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Outlives \$1 Million Spent On 'Last Flings,' Takes Old Age Pension, Then Passes On

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — A million dollars in the bank—and time and the inclination to spend it. That was the happy prospect that confronted Thomas Linton McCullough when he retired at 75.

So McCullough, a large cotton plantation owner, set out on one last glorious fling. Not a thing in the world to worry about. Life on a lavish scale with big-time money

flowing like wind through his fingers to back up the jaunt!

All the money he wanted or needed (so he thought) for the last gleaming whirl.

Treasury Chief Faces Charge In Tax Matter

WASHINGTON (AP) — House investigators report that, after a year of trying, they now have documents purporting to show Secretary of the Treasury Snyder took undue interest in a multimillion-dollar tax case.

The report came, after a closed-door session yesterday, from a House ways and means subcommittee investigating tax scandals. It said the group has received from the Justice Department's Criminal Division a log of telephone conversations between Snyder and Charles Oliphant, former chief counsel for the revenue bureau. Oliphant served in that post from 1947 until last fall, when he quit under fire.

Committee sources said extracts from the long-sought telephone transcript show Snyder displayed "an unusual degree of interest" in a claim by Universal Pictures, Inc., for a 20-million-dollar refund on excess profit taxes levied some 10 years ago.

The sources said Snyder telephoned Oliphant frequently in 1948 and 1949 to speed up handling of Universal's claim. The case was expedited from the New York field office directly to the Treasury, where a two-million-dollar award was made last December.

Along with the stenographic record of the conversations, Snyder sent the committee a letter of explanation, not made public. A committee aide said Snyder's letter claims he took only an official interest in completing the tax settlement.

When he got back to the United States, still time on his hands and money stacked in the bank for another "last fling." And another. And still another.

Each time McCullough expected death to tap him on the shoulder, but each time when he tickled death along its bony rib, as the phrase goes, death stepped aside and left time for yet another last fling. And another one after that.

Then one day the startling realization for McCullough that he had time but no money left.

Sixteen months ago the last trickle of the million dollar fortune had slipped away, and McCullough faced life anew—on a \$50 a month old age pension.

No money, but no regrets, either!

"My one mistake was that I outlived my money," McCullough said not so long ago, "but it's an error I'm going to go on making just as long as I can."

At long last, of course, death had its day.

When McCullough died Monday he was 97. To the very end he said he had no regrets about the way he had spent his fortune.

No Rubber Stamp Role For Senator

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.) says he hopes his fellow Republicans will not become a "rubber stamp" Congress under the administration of President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Capehart told a news conference yesterday he wants Republicans in Congress to assert their authority in dealings with the White House—something, he said, Democrats failed to do in 20 years of New Deal-Fair Deal administrations.

The Indiana senator said he intends to co-operate with Eisenhower, but added: "I'm certainly not going to co-operate blindly."

He said he believed "a good many senators will do likewise." Capehart, who supported Sen. Robert A. Taft instead of Eisenhower for the GOP presidential nomination, also said he will back Taft for election as Senate floor leader.

Business Bigness No Offense, Says Du Pont Counsel

CHICAGO (AP) — An attorney defending the multi-million dollar Du Pont interests in federal court Wednesday asserted "bigness is not yet an offense under the anti-trust laws."

The attorney, John Harlan of Washington, made an opening statement for the defense in the government's civil anti-trust suit against three huge corporations, 117 members of the Du Pont family and three Du Pont holding companies.

"The government seems to feel that the Du Pont company is just too big," Harlan said.

"Bigness is not yet an offense under the anti-trust laws."

The Du Pont family runs the vast E. I. Du Pont de Nemours and Company.

The government claims the family, through stock holdings, also controls two other defendant corporations, General Motors Corporation and the U. S. Rubber Company.

The government seeks for force the Du Ponts to sell their stock in General Motors and U. S. Rubber.

Harlan said the government had alleged "an extraordinary family conspiracy." He termed the theory "fantastic and absurd."

The government has charged that the defendants violated the Sherman Act by restraining trade and discouraging competition in the fields in which they operate.

Harlan said the issue before Judge Walter J. La Buy, who is hearing the trial without a jury, is whether the defendants have violated the anti-trust laws.

He contended the government is "vague" about that issue.

Harlan said Willis L. Hotchkiss, who made the government's opening statement Tuesday, "seemed concerned more with the philosophy of the cartel system in Europe versus the free enterprise system in the United States."

Assistant State School Superintendent Dies

SALEM (AP) — Lester A. Wilcox, 54, assistant state superintendent of public instruction since 1937, died Tuesday night in a Portland hospital after a long illness.

Wilcox was in charge of business administration and finance in the department. He came here after serving nine years as superintendent of Lebanon schools.

Wilcox leaves a widow, Gertrude; a son, Robert, student at the University of Oregon; his father, G. W. Wilcox, Salem; his mother, Mrs. Angie Wilcox, Coos Bay; and two sisters, Mrs. Max Kruger and Mrs. Charles McGary Jr., both of Coos Bay.

Maybank Shuns Adlai As Demo Party Leader

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Maybank (D-SC) refused Wednesday to recognize Adlai Stevenson, the Democrats' defeated presidential candidate, as the titular head of the party for the next four years.

He told a news conference he regarded Sen. Richard Russell of Georgia and some other Senate Democrats, including himself as "caretakers of the party," and declared he will boom Russell for President in 1956 if the Georgian is willing to seek the nomination.

Maybank has been at odds with President Truman and resigned from the Democratic National Committee after the party's national convention had nominated Stevenson.

Maybank gave this appraisal of the big vote Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower ran up in South Carolina, a traditionally Democratic stronghold:

"Eisenhower was a very popular man, and Truman was very unpopular....I never did hear much talk about Stevenson."
