

Field Goal Gives OSC UO Victory

PORTLAND (U) — A second quarter field goal by Captain Jim Cordial proved the winning margin Saturday as Oregon State defeated its traditional rival, Oregon, 22-19, in the final football game of the season for both teams.

The victory was the only Pacific Coast Conference win in seven starts for Oregon State. Oregon ended the conference season with two wins and five defeats.

Besides kicking the game-winning field goal, Cordial was outstanding as a pass defender and as a pass catching end on offense. He beat back an Oregon scoring

threat in the final minutes of the game with a spectacular pass catch that kept the ball for the Staters until the game ended.

Passing was the key factor in Oregon's scoring. In the first period Quarterback Hal Dunham took to the air for most of a 68-yard drive down the field. Fullback Tom Novikoff plunged over from one yard out.

Oregon State tied it up 6-6 in the second quarter when Fullback Sam Baker scored after a 42-yard march. Cordial's field goal made it 9-6 in favor of Oregon State at halftime.

In the third quarter Dunham passed Oregon 80 yards and Halfback Cecil Hodges cracked the line to put Oregon in the lead again.

But Cordial intercepted another pass and several plays later Halfback Wally Jackson scored. Within a few minutes Baker had scored again for Oregon State to put his team in the lead, 22-12.

Oregon's final touchdown was scored by End Ron Lyman who caught a pass from Quarterback Barney Holland in the end zone.

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Pro Leagues Show 4, 3 Deadlocks

NEW YORK (U) — If you're rooting for one of the 12 National League football teams, the odds are 7 to 5 your team is one of the leaders.

For with only three weeks of the NFL schedule remaining, four teams, San Francisco, Detroit, Green Bay and Los Angeles, are tied for the top position in the National Conference, each with six victories and three defeats.

And three clubs, Cleveland, New York and Philadelphia, are deadlocked for the No. 1 spot in the American Division, also with 6-3 records.

The four-way standoff in the National Conference is certain to last only a couple of days. Green Bay and Detroit are scheduled to clash on Thursday in the Lions' home den and the winner will sit down for turkey dinner with the undisputed lead.

The Rams climaxed a remarkable recovery from their early season impotency Sunday by vanquishing the 49ers, 35-9, in Los Angeles. A crowd of 77,968 jammed the Coliseum to see the defending champions easily record their fifth straight triumph.

Halfback Woodley Lewis began the scoring with an 83-yard punt return in the second quarter.

Quarterback Norman Van Brocklin and end Elroy Hirsch manufactured the second touchdown in the third period on a 46-yard pass play. And with Bob Waterfield adding the extra points, they made it 21 to 0 in the fourth period when Rookie halfback Hugh McElhenny of San Francisco fumbled and Jack Dwyer picked up the ball and raced 54 yards across the goal.

The Rams added two more tallies on drives of 85 and 60 yards, with halfback V. T. Smith carrying the ball on the scoring plays.

San Francisco got 2 points in the fourth period when Van Brocklin was tackled in the end zone and added a touchdown soon after when Y. A. Tittle maneuvered the team 44 yards in eight plays. Tittle passed to Gordy Soltau for the final 5.

In the individual rushing duel between McElhenny and Don Towler of the Rams, the latter came out ahead. Towler gained a net 59 and McElhenny 40.

At Green Bay, the surprising

Packers picked up their fourth straight victory at the expense of the Dallas Texans, 42-14. The Detroit Lions, tied for the lead with San Francisco last week, came a cropper against the Chicago Bears 24-33 in a Windy City thriller.

At Cleveland, the Eagles came from behind with two fourth-quarter scores to upset the Browns 28-20. The New York Giants, who went without a touchdown against Green Bay last week, were held scoreless by Washington for almost three periods but finally overcame a 10-0 Redskin lead to win 14-10.

The improving Pittsburgh Steelers, playing at home, edged the Chicago Cardinals, 17-14.

German, American Cars Win Mexico Race

JUAREZ, Mex. (U) — An unconventional German sports car, a souped up American-built Lincoln and their drivers shared plaudits Monday as winners of the world's most gruelling speed test—the Pan-American road race.

German engineer Karl Kling, outwardly calm but inwardly feeling the strain, pushed his Mercedes-Benz at speeds up to 150 miles an hour Sunday to take \$17,422 first money for sports cars.

Chuck Stevenson 1952, U. S. racing champion from Fresno, Calif., nosed home first with a Lincoln in the modified stock car class and earned \$11,628.

Kling and Stevenson led the way home for 39 survivors—10 sports and 29 stock cars—of an original field of 92 cars. One driver was killed in a crash and lesser accidents or mechanical difficulties eliminated the rest.

Kling crossed the line 18 hours, 51 minutes and 19 seconds of driving time after the race began. Second place went to teammate Hermann Lang of Stuttgart, also in a

Mercedes Benz, who took second money of \$11,628 with a time of 19:26:30.

Lincolns swept the first four places in the stock division with Stevenson crossing the line only 31 seconds ahead of Johnny Mantz of Los Angeles. Mantz won \$5,814.

Bob Christie of Grants Pass was the only Oregon driver to finish. Driving a Nash, he placed 21st in the stock car division with a time of 24 hours, 29 minutes.

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
