Miners' Wage Boost In Last Ditch Effort

Putnam went along with the WSB and didn't allow the full pay increase.

On the other hand, granting the full increase would almost certainly push the price of coal up again. The Office of Price Stabilization boosted ceiling prices Friday as high as 75 cents per ton on bituminous soft coal and \$1.35 per ton on Pennsylvania anthracite hard coal.

And OPS officials said if the miners win the full \$1.90 increase they want, an additional ceiling price of around 15 cents per ton for hard coal and 39 to 42 cents for soft coal may be expected.

The soft coal miners have been working since Oct. 27 at the \$1.50 figure—bringing their basic pay to \$17.85 per day—with assurance from the industry that when and if the government approves the remaining 40 cents per day, the miners will get that retroactively.

This is the same arrangement under which about 65,000 anthracite miners are working. Beginning today, they are to get a temporary \$1.50 per day increase, on the average, and 40 cents per day more if the remainder is approved by the WSB.

4 Major Schools On List Of 21 Untied, Unbeaten

NEW YORK — Four major colleges — Georgia Tech, Michigan State, Southern California and U.C.L.A. — head the list of 21 unbeaten and untied teams Monday. The weekend's action dropped two more from the dwindling list when Maryland took a beating from Mississippi and Iowa Wesleyan was downed by Buena Vista.

Ten of the teams have completed their seasons including Peru (Neb.) Teachers, which heads the nation with 10 victories.

Georgia Tech has nine, while Michigan State, Southern California and U.C.L.A. each have eight. Southern Cal and U.C.L.A. meet on Saturday.

to work with present officials to "learn the ropes."

3. The administration is expected to tell Eisenhower and his advisers that a statement by him on the Korean situation, endorsing the present policy of insisting on voluntary repatriation of prisoners of war in any armistice agreement, would greatly strengthen current dealings at the U.N. General Assembly.

4. Eisenhower will be given a chance to express his views on foreign policy and asked for comments on administration intentions as they are explained to him. Highly placed officials said Truman will take Eisenhower's views into consideration in making decisions between now and Jan. 20.

Great Ovation Planned

Washington, meanwhile, was planning a rousing welcome for Eisenhower.

Republicans scheduled a mammoth parade from Lincoln Memorial down Constitution Avenue past the Washington Monument, then back out Pennsylvania Avenue to the White House.

Millions over the nation will see the historic event by television. Full-scale coverage is planned by all four networks, which have set up a pool arrangement designed to picture every phase from the plane's landing at National Airport to the climactic arrival at the White House.

Ike Will Skip Japan, Tokyo Report States

TOKYO — President-elect Dwight Eisenhower will not stop in Japan en route to Korea, an authoritative foreign office source told Kyodo News Service Monday.

The informant said an informal note to that effect was received from Mikichi Araki, Japanese ambassador to the U. S.

There has been speculation that Eisenhower would bypass Japan and fly directly to Korea from some mid-Pacific air base. The primary reason is security. The Communists are much less apt to know of Eisenhower's movements if he does not touch down in Japan.

Surgeon Takes 184-Lb. Tumor From Woman

GALVESTON — A 44-year-old Latin-American woman who had a tumor weighing 184 pounds removed from her abdomen five days ago was reported in "good condition" Monday.

Dr. Dan Eanes, who performed the three-hour operation at the John Sealy hospital here, said the woman, whose normal weight was about 130 pounds, was able to sit up in bed and was "feeling fine."

He said the tumor, an ovarian cyst, was the largest ever removed in the hospital and probably the largest in the history of medicine.

Dr. Eanes said he understood ambulance attendants had to remove the front door of the woman's home to bring her to the hospital. He said the operation required two incisions, one between three and four feet long.

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Martha Kaufche, 80, Succumbs At Kellogg

Martha Kaufche, 80, Kellogg, passed away at her home Friday night.

She was born in Germany Jan. 9, 1872, coming to the United States 60 years ago and Kellogg 42 years ago.

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — California's Golden Bears, knocked out of the Pacific Coast Conference football race by losses to USC, UCLA and Washington, turned on Washington State Saturday and ground out a 28-13 victory over the hapless Cougars.

Outplayed most of four quarters, Washington State found its scoring punch in the last five minutes and pushed over two quick tallies to escape a whitewashing.

With the clock running out, quarterback Jerry Campbell passed 41 yards to right end Harland Svare who raced 35 yards to score.

The Cougars scored again with less than two minutes to go, Bill Holmes snaring Campbell's pass in the end zone after WSC had marched from their own 27 to the California seven.

The Bears, sparked by reserve left half Bob Brooks who scored two California touchdowns, had things their own way most of the afternoon.

They scored in the first period, added two more in the second and clinched the game with a touchdown in the fourth.

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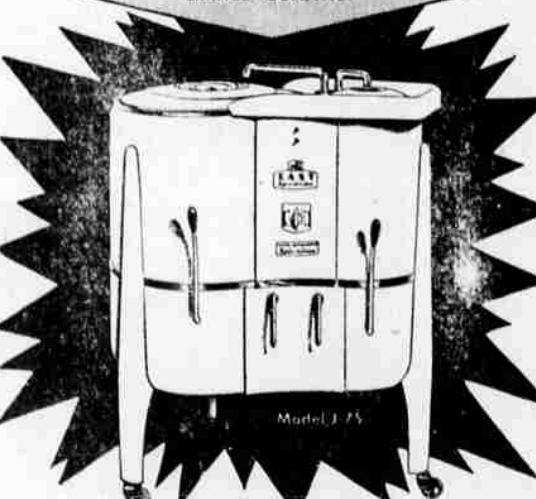
