

Tree Farming Brings More Deer For Hunters

A lot of whoppers have been told about the deer in the Pacific Northwest, but we can't remember that any yam-spinner ever made him a farmer, rotating crops on a million acres of forest land and pasturing thousands of deer as a sideline.

Truth often makes a piker out of fiction and Old Paul would gasp at the way the modern lumberman has gone in for farming. There are five million acres of tree farms today in Washington and Oregon, most of them on the west side of the Cascades.

And because the deer is a creature of the woods and hills, tree farming is deer farming. The hunter has as big a stake as the lumberjack in the ambitious new program of perpetual logging.

Logging Boon To Deer
The heavy logging operations of the past century have been a boon to the deer of the coastal slope. Shade in the dense woods limits growth of the browse necessary for food. When a forest is scalped of trees and sunlight reaches the earth again it coaxes back the vanished grass and brushy plants, creating an ideal pasture for the deer.

Fire—most dreaded enemy of the lumberman—occasionally has helped the deer by ravaging a stand of trees and opening the land to the sunlight. But often it destroys the soil, too, and after a year or two of rapid growth in the ashes plant life will weaken in the sterile earth. This was the case in Oregon's great Tillamook burn.

The two states may today have the greatest deer populations they will ever have. Oregon and Washington have been overlogged and the number of deer on the west side can be expected to decrease when new growth begins to shade the earth.

Lincoln Fastest Of Stock Cars

OAXACA, Mexico (AP)—Ninety stock cars and flashy sports automobiles headed into the rugged part of the Pan-American road race Thursday with Walter Faulkner of Long Beach, Calif., and France's Jean Behra leading the way.

With Thursday's two laps of the 1,934-mile race taking the racers as far as the rugged mountains surrounding Mexico City, Faulkner had the fastest time in the stock car division and Behra led the sports car drivers.

Faulkner covered the 330 miles of the first lap Wednesday from Tuxtla Gutierrez to here in an official time of four hours, nine minutes and 49 seconds. He was piloting a Lincoln.

The stock cars, unmodified after leaving factory assembly lines, trailed the specially built sports models on a time basis. Behra guided his Gordini, a new road racing car, over the treacherous roads in three hours, 41 minutes and 44 seconds, nearly half an hour faster than Faulkner's time. The daring French driver averaged 88.80 miles per hour.

Frank L. Herr, Renton, Wash., driving a Jaguar, was 18th in the sports class. His time was 5:08.57.

The 1950 stock car winner, Herschel McGriff of Portland, Ore., was 16th Wednesday with a time of 4:25.23.

Bob Christie, Grants Pass, Ore., driving a Nash, was 51st. He was aimed at 5:40.35.

SOCE One Of 7 To Play Cal Aggies Next Fall

DAVIS, Calif. (AP)—Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland, Ore., is one of the seven schools still scheduled to play football with the Cal Aggies next fall. The Aggies cut their slate from nine games.

The Aggies reported Wednesday that a shortage of money and manpower had forced a cut back in all sports. Athletic Director I. F. Toomey said that of the 1,426 students, only 350 are available for athletics, putting the school's manpower as well as its finances, at a low mark.

Former Boxer Hector McDonald Dies Wed.

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—Hector McDonald, 43, who fought as a featherweight and lightweight boxer in the United States and Canada in the 1920's died Wednesday of a heart attack.

McDonald, a one-time pal of Jimmy McLarnin who later became a world welterweight champion, turned to refereeing after he quit the ring. He died in the ring—slumping to the canvas at Vancouver College just after giving a lecture on clean living.

He fought a number of fights in Seattle in the Wildcat Carter era, although he never fought Carter. Friends said he also appeared on several Madison Square Garden Cards.

according to a plan and the coastal region never again will be a limitless forest of mammoth, crowding trees and barren earth.

The tree farmers log off big blocks of timberland, cutting a planned amount each year so the farm will always be producing a crop of trees. In 100 years the fallers will make the circuit of the farm. Small plots are left undisturbed to reseed the cutover ground. The newly cut land becomes excellent deer range with-

in a year and the seed plots help provide cover.

If the sportsman was farming the ground he'd plan it on a 25-year cycle. Newly opened land reaches its peak for deer production in about 12 years and tapers off until about the 20th year. From there on it's little use as deer range until the loggers come around again. Some species of fast growing trees shorten the life of the range even more.

Game experts will be able to predict, down to the last ani-

mal, the number of deer a tree farm will support.

Opens To Sunlight
In the pine areas east of the mountains the lumbermen practice selective logging, removing only the mature trees. While this helps open the forest to sunlight, it does not bring big areas suddenly into wildlife production.

The Washington State Game Department now owns about 100,000 acres of elk and deer range, mostly in forest areas. Its first step on acquiring new land is to get

the timber off so the browse can grow.

The big lumber companies have declared the sports man in as a partner in the venture. In some cases they transport him into and out of the area, but more often he walks in and the tree farm provides a means of getting out his kill.

This helps the company protect its heavy investment in roads, but it probably is of more value in creating a friendly feeling in a big segment of the public.
