"High Wall" is the case study of Tom Gregory, a young bigot. Although his parents have good intentions, Tom becomes the victim of their harsh discipline and lack of love and understanding. Tom's sister, Laura, successfully resisted the slow infection of prejudice spread by the parents.

According to Mrs. B. A. Young, PTA president, this is the second program of a series planned for the year on parent education, helping parents evaluate themselves in order to improve parent-child relations in the home.

"We are all prejudiced in varying directions and degrees, but the battle against it must begin with recognition and admission of it ourselves," she said.

Hate, Fear Of U.S. Make Argument With Chinese Reds Impossible, Says Last Of Methodist Missionaries

HONOLULU (AP) — The last American Methodist missionary to leave Communist China said here last night Chinese Reds "are so filled with hate and fear of America" it is impossible to argue with them.

The Rev. F. Olin Stockwell said he gained his release from a Communist prison when he "realized that to argue with the Communists was as useless as to argue with a drunkard."

Stockwell, who passed through Honolulu en route to Los Angeles after two years in Communist prisons, said, "I signed such statements as they desired," to gain release.

He told reporters he hoped to meet his wife Esther in Los Angeles today, two years to the day after he was arrested in Chungking by the Reds on charges of being a "counter-revolutionary missionary spy."

Dr. Stockwell plans to return to his home in Chicago for a rest before starting on a speaking tour. He is attached to the Board of Foreign Missions of the Methodist Church with headquarters in New York.

No Violence Suffered
Dr. Stockwell told reporters at Honolulu Airport that he spent 14 months in solitary confinement in Chungking but suffered no physical violence.

"Many other missionaries fared worse," he said.

He said the Communists "prided themselves on the fact that they did not subject their captives to electric shock or the water treatment," he said.

He said his food consisted of rice and one vegetable twice daily, "with a taste of meat twice a month."

Dr. Stockwell is a veteran of 23 years missionary work in China. Asked if there were any American Methodist missionaries left in China, he said, "No, I was the last one."

"A week ago Sunday night I was in a Communist cell, 10 feet square, in Canton," he said. "It's hard to believe."

He said he was forced to attend a compulsory Communist indo-

tration course for nine months.

"They told us they did not expect us to turn Communists," he said, "but we could not leave China until we realized that the United States was the imperialist aggressor in the Far East."

"Prisoners who refused to change their minds were kept in handcuffs and leg chains."

VA Pares Plan For Abolishing Regional Offices

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Veterans Administration took the wraps off a long secret private study of its operations Wednesday and promptly announced it would ignore one of the report's main recommendations — that most of the regional offices be shut down.

Veterans Administrator Carl R. Gray Jr. told a news conference a reorganization plan is being put into effect — giving the medical and insurance departments autonomy among other things — but he is not going along with the proposal for abolishing most of the 70 regional offices.

The study, intended to point out ways the VA could operate more efficiently, was made by the Chicago firm of Booz, Allen and Hamilton under a \$605,000 contract. It took 18 months and turned up 1,300,000 — word report in 11 volumes.

Gray said the report was of "tremendous assistance" in arriving at his reorganization plans, but the changes he is making were not based on it alone but on extensive studies and numerous recommendations dealing with the or-

Gray said the Booz, Allen and Hamilton report figured that if all recommendations concerning operational activities were put into effect there would be a saving of ten million dollars a year.

He said the report figured if its organizational proposals were put into effect the saving would be 15 million dollars a year.

Logging Safety Meet Will Draw From Roseburg

Several persons from the Roseburg area will participate directly in the Governor's Fourth Annual Industrial Safety Conference, to be held in the Masonic Temple, Portland, Dec. 4-5. The State Industrial Accident Commission is sponsoring the conference with the cooperation of the Governor's Industrial Safety Advisory Committee.

Forest Hollansworth, Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, Sutherlin, will discuss "Safety at the Landing" in the logging safety section, and Eugene Miller, Local No. 7-307, IWA-CIO, Roseburg, will serve as one of the co-chairmen of the logging section. Clifford P. Jorgenson, Gardiner Lumber Company, Scottsburg, will also speak on "Rigging Problems" in this section.

In the sawmilling, ply wood and miscellaneous woodworking safety section, Ray Martin, Martin Bros. Box Company, Oakland, will speak on the subject, "Safety Is Good Business." George Showers, Local 2671, AFL, Roseburg, will serve as one of the co-chairmen of the logging section.

In addition to those named above, there will be seven other industrial safety sections including log loading, hauling and dumping, building construction, heavy construction, food processing, public utilities, metal fabrication and automotive maintenance and repair.

Safety Ban Also Topic

There will also be a separate section on accident prevention methods which is being included in the conference for the first time. This section has been set up as a workshop for those persons who have the responsibility for safety promotion and will offer proven techniques in accident prevention methods. Professional safety engineers, personnel directors, all levels of management and safety committee chairmen will be especially interested in this section.

The conference will open at 10 a.m. Thursday, Dec. 4, with a general assembly at which time Governor Douglas McKay will address the delegates. The afternoon of Dec. 4 and the morning of Dec. 5 will be devoted to section meetings. Reports and recommendations will be presented at the closing afternoon general assembly on Friday.

Brig. General J. J. Burns, commanding general, Fort Lewis, Wash., will be the featured speaker at the annual safety banquet on Thursday evening of the conference. Also included on the banquet program will be a safety fashion show, arranged by the Portland Chapter, American Society of Safety Engineers. The conference will close with an inspirational address by E. J. Eisenach, assistant mine superintendent, Climax Molybdenum Company, Climax, Colo.
