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down the street last April 9. Asked by Prosecutor Robert G. Davis, where he had seen the two men again, Perry said they had been brought before him at the county jail.

He did not name them, but presumably meant Crabb and John W. Coffield, the second suspect in the case.

Under cross examination by defense attorney Claude Giles, both Mr. and Mrs. Perry admitted that they were the only two men brought before them to identify and that they had seen pictures of the two men in the paper.

"You didn't pick them out of a dozen or so men?" asked Giles.

"No," replied Perry, "but it wouldn't have been hard to do. I was very interested in who Georgia was with."

Perry said he had known Miss Lang since she was born. His mother and Miss Lang's grandmother have known one another for some 40 years, Perry said.

He said he had seen Miss Lang on the streets of Roseburg about 5 or 5:30 p.m. April 9, the night she vanished. She was alone when he first saw her, but later he noticed her walking between a sailor and a civilian.

Mrs. Perry said she had not known Miss Lang previously but that she recognized the sailor she was with last April 9.

"Is he in the courtroom?" asked Davis.

"Yes."

"Can you point him out?" Mrs. Perry then looked at the defendant and replied, "He's the third one from the left (at the attorney's table)."

She said she wasn't able to identify the other man in the case. Also testifying in the preliminary hearing this morning was Robert M. Stults, district attorney, who said he had questioned Crabb shortly after the defendant was arrested by state police at Coquille.

Stults said Crabb told him he had hitched a ride with "an unidentified man," last April 9. They drove to Roseburg and met Miss Lang on the streets late that afternoon, Stults quoted the defendant as saying.

"After he first met her," Stults said, "he said he had made conversation to — as he put it — 'pick her up.' She did not get into the truck with him at that time. He said she went into a restaurant and he followed her there. He said she left the restaurant before they fled and that he and the unidentified person had paid her check. Later they met her on the street and talked her into going with them, he said."

After taking the girl to the Goodrich Road, Stults quoted Crabb as saying, the unidentified man told him that, "there wasn't a possibility of both of us making out with this girl, so why don't you take a walk?"

He took a walk, Stults said Crabb declared. Later somebody woke him up after he had apparently passed out and drove back to Roseburg. He said he didn't think the girl was with them on the drive back, Stults said.

At the conclusion of testimony, Defense Attorney Giles commented, "There is no evidence of murder. There is evidence of the finding of a dead body. There is no evidence that this party (Crabb) reached the spot."

"This girl could have died of natural causes. She could have been killed by the 'third party,' according to the State's evidence."

Giles asked the state to produce more evidence.

Local Boy Scouts, under the direction of the Roseburg Police Department, started work this morning on a survey designed to give a "general overall picture of all available parking space," Police Chief Stan Olson announced today.

Airport Light Tests Results Not Yet Shown

Results of tests made of airport lights Friday night will not be known until the first of the week, West Coast officials reported today.

Word must come from Seattle. If the field is approved for night landings, it will "probably be 10 days" before regular night service would be put in here, officials said.

The required ceiling here is 1,700 feet and two miles visibility for daylight flights, and a slightly higher ceiling is necessary for night flights.

The airport was fogged in again clear in the afternoon. Flights Thursday due to the fog, too, but the field was open Friday.

County Judges Recommend Bills For Legislature

PORTLAND — County Judge E. G. Arnold of Linn County is the new president of the Association of Oregon Counties.

He was elected here Friday at the closing session of the group's three-day convention to succeed Judge C. K. McCormick of Union County.

Judge Garnet Barratt, Morrow County, was elected vice president and Commissioner Roy J. Rice of Marion County was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The association, made up of county judges and commissioners of the state's 36 counties, approved resolutions calling for:

The Legislature, at its next session, to authorize county officials to open welfare and relief rolls to public inspection;

Congress to pass laws prohibiting the filing of mining claims by persons interested only in timber lands or recreational value of the claims;

County officials to be placed under workmen's compensation laws;

The State Highway Department to issue another 35 million dollars worth of construction bonds.

Other county officials' organizations, meeting at the same time, elected officers:

County clerks and recorders Harry L. Chase, Lane County, president; Mary Redding, Clatsop County, vice president; Nellie Watts, Jefferson County, treasurer, and John Liveira, Grant County, secretary.

County treasurers—Hazel C. Quinn, Wheeler County, president; Wayne LaFarge, Clackamas County, vice president; J. Summerville, Multnomah County, secretary.

Dillard School District Votes On Three Issues

Voters from Dillard School District 118 will go to the polls from 2 to 8 p.m. Monday in Dillard, Tenmile and Lookingglass Schoolhouses to cast their ballots on three measures.

They will vote on: (1) withdrawing from the non-high district and establishing a high school, (2) withdrawing from the rural school district and (3) incurring a budget deficit of \$3,000 to hire a superintendent.

This vote is a followup to an Oct. 22 decision of the three districts — Tenmile 7, Lookingglass 13 and Dillard 118 — to consolidate into a first class district under the Dillard number. One of the purposes of the consolidation was to secure a place for their students to attend high school.

Although Dillard has already secured a site and architects for the new school on highway 42 at Brookway, the people must vote to leave the non-high district before a bond issue can be passed.

Railroad Wreck Routes Trains Through Roseburg

Roseburg citizens saw the Southern Pacific's top notch steamliner, the Shasta Daylight, roar through the city Friday.

It was a rare opportunity, as the train usually travels by way of Klamath Falls. Reason for the most unusual occurrence was a pile-up on SP tracks at Chemult, Ore.

The southbound section rolled through at 12:10, with the northbound train passing through at 3:40 p.m., local SP men said.

CHEMULT, Ore. — Eighteen Great Northern freight cars piled up on the joint-use mainline tracks of the Southern Pacific here Friday.

Thirty-one white-face feeder calves were killed or destroyed and Supt. Gene Oviatt sold them at \$5 a head to bystanders who butchered them in the snow beside the wrecked cars. They were worth around \$60 each at market.

No one was hurt when the train went through an open switch but the cars were piled two and three deep.

Floating Toll Bridge For Puget Sound Viewed

SEATTLE — A floating toll bridge across Puget Sound via Vashon Island has been recommended by a board of engineers.

The engineers' report, which said the \$82,000,000 project could be financed from tolls, was published Friday by Seattle newspapers.

The report said the project, including approach superhighways in West Seattle and west of Puget Sound, could be started within two years and completed within four or five years thereafter.

Gov. Langlie and William A. Bugge, state highway director, declined to discuss the report pending detailed study. The plans have yet to be reviewed by the State Toll Bridge Authority, which would have final authority in selection of a site and the many preliminary steps necessary if the project actually is undertaken.

Air Force Sabre Jet Ace Sets Speed Record

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — Air Force Capt. J. Slade Nash twice bettered 700 miles an hour in setting a new and as yet unofficial world speed record in an F86D Sabre jet plane.

This was disclosed yesterday by Charles S. Logsdon, limber for the Federation Aeronautique Internationale and the National Aeronautics Association. The speed trials were flown over Salton Sea Wednesday.

Capt. Nash, 31, of Menville, Ia., cracked the old record of 670.981 miles an hour set in September, 1948, by Maj. Richard L. Johnson in an F86A, an early model of the North American Aviation Company Sabre jet.

Election Of Ike Said Not Business Triumph

CINCINNATI — Laurance F. Lee, president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, said today business can expect friendlier treatment from President-elect Eisenhower's administration than it got from the Democrats.

"The outgoing administration chose business as a political whipping boy and the whole economy has suffered as a result," Lee said. "For the time being, that era is over."

Lee warned, however, against looking on the Republican election triumph as a victory for business.

"On balance, it appears to me that no economic group can claim a victory," he said, "and that is as it should be."

DEPARTMENT CALLED

The Roseburg Rural fire department answered a call at 7 p.m. Friday to the home of John White, 1515 N. Stephens due to an oil stove which flared up. No damage was done, firemen reported.

The householder had turned the stove on and had forgotten to light it. Then they threw a lighted match in, causing the trouble, firemen said.

2 More Missing Men Reported

Deputy Sheriff E. M. Schwader has received reports of two more men who were lost in the Upper Emille region many years ago and never heard from again.

Reports of others lost in the region are being sought in connection with the finding of a human skull last week in that area. Deputies are attempting to identify the skull.

One of the latest reports said a person known as "Cherokee James" of Salem was sought in a search some 20 or more years ago.

Schwader said an elderly trapper had also disappeared into the woods some 15 to 20 years ago. "The man, horse and everything else had never been seen from that time on."

The only way we're ever going to identify anybody after this many years is through a gun, watch, or something else that hasn't decayed with time," Schwader said.

He suggested that persons knowing about anyone lost in the area contact the sheriff's office.

SEOUL — A huge sign went up on the front of Seoul's burned-out capital today reading: "Welcome President-elect Eisenhower. We oppose withdrawal of United Nations forces."

Other signs placed on the building by Korean workmen bore such slogans as: "Drive away the Chinese Reds" and "unification under free Korea."

There was no official inkling when Eisenhower might arrive on his planned visit to this war-torn country.
