An official told a reporter Monday that surveys of the manpower situation in the nation are being assembled to provide an up-to-date picture on how many 20-year-olds still are available for the draft.

State selective service directors will come here next week to discuss their problems with national officials, he said.

Stevenson Asked To Talk At State Demos, Banquet

PORTLAND (AP) — Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, defeated Democratic presidential candidate, will be asked to speak at the annual Oregon Jefferson-Jackson Day banquet next spring.

That was decided Sunday at a meeting of the Democratic State Central Committee here.

Stevenson, in a telegram to Oregon Democrats Saturday, said he hopes members of the party in the state "can merit success in future campaigns."

At Sunday's meeting, T. Lawson McCall, former assistant to Gov. Douglas McKay and now a radio commentator, was criticized for being "unduly partisan" toward the Republican Party in his daily KGW news commentary.

The group's executive committee was asked to discuss the matter with officials of KGW, and should that fail to bring satisfaction, the board was authorized to file a formal complaint with the Federal Communications Commission.

McCall replied by saying: "The apprehension this group feels, I am sure, not shared by most thinking Democrats of the state."

He said the Democrats were trying to "intimidate" him and that the present criticism was due to a recent broadcast in which he mentioned Howard Morgan, state Democratic chairman.

In that broadcast, McCall reported, he said Morgan's comments on the appointment of Gov. McKay as secretary of the interior were "stupid and vicious." Morgan was critical of the appointment.

Crime Survey Asked

In other action the Central Committee asked three investigations—two by its executive board of the State Tax Commission and of the sale of merchandise to state institutions, and the other by the Oregon Bar on whether or not attorneys are soliciting business from prisoners in the state penitentiary.

Robert Y. Thornton, state attorney general-elect, told the Saturday meeting that a crime survey should be made in Oregon.

"I hope the Legislature will authorize creation of a series of non-partisan commissions to study crime, law enforcement, juvenile justice, correction, commitment and release procedures and similar problems," he said. He added that he was working on the draft for such a program.

Present Highway Finance Program Urged By Baldock

PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon highway system will reach a balance between depreciation and new construction within five years, the League of Oregon Cities was told Friday.

But that will be only if the present program of financing is maintained, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, said in a talk before the group.

State Sen. Elmo Smith, chairman of the Legislative Interim Committee on Highways, reported that his committee will ask the Legislature to pass laws to eliminate duplication in control over motor vehicles.

Another speaker was George S. Woodworth, attorney for the State Liquor Commission.

He said a new law on the liquor-by-the-drink initiative, which voters approved Nov. 4, would follow the aims of the present Knox Law, which he said was designed to promote temperance.

Not that taverns now serving beer will be licensed to serve hard liquor, he said. And he added that not many new outlets for the sale of hard liquor will be needed.

"A few new outlets will be needed to meet the demand on the part of low income groups who have neither the facilities nor the means to patronize a hotel or a club to get a drink," he said.

The sale of hard liquor, with certain restrictions, is permitted in a number of clubs throughout the state.

Newby Will Not Vie For Governor

DETROIT, Mich. (AP) — If a court ruling is asked on who should be the next governor of Oregon, the request will not be made by Oregon Secretary of State Earl T. Newby.

That was his statement here Saturday when asked to comment on reports that the State Supreme Court might be asked to rule on whether Newby or State Sen. Paul Patterson should be governor when Gov. Douglas McKay resigns to become secretary of the interior in President-Elect Dwight Eisenhower's cabinet.

Patterson is expected to get the job because he was president of the Senate at the last session of the State Legislature. But some state officials think Newby might be entitled to it.

Newby, in this area to attend a meeting of the Motor Vehicle Administrators Association at Chicago, said of McKay's appointment:

"I am thrilled and pleased. He is eminently qualified for the job. We in the Northwest are proud that Eisenhower has made such a great selection."
