

## Five Perfects Fired In Shoot

A field of 80 shooters turned out just before the rains came at the Winchester Traps Sunday to test a new electric trap and fire some hot rounds in the weekly Roseburg Rod and Gun Club practice.

Awards of ten hams went on the block to set off the weekly merchandise derbies scheduled for the rest of the 1952 year.

No less than five perfect 25's were fired in the 16-yard event. Scoring these were: George Vottilla, Ken Gilkeson, Dean Bubar, Ivan Pickens and Bill Jones. Enos Handy, L. Fugate and Charles Klingler missed one bird each, and Carl Christensen and Harold Woolley posted 23's.

Walt Edmonds topped the handicapped shooters with a 22. Gilkeson and H. Luper scored 21's and Christensen, a 20.

Jack Culver and Gilkeson tied for doubles honors with 20's and E. Krewsen was close behind with a 19.

The new electric trap, in operation for the first time this week, is the second to be set up at the Winchester grounds.

**SPOKANE (AP)** — A couple of well known seniors on different teams bowed out of college football here Saturday as champions of the forward pass, while an obscure sophomore came on as a running star of the future.

The occasion was Washington's 33-27 victory over Washington State in a red-hot offensive duel in sub-freezing weather. Three untimely fumbles cost WSC a chance to win or tie.

Pvt. Don Heinrich, Washington's great passer who goes back to the Army Monday after a weekend leave, completed seven throws for a total of 13 and won the national passing title for the second time.

Ed Barker, WSC's fine end, caught 10 passes from less talented Cougar pitchers to establish a new national three-year record of 106, two more than the old mark held by Bill McColl of Stanford in 1949-50-51.

Heinrich threw 16 passes—WSC tried 34 — and gained only 145 yards. This lost him the total offense title to Ted Marchibroda of Detroit who ended the season with 1,813 yards running and passing.

Heinrich and Barker had been given top pre-game billing but most of the 30,000 fans went away talking about a young stand-in who almost stole the show.

Sophomore Chuck Beckel of WSC pressed into service when the other two fullbacks were kicked off the team, was the whole ground game for the Cougars, carrying 3 times for 175 yards.

Beckel was called, "terrific, just terrific, that's all," by Cougar Coach Al Kircher. And he won as much praise from press box critics as given all year to his predecessors, Dick Bower and Jim Head who were fired in midseason for disciplinary reasons.

Wayne Berry, a usually poised performer, committed the most

crushing Cougar fumble. He dropped a punt at midfield with his team hopped up and trailing only 20-27. The Huskies recovered and shortly scored. WSC matched it but still wound up six points shy.

## Howie Odell Discounts Resignation Rumors

**SPOKANE (AP)** — Howie Odell, in a dressing room interview Saturday, scuttled persistent rumors that he would bow out as the University of Washington's head football coach to enter private business.

"You can say I'm staying... and not just to finish out a contract, either," he said. "Why should I leave Washington after a season when my team won seven games and lost only three? That certainly doesn't add up to any reason for leaving my job — and I don't know of any other."

Odell has one year remaining of his three-year contract. He signed for three years after several one-year pacts, in which the tenure was at his own request.

## N. Douglas Sets Jamboree In Yoncalla Friday

The North Douglas County Basketball Jamboree will launch section's season at the Yoncalla High School gym Friday night at 7:30. It is one of three kick-off jamborees scheduled in the County this week. The South Douglas teams slate a Jamboree the same night.
