about difficulties owners of private cars in Soviet Russia were finding in having the simplest repairs made.

The Kishinev newspaper thus quoted the director of the winery: "They were telling us all the time that as soon as they receive new parts they would repair the truck. Finally, we found that all that was left of our truck was the frame and part of the body. We had to file a complaint with the republic organizations. And only then did the director of the plant, Comrade Artemyev, begin to search for another truck to give us in exchange. It is possible that in three years the plant did not receive the parts they need to repair our truck."

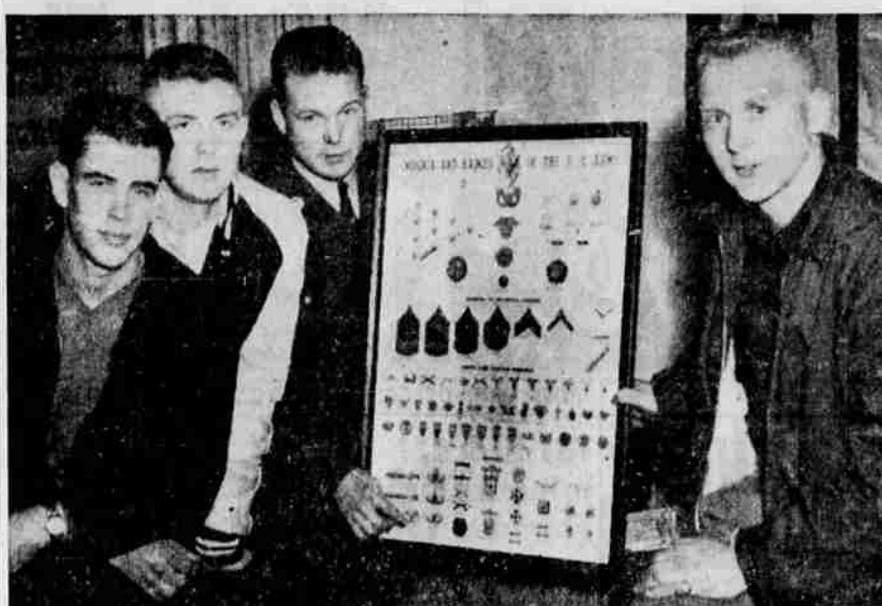
Access Roads Building Urged By Manufacturers

WASHINGTON (AP)—The National Manufacturers Association urged Friday that the federal government be allowed no part in the regulation of timber cutting on private land.

In a resolution, the association insisted instead that any public regulation of private timber cutting be left to the states.

Another resolution adopted by the association's directors at their annual meeting urged that the federal government spend 30 million dollars a year during the next five years to build new timber access roads in federal forests. This is now being spent and the resolution said it was needed to harvest virgin stands of federal timber "which has been deteriorating."

Next Congress Will Be Pressured To Urge UN Probe Of Atrocities

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Madden (D-Ind.) said today pressure will be put on the next Congress to ask the United Nations to act against "continuing atrocities" being committed behind the Iron Curtain.

The first step, Madden told a reporter, will be to propose that Congress turn over to the U. N. the evidence and conclusions of a special House committee which yesterday concluded a year's investigation into the wartime slaughter of 15,000 Polish officers.

After that, he said, "we should follow up the atrocities against U. N. troops in Korea and those that are still continuing behind the Iron Curtain."

"The Soviets are systematically practicing genocide extermination of races to break the backbone of these countries," he said.

The committee, which Madden heads, has recommended that the United Nations be asked to bring Russia to trial before the Polish Court for the deaths of the Polish officers.

Madden said "these atrocities can be reduced by mobilizing world opinion. The work of our committee, I believe, has helped cut down the atrocities in Korea."

Following the meeting, a hilarious white elephant sale was held with Betty Dorman as auctioneer. Refreshments were served by Irene Doty and Virginia Finch.

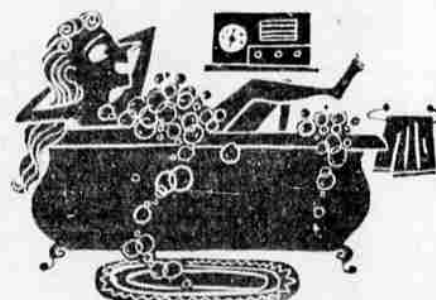
