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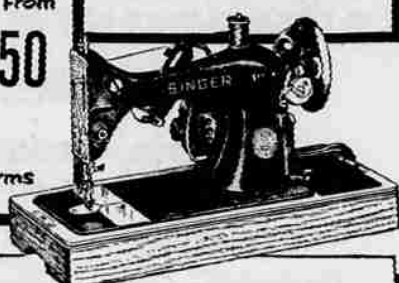
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Camp Fire Girls, Sale Of Candy On November 28

The most active girls in town this week are the Camp Fire Girls who have embarked on an annual project which keeps them as busy as the proverbial beaver. The girls have been taking advance orders for the peanut brittle sale which starts Nov. 28. Their goal is not just a box here and there but hundreds and hundreds of them. In fact 7000 boxes in all have been ordered from Severn's Candy company of Medford.

Besides taking orders, Camp Fire Girls have been brushing up on the ways of the super-salesman, learning to keep accounts and the other business-like procedures necessary to make the sale a success. One of the seven crafts on which the Camp Fire program is based is "business." By demonstrating how to approach prospective customers (Business 218) and by taking part in the sale (Business 202), a girl may earn two of the yellow beads symbolic of that craft.

Each group will receive a profit of 10 cents for every box sold by the girls in the group. The remaining 10-cent profit will go into general council funds. The funds thus earned by the groups will be used to finance such group activities as service projects, "fun" projects and special projects required for advancement in rank, for handicraft materials, honor beads and other group equipment.

Exine Anderson Will Be Soloist With Roseburg Choral Society

Soprano soloist with Roseburg Choral Society and Roseburg Symphony Orchestra in their presentation of "The Messiah" at the Junior High School Auditorium on the evening of Dec. 14, will be Exine Anderson, assistant professor of voice at the University of Oregon.

Miss Anderson has done professional singing in New York City, following the completion of work for her Master's degree at Columbia University in 1945. She was awarded a Kathryn Long scholarship from the Metropolitan Opera that summer, which led to experience with the Metropolitan Opera Company.

She did extensive radio work

with Toscanini, Frank Black, Howard Barlow, Lyn Murray, and the NBC Symphony Orchestra, and in 1950 was soloist for the National Association of Composers and Conductors at Times Hall in New York.

Last summer, having come to the University of Oregon in the fall of 1951, Miss Anderson was again at Columbia University and was soloist in a performance of the Brahms German Requiem at Riverside Church in New York.

Other soloists for "The Messiah" are: contralto Audrey Mistretta, tenor Calvin Long, and bass-baritone Douglas Stobie, Frank Moore, president, and S. Clarence Trued, director, of the Choral Society have expressed great satisfaction at having obtained these fine artists for "The Messiah," this Christmas season. It is felt that this year's performance will be the finest offered by the society, with the co-operation of church choirs and the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra.

Catholic Parish Donation Depot

In cooperation with some 100 other Catholic parishes of western Oregon, St. Joseph parish will act as a collection depot for donations of usable clothing, blankets, and shoes for shipment overseas and free distribution to refugee populations of Korea, Europe, the Near and Far East, according to Rev. Last year at Thanksgiving time 7,255,000 pounds of usable articles were donated in this appeal. Overseas allocation is to those most in need, of any race, color or creed.

If cash is donated, checks should be made payable to "Thanksgiving Clothing Collection," it is announced from diocesan headquarters at Catholic Charities, 400 Dekum Building in Portland.

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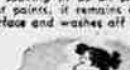
