Truman Warns GOP Not To Bar Social Progress

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Republican victory at the polls, President Truman says, was no mandate to the government to cut down on its public health activities.

Truman said President-elect Eisenhower's administration will find itself "far behind the times" if it tries to stop what he called the social and economic progress made under the Democrats.

And, in defense against what he termed politically inspired attacks on his public health program, he declared that "anyone who interprets the election as a mandate to stop the efforts we have been making for social and economic progress is blind to history."

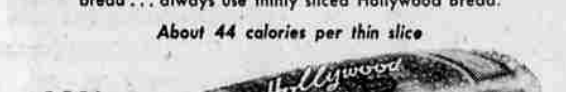
