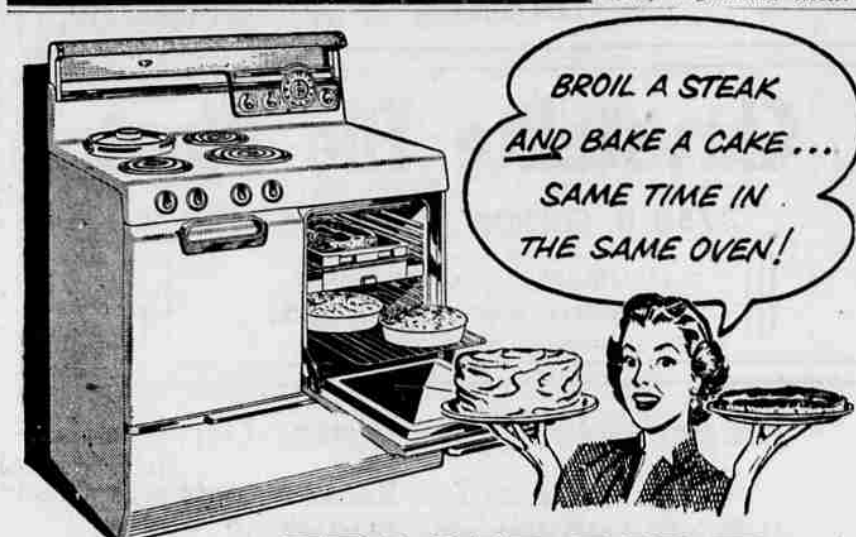

**Eisenhower Resigns
Columbia U. Presidency**
NEW YORK (AP)—President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower has resigned as president of Columbia University, effective the day before his inauguration Jan. 20. The general assumed the presidency of Columbia on June 7, 1948. He has been on leave without pay since February 1951. He originally took the leave to serve as supreme commander of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces.

Theater Owners Fail To Report Campaign Bills

SALEM (AP)—Murray Kemp, president of the Multnomah Kennel Club, said Monday in a news release that Oregon theater owners failed to obey the law in reporting campaign contributions. Kemp said the theater owners donated more than \$50,000 worth of advertising in their support of the bill to ban pari-mutuel betting on horse and dog races. The bill was defeated at the general election, and the deadline for reporting campaign expenses for or against measures was last Friday. The free advertising, Kemp said, consisted of showing films on the screens of theaters. Kemp said the law requires reporting of expenditures of money and things of value in campaigns. The free screen space, he said, was a thing of value. Kemp's office in Portland reported him out of the city Monday, but said he had not indicated that he planned a request for official action.

Elkton, Gardiner Join In Bible-Reading Move

The Elkton and Gardiner Methodist Churches will join in a world-wide drive to increase Bible readership from Thanksgiving to Inett, Elkton pastor, announces. This is part of a world-wide campaign to gain Bible readers which was observed last year in 38 countries. President Truman is honorary chairman of the sponsoring committee of nationally-known laymen and has fully endorsed the movement, the Rev. Mr. Robinett said. World-wide Bible reading was inaugurated by the American Bible Society nine years ago.

Chinese Reds Threaten Ike With Threshing

TOKYO, Tuesday, Nov. 18 (AP)—Th Communist China radio said today that if President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower has any intention of sending United Nations troops to the Yalu River and establishing a Korean buffer zone, he will fail, just as Gen. Douglas MacArthur did. A Peiping broadcast threatened Eisenhower with "an even sadder thrashing if he is not prepared to accept the lessons of MacArthur's defeat."

New Type Plane Performs Okey

WICHITA, Kas. (AP)—The first flight tests of a turbine-propeller light plane were announced here Monday. The plane is a Cessna L-19, nicknamed the "Bird Dog," and powered with Boeing Airplane Company's new light gas turbine, which has been used previously in trucks, helicopters and boats. Cessna and Boeing announced, with Defense Department approval, that the turbine powered Bird Dog has been test flown successfully since Nov. 5. The L-19 has been used in the Korean war for observation and liaison work. The Boeing turbine weighs only 250 pounds, about 125 less than a comparable conventional piston engine, and develops 210 horsepower on takeoff. In the turbine, exhaust gases are channeled to drive a propeller shaft, as distinguished from the full jet engine which derives power from direct thrust of the exhaust. Hank Waring, Cessna test pilot, said the L-19 controlled as well in flight with the turboprop as with a standard piston engine. Boeing claims simplicity and operation on all grades of fuel as advantages of the turbine engine. Turbine engines have been used previously in heavier planes, principally Navy bombers in this country and in military and commercial planes in Britain.

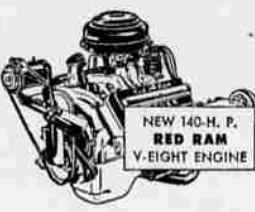
