Sawdust Use Favored

Sargent again brought up the question of using oil or sawdust in the Joseph Lane School and Rose School addition. Last week the board voted to use oil in both places. Sargent didn't vote then. He said he thinks the district should use the natural resources of the area. At the previous meeting the fear that sawdust wouldn't always be available here had been expressed. "If we don't have sawdust we won't need this many schools," Sargent said.

So architects were asked to try to work room for a larger boiler room and sawdust bin into the Joseph Lane plans, if possible. Limited space was the reason oil was decided upon for Rose School.

Patrol Work Praised

The board voted to offer the city \$1,000 for the balance of the school year to pay half the expenses of adult patrols on safety lanes on Highway 99 and the North Umpqua road for Rose, Benson and the Junior High.

A survey the board ordered taken at the last meeting on the North Umpqua patrol crossing to Benson School showed the students doing "an excellent job," Deller said. In three days only one car out of 1,000 violated directions to stop. Over half the cars were reported traveling from 40 to 50 miles per hour.

The board also decided to use strip convection heating and ordinary glass windows at the new Joseph Lane School.

Jobs Very Important

Mrs. Hobby will become a trustee of one of the largest trust funds in the world—about 17 billion dollars held for those covered under the old age and survivors insurance program.

In addition, Mrs. Hobby will have the overall administration of the Office of Education, and a variety of other welfare agencies, such as the Public Health Service, Food and Drug Administration, Office of Vocational Rehabilitation.

Mrs. Priest will have the responsibility of seeing that the Treasury issues its daily and monthly statements on the government's financial standing. She will sign government checks and see that the interest and principal is paid on public debts.

Quick-Thinking Pilot Averts Air Disaster

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—A quick thinking Air Force pilot narrowly averted a fatal collision between his C-47 transport and a B-50 bomber Thursday.

Major W. V. Fertig, New Albany, Ind., was checking out Capt. H. C. Schoener, 31, Los Angeles, in the twin engine transport.

Fertig said they were concentrating on the controls when "I looked up and saw a B-50 on collision course."

The planes were closing at more than 300 miles an hour. Fertig jerked back the controls and "leap frogged" the huge bomber.

The tail of the four engine bomber was slashed by the transport's left propeller, but no other damage occurred.

Both planes returned safely to base. There were seven men aboard the bomber; nine on the C-47.

Middlewest Scoured By Blast Of Winter

The Kansas National Guard turned out to aid stranded motorists.

At Wichita, hundreds of cars were reported snowbound along highways near the city. More than 150 persons were rescued during the night. Red Cross and salvation Army workers aided in feeding and housing them.

Other marooned travelers sought shelter in farm houses.

Public transportation in Wichita, a South-Central Kansas city of 170,000, was suspended last night.

Schools were closed until Monday. Electric service was interrupted.

The storm piled almost a foot of snow on Western and Central Kansas. In McPherson, hotels were packed and stranded travelers were even sheltered in the City Auditorium.

Electric power to several towns in both Kansas and Nebraska was knocked out.

The Texas Panhandle and North-west Oklahoma dug out of traffic-blocking drifts. The snowstorm moved out of Texas yesterday.

Some schools and airports remained closed.

But the storm proved a blessing to farmers in drought-stricken areas of Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, providing a thorough soaking for their parched fields.

Russian Black Market Gang Gets Prison Terms

MOSCOW (AP)—The government newspaper Izvestia reported today that 16 big-time blackmarketeers in wool and silk cloth have been convicted and sentenced to prison terms ranging from five to 10 years.

The property of all 16 has been confiscated by the state.

The ring bought yard goods in Moscow stores, transported it to Tbilisi in Georgia and sold it at speculative prices, making large profits.

Murderer Of Foster Mother Gets Life Term

ASTORIA (AP)—Ward L. Wenger, 21, Astoria, Tuesday admitted the hammer murder of his foster mother, and was sentenced to life imprisonment.

The sentence was mandatory for his plea of guilty to second-degree murder. Indicted on a charge of first-degree murder, Wenger was examined by psychiatrists. The results of the examination led the court to allow him to plead guilty to the lesser charge.

The foster mother, Mrs. Marie Wenger, 45, was killed July 11 by hammer blows on the head. Her body was found in her home, rolled inside a rug. Wenger was arrested later in her car in Texas.

Seoul Suspects Jailed As Security For Ike

SEOUL (AP)—Metropolitan police made a series of arrests Wednesday in a roundup of Koreans considered possible security risks when U. S. President-elect Dwight Eisenhower visits Korea.

The number of persons detained was not reported but police stations were jammed.

Thousands of South Korean Army troops, metropolitan police and plain clothesmen turned Seoul into an armed camp. They took up positions every 10 to 20 yards along main thoroughfares.

Police said those arrested would be held until after Eisenhower's departure.

BEN C. DEY DIES

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Ben C. Dey, 72, former Portland lawyer who retired five years ago as head of Southern Pacific's legal department, died at the S. P. hospital here Tuesday.

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
