

Whitman Story Of Pioneer Era Put Into Drama

The story of Marcus Whitman and his bride beginning their mission to the Indians of Oregon Territory has been worked into a three-act drama entitled "Whitman" by Win Kelley, employed with Station KIRO, Coquille.

The play has been published in book form by Pageant Press, New York City, and is being released to bookstores this week.

The action recreates a stirring bit of American history, dramatizing it by the personal fears, problems and achievements of the pioneers. The play ends with the tragedy of the Whitman massacre.

The author, a native of Oklahoma, is a graduate of Pacific University in Oregon. He also has studied at Geller Theater Workshop, Hollywood, Plymouth Drama Festival, University of Oregon and Penn State College.

He has written a number of plays prior to his latest published work. With his wife and two children, he now resides at Coquille where, in addition to his radio work, he engages in writing, oil painting and singing.

It was 20 minutes before it raised high enough for the yacht to go down the river.

Then it jammed again. It was an hour and a half before automobile traffic was straightened out.

15 Of Mau Mau Slain In Fresh Kenya Outbreak

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Officials announced Monday the arrest of 350 persons at Kirawara in the Fort Hall Reserve, where police opened fire on a mob of 2,000 Kikuyu tribesmen and killed 15 of them Sunday.

The police action Sunday and other violence gave this troubled British East African colony its bloodiest weekend since the start of the drive to stamp out the terrorist activity of the anti-white Mau Mau Society. The death toll was at least 20 killed; including a retired commander in the British Navy.

The British, moving swiftly to prevent additional bloodletting brought to trial Jomo (Burning Spear) Kenyatta, bearded leader of the Kenya African Union, and five others on charges of aiding the Mau Mau leadership.

Punitive restrictions were imposed on the Thompson Falls area 100 miles north of Nairobi, where five Africans armed with pangas (long knives) burst into the farm home of Cmdr. Ian H. Meiklejohn, 56, and his 50-year-old physician wife Saturday night.

Mrs. Meiklejohn was slashed as she reached for a gun. Her husband was killed as he tried to grab a pistol. He collapsed while crawling upstairs for a shotgun. Despite her wounds, Mrs. Meiklejohn ran to her car and drove seven miles for help.

Meiklejohn died in a hospital Monday. His wife's condition remained serious.

Sen. Humphrey To Renew Battle Over FEPC

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said today that during the next Congress he will vigorously renew the fight for a federal law to forbid racial and other discrimination in employment.

Humphrey said he will refuse to soft-pedal the fair employment practices commission (FEPC) issue in the interest of harmony between Northern and Southern Democrats.

"We won't have Democratic solidarity on some issues and this is one of them," he told a reporter.

He said he doubts that the rebellion of Southern Democrats against the Senate's passage of a bill against discrimination by some Northerners for such a law was the election of a factor in the Democrat's election reversal this year.

Humphrey heads the Senate labor subcommittee which yesterday released a report which said a survey shows that state and local laws with teeth to forbid job discrimination against minorities have had "healthy" results.

The report was written by Dr. Morris Berger, assistant professor of sociology at Princeton University, at the request of the subcommittee.

The report said that experience in seven states and two cities which have had fair employment practices laws since 1945 has indicated the statutes eliminated discriminatory practices with a minimum of dissension.

Chances of House approval of a voluntary type of fair employment law are viewed on Capitol Hill as good, although even this version might not pass the Senate. A compulsory federal FEPC is considered as dead as ever.

Rep. McConnell (R-Pa.), who becomes chairman of the House Labor Committee in the new Republican-dominated Congress, said he would go along with a voluntary law "but certainly not a compulsory FEPC."

Polish Princess Denies Part In Jewel Theft

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "I never saw this boy," a Polish princess declared when confronted with a male fashion model who claims she hired him to steal her jewels just to get publicity.

"I'm nonplussed," Princess Wladyslaw Jerzy Boguslaw Radziwill, 24, told police Friday.

The male model, 21-year-old Leonard Bleicher, who has been booked on suspicion of burglary, told officers he stole \$20,000 worth of the princess' jewels and valuables because she hired him to for \$1,000 with the understanding he would return them later.

Sheriff's deputies were inclined to believe her instead of Bleicher.

The princess was Lois Evans of Bismarck, N.D., before she married a 70-year-old exiled Polish nobleman.

Detectives said Bleicher also admitted taking \$22,000 worth of furs from the home of Mrs. Margaret Hayward, ex-wife of actor Louis Hayward.

Britain, U. S. Badly Split On India's Plan

to one another — highly unusual in diplomatic circles.

Soviet Opposes Plan
Moscow newspapers commented that the British-American differences over the Indian resolution proved the Communist contention that a major split — and possibly a war — between the U.S. and other Western countries is inevitable. The Soviet press also has made it plain that the Russians do not consider the Indian plan the right solution to the POW issue.

Both British and Americans made it clear that they are not divided on their basic refusal to send-back prisoners who say they are afraid to return to the Reds. They differ over what approach is most likely to solve the problem and bring an armistice to Korea.

The U. S. position is that the Indian plan is too vague and could give the Reds a chance to indulge in all sorts of stalling and double talk. They say they have had the experience of negotiating with the Communists at Panmunjom and have learned the necessity of crossing all T's and dotting all I's.

What India Proposes
The Indian plan, as revised along lines suggested by Eden, would:

1. Turn all prisoners held by both sides over to a four-power commission made up of Poland, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland and Sweden. These countries would be responsible for caring for the prisoners and getting them home. The commission would pick a neutral umpire who would sit as chairman of their deliberations.

2. After 90 days the commission would ask a political conference at which the Reds would be represented what to do with the prisoners still on its hands because they refused to go home. If the conference could not agree within 60 days, those prisoners would be turned over to a U. N. group.

Strength Of Red Army Put At 491 Divisions

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department estimates total Communist Army strength at 491 divisions, mostly located along borders facing the non-Communist world.

Russia was said to have 181 divisions and other Soviet-controlled countries 310 divisions, including 250 belonging to Red China. A average Communist division is estimated at 10,000 men.

In its booklet entitled "Let Freedom Ring," issued Sunday, the department gave no total figure for non-Communist strength but told of plans for a 75-division army under the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Portland Negro Held In Wife's Gun Death

PORTLAND (AP) — Joyce Marshall, 24, died in a hospital here Saturday night of a gunshot wound and several hours later her husband was arrested.

Police said the husband, Sylvester Marshall, 29, a Negro, brought his wife to the hospital, pointed out a fatal gun shot wound, and then left.

Four hours later he walked into a police station and told detectives he wanted to talk about the shooting. Detective Howard Kelly reported that Marshall signed a statement that the shooting was accidental and that it occurred when he was showing a newly purchased gun to his wife.

Marshall surrendered a .25-calibre foreign-made automatic, and was booked on a murder charge, Kelly said.

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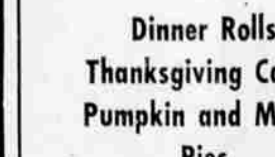

Russian-Made War Goods Pour Into Indochina

WASHINGTON (AP) — State and Defense Department experts said today Russian-made war supplies are pouring into Indochina over a transcontinental Red railway system protected from Allied air attack because it cuts through China.

Officials said this gives new striking power to Communist forces in Indochina, and presents a new, sinister threat to Burma and Thailand.

Informants said evidence that the Vietnamese Communists were receiving Russian supplies was found in a recent raid by French and native defense forces on a Communist supply center.

Allied raiders captured 25 tons of Russian-made mortar shells and four Russian "Molotov" trucks with gasoline engines, among other items.

The presence of these 2½ ton trucks at the Vietnam base of operations means that Red forces in Indochina must now be regarded as far more mobile than ever and thus creates new degree of danger for all Southeast Asia, officials said.

In the raid many other types of weapons and ammunition were also captured, including supplies of French, American, British and Japanese manufacture, as well as Chinese materials.

Chest Fund Still Far From Goal

Only 31 percent of the Community Chest quota has been received to date, officials report.

The Chest Drive so far has fallen short of its \$42,253 goal by some \$21,000, leaders report.

Failure to raise the remaining 49 percent would mean that the five agencies of our community who benefit from Community Chest Funds will have to curtail their activities drastically, and the 16 agencies of the Oregon Chest would not receive the amount of money that was approved by the Council of social agencies.

The campaign is still \$20,973.53 short of the amount needed to provide operating funds for these agencies. Only \$6,341 of the total fund of \$42,253 is to be allocated to the support of the Oregon Chest. Last year the child care agencies of the Oregon Chest served 55 children from Douglas County and gave these children a total of 4,568 days of care. In addition to these services by the child care agencies, the Mental Health Association of Oregon, the Oregon Prisoners' Association and the YMCA, through its "Youth-in-Government" program gave valuable

services to citizens of Douglas County.

Drive leaders this week are asking persons who have not yet given to the fund to send their contributions directly to the Community Chest, Chamber of Commerce, Roseburg.

Before Garner set out at 6:30 a.m. into the cold morning, a reporter noticed a white coconut cake with four green candles on it. The candles denoted Garner's (four score years, plus four. Garner wouldn't say who sent him the cake.

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
