east of Seoul on a flight from Tokyo with 44 men aboard. None survived.

Eleven men were lost and seven rescued Nov. 15 when a C46 dove into the Sea of Japan near the coast of Korea. That night, 20 men aboard another C119 disappeared on a flight from Anchorage to Kodiak. Search still is being conducted for that airplane and its human cargo.

The next crackup was at the eastern end of the trail on Nov. 17. A fourth C119 crashed near Billings, Mont., killing half of the 16 men on it. Then, the C124 which was found yesterday disappeared and two days later a Royal Canadian Air Force bomber crashed on Vancouver Island. Eight men perished, two survived.

Finally, the C54 from Anchorage crashed at Tacoma early yesterday. It was loaded with servicemen, their wives and children. They were returning from Alaskan assignments, to belated Thanksgiving dinners.

A mile from their goal, fog and possibly a disabled plane brought them to a fiery end.

Week's Storm Deaths Total 40

A cold and wet weekend appeared in prospect for most of the nation.

The late November spell of cold weather and snow extended over wide areas. Temperatures continued much below seasonal levels. The Rocky Mountain region and North Central states were the coldest spots.

Storms in the Southwest and Midwest this week caused 40 deaths, with Colorado reporting 11, Nebraska 8; Kansas 7; Iowa 6; Minnesota 5 and Oklahoma, South Dakota and Texas one each.

Snow, rain and sleet dominated Saturday's weather map—and not much change was the outlook for Sunday.

Snow fell from Iowa and Eastern Nebraska to Oklahoma as southerly winds carried moisture and cloudiness over the cold air.

The snow was mixed with freezing rain and drizzle to make driving hazardous from Kansas south to Northern Texas and eastward to Memphis, Tenn.

Rain pelted areas from Central Texas to Eastern Mississippi. Snow flurries continued over the lower Great Lakes region and in the New England states.

Cold spots early Saturday included Butte, Mont., with 13 below zero and Laramie, Wyo., with a minimum of 3.

Hole In Boy's Heart Patched

INDIANAPOLIS — The Indiana University Medical Center announced Friday it had succeeded in patching a hole the size of a half dollar in a 13-year-old boy's heart.

The boy, Richard Duffy of near Linton, Ind., had been brought to Riley Hospital for children at the medical center several weeks ago because of a "chronic state of heart failure."

Surgeons found the boy had been born with the defect, a hole between the left and right auricle chambers of the heart, putting an additional strain on the heart and causing an enlargement of the organ.

The center said surgeons patched the hole with a piece of the pericardium, the fibrous sac which encloses the heart. The surgeons' names were withheld.

The announcement said medical literature includes "only two or three cases of successful repair of such heart defects."

the paroles in 1948 and demanded that the freed men be put back in prison.

The committee said it found no evidence of bribery but expressed the view that "big money"—from an unknown source—was spent to get the men out.

The men were represented in the parole proceedings by attorneys Paul Dillon of St. Louis and Maury Hughes of Dallas, described in the committee report as "personal" friends, respectively, of President Truman and Tom C. Clark, then attorney general and now a Supreme Court justice.

These attorneys, the committee said, were "in a position to exert influence with those in authority." However, the report said there was no evidence President Truman "had any knowledge of the matter."

The ex-gangsters became eligible for parole after serving one-third of their 10-year sentences, and were released by the U.S. Parole Board about a month after the eligibility date. Shortly before they were freed, the Justice Department dismissed an additional mail fraud indictment against the four, describing it as "duplicating" the extortion indictment under which the convictions were obtained.

The paroles were revoked after the House committee demanded that action. Lengthy litigation thereafter resulted in Rice, Campagna and Gioe going free on habeas corpus writs. Campagna's case went up to the Supreme Court where on a 4-4 split, the government lost its fight to re-imprison him.

The awards, donated by the Ford Motor Co., provide national recognition for 4-H boys and girls who have attained prominence in their communities and counties.

The winners will be presented their awards at the annual 4-H dinner in the grand ballroom of the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago on Dec. 4.

Frances M. Hughson, 18 of Albany, Ore., who worked on 14 different homemaking projects in nine years. She also has successfully handled sheep, pigs and steers and is a livestock junior leader. As Oregon clothing winner she attended the 1951 4-H Congress.

Jeff McGrew II, 17, of Woodland, Calif., who started in dairying by borrowing to buy a Holstein heifer. He now has 22 debt free purebreds. He has placed a grand Fair every year since 1947. This year three calves placed first, second and fourth.

Uranium In Springs May Have Aided Ancients

WASHINGTON — Radioactive uranium may be the source of curative powers ascribed since Biblical days to springs near the Lake of Galilee, says a woman scientist from Israel.

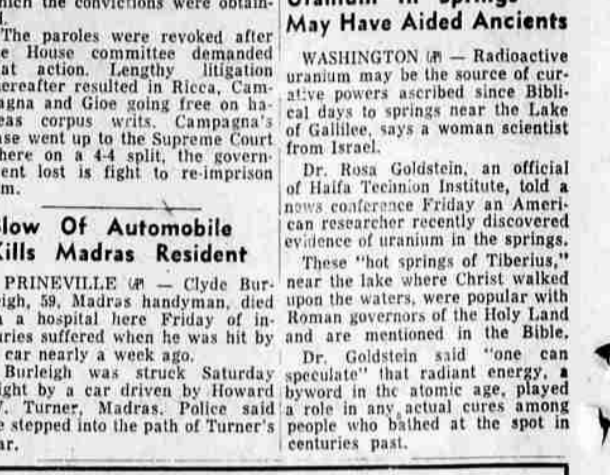
Dr. Rosa Goldstein, an official of Haifa Technion Institute, told a news conference Friday an American researcher recently discovered evidence of uranium in the springs.

These "hot springs of Tiberias" upon the lake where Christ walked with Roman governors of the Holy Land and are mentioned in the Bible.

Dr. Goldstein said "one can speculate" that radiant energy, a byword in the atomic age, played a role in any actual cures among people who bathed at the spot in centuries past.
