

## Reuther Ahead In Bitter Fight To Head C. I. O.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP)— Walter P. Reuther seemed virtually assured today of becoming the CIO's new president after a close and bitter political battle among CIO unions.

The youthful, fiery president of the million-member Auto Workers Union shrewdly master-minded a fight for CIO convention votes and apparently was a winner over CIO Vice President Allan S. Haywood.

Reuther claimed "overwhelming victory" after the rubber and oil workers' unions representing more than 400,000 members, came out late Monday night for Reuther following ardent wooing by Haywood adherents. The rubber and oil unions previously had been neutral.

The fight for the CIO presidency as successor to the late Philip Murray still may go to a convention showdown vote on Thursday.

At 45 the red-haired Reuther is a young man compared with many other labor leaders.

Never bashful, he has come forward with numerous "Reuther plans" to solve the nation's problems, some of which have been accepted and worked and others which never saw the light of day.

Some years ago he bicycled through Europe and Russia.

**Income Tax Cut Will Be Sought In Next Congress**

WASHINGTON (AP)—An 11 per cent cut in individual income taxes and elimination of the excess profits tax on corporations will be proposed as soon as the new Congress convenes next month, Rep. Daniel A. Reed (R-N.Y.) said today.

Reed is in line to become chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, which originates all revenue measures.

His proposal calls for a reduction of slightly more than 5 per cent in individual income taxes next year and a similar reduction in 1954, for a total cut of about 11 per cent.

The 1951 tax bill raised individual rates by 10 to 11 per cent. The increase will expire automatically Dec. 31, 1953, unless Congress orders otherwise. The excess profits tax is due to go off the books next June 30.

Reed said he anticipates bipartisan support for his bill, which he called "the first step in the Republican tax and spending reduction program."

**Friendly Gesture Seen**  
CIO leaders took the selection of a labor man as an indication that the Eisenhower administration wants to get along with organized labor.

The naming of Durkin was hailed by George Meany, recently elected president of the AFL, who called Durkin an "outstanding trade unionist."

Weeks, one of Eisenhower's earliest backers in the pre-convention campaign, has been a member of the Republican National Committee since 1940. He is board chairman of two Massachusetts business firms, a director of three others and of the First National Bank of Boston.

Durkin served from 1933 to 1941 as Illinois state director of labor. He said after his selection was announced:

"I wish to assure the general that I will play on the team and give all the assistance I can in making his administration a successful one."

He said he believes the Taft-Hartley Act can be "amended to the satisfaction of labor."

"I have no doubt, also, that it can be amended to satisfy management as well," he said.

**Russians Asked To Seek Missing U.S. Officer**

BERLIN (AP)—Russian authorities have been asked to aid in a search for 2nd Lt. Horace J. Sincore, Homestead, Fla., who disappeared a week ago near the border of the U. S. Sector of Berlin and the Soviet occupation zone.

Maj. Gen. Lemuel Mathewson, the American commandant in Berlin, sent a letter Saturday to Sergeant Dengin, Soviet Control Commission representative, requesting aid.

Mathewson said Sincore was last seen on the Wannsee Lake island about 500 yards east of Glienicke Bridge, where the U. S. Sector of divided Berlin borders on the Soviet zone.

The Russians are holding two strayed across the Berlin frontier last Wednesday. They were identified Monday as Pvt. Raymond Michalowski, Perth Amboy, N. J., and Pvt. Lieutenant Night, Los Angeles, Calif. The U. S. headquarters has issued a formal request to the Russians for their return.

**Noted Horse Trainer Dies On Corvallis Visit**

CORVALLIS (AP)—Arthur Goldblatt, 62, widely known horse trainer, died here Friday while visiting friends.

Goldblatt, who had homes at Tulare, Calif., and Cincinnati, O., was in charge of the eastern division of the N. A. White stable, now at Miami, Fla., for the current meet.

He also had trained for the late R. B. Fairbanks of Indianapolis, and Goldblatt had come here with members of his family to spend Thanksgiving with Mr. and Mrs. Julian McFadden, McFadden was former chairman of the Oregon Racing Commission.

## Robinson Elected To Head State Republican Club

PORTLAND (AP)—Fred Robinson of Medford is the new president of the Oregon Republican Club.

Other officers elected at the organization's convention here Saturday include: Mrs. E. J. Schuster, Tillamook, secretary; Gene Rossman, Portland, treasurer, and Ed Kerr, Portland, sergeant at arms.

New district chairmen are: A. W. Myers, Oregon City, District 1; Dick Houk, Prineville, District 2; James Loneragan, Portland, District 3, and A. A. Lausman, Medford, District 4.

Some observers saw the election of Robinson as a further repudiation by Oregon Republicans of Sen. Wayne Morse. Robinson has for some time been a critic of Morse, who in a month bolted the Republican Party to support Gov. Adlai Stevenson, Democratic presidential candidate.

Speakers at the day-long meeting included V. G. Dubach of Lewis and Clark College; Robert A. Elliott, Medford, Republican state chairman; Gov. Douglas McKay; State Senate President Paul Patterson, and Reps. Walter Norblad and Homer Aronell.

Resolutions approved by the group: Urged the establishment in Oregon of the office of lieutenant governor.

Called for cutting into districts larger counties for state representative elections.

Expressed confidence that Eisenhower could hasten the end of the Korean war.

Commended Eisenhower for naming McKay as a member of his cabinet.

## Wounded GI's Heroism Wins Award Of Cross

WITH U. S. EIGHTH ARMY, Korea (AP)—An American soldier who kept firing his machine gun despite an almost useless right arm... who used a pistol and hand grenades when his ammunition was exhausted... and who personally accounted for more than 100 Red casualties has been awarded the Distinguished Service Cross.

The soldier is Pfc. James V. Cline of Rea, Pa., machine gunner in Company M, 17th Regiment, U. S. 45th Infantry Division.

The Communists launched a mortar and artillery bombardment last June 15 against a hill near Karhyon which was defended by Company M. An exploding artillery round overturned Cline's weapon and buried the crew.

Hurriedly digging his way out and cleaning his gun, Cline fired at the advancing Red infantry until he stopped their assault.

He turned back a second wave of attackers by destroying their machine gun with direct fire from his own.

**Also Wrecks Howitzer**  
Cline next wrecked a pack howitzer being operated in support of his company.

The howitzer had fired only one round when he found its range and killed the entire crew.

He was wounded shortly thereafter by an exploding grenade. Although both his legs were riddled with shell fragments and his right arm was all but useless, Cline swung his gun around and fired continuously until the still advancing enemy troops, successfully hurled them back.

When his ammunition was exhausted, he used a pistol and hand grenades to help drive the Reds from the U. N. position.

Another grenade wound, this one in the face, finally forced his evacuation for medical treatment.

The advisory committee, made up of Roseburg employers, employees and the school representatives, is the agency which determines such questions as wages, hours, selection of trainees, training standards and schedules for the distributive education program. The major objective of the program is to produce an employable citizen.

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## Red Bloc Upset By 53-5 Ballot On India's Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Western and neutral nations overwhelmingly pushed through United Nations committee approval of India's Korean peace plan last night despite a Red rejection that already had shattered hopes of its ever working.

More Soviet fireworkes are expected before the plan's final adoption by the General Assembly.

The vote in the U. N. Political Committee on the Indian resolution, aimed at ending the prisoner of war deadlock which has held up a Korean truce, was 53-5. The five Soviet bloc nations voted against it. Nationalist China abstained because she didn't think the plan would work.

India and her backers had pressed for a vote, nevertheless, to place on the Communists the moral blame for turning down another chance at a Korean peace.

American delegates—and many of their allies—were pleased by the unprecedented solidarity behind the Indian plan.

They said that, although there was little hope it would achieve the main objective of peace in Korea, the voting had completely isolated the Communists. They predicted this would be a powerful influence among the non-Communist Asians.

other plan by which the direction of the streets would have been exactly reversed to the accepted plan.

In a statement after the meeting, Adair said, "I am definitely in favor of putting in a one-way street grid, but I want to go on record as opposed to the directional plan accepted."

Under the accepted plan, the bounding streets of Douglas, Mosher, Stephens and Chadwick will be two-way. No parking will be allowed between 4 and 6 p.m. on the west side of Stephens, north of Oak to the North Umpqua Highway.

Contention on the two plans arose over the problem of peak traffic periods. The question was boiled down to which of the two plans proffered would best expedite the traffic snarl between 4 and 6 p.m. from the northeast industrial plants and from West Roseburg across the Oak Street Bridge.

City Manager W. A. Gilchrist reported that installation of street signs for the grid would be started immediately to meet the Dec. 28 date set by the council for opening the grid.

A tentative date of Dec. 15 was originally brought up, but was overruled because of the pre-Christmas traffic glut which would be compounded with the confusion of learning a new system.

Regular business by the council included the approval of two new businesses and three liquor licenses. The new businesses are Joe's Stove Repair in the Farm Bureau Building and the Hole-In-One Donut Shop at 225 Sheridan Street. Liquor license renewals were issued to the Sky Room and West Side Grocery, and approval was given Leonard Zacher's application to sell liquor by package or by the drink in conjunction with a restaurant.

Application of Dr. Byron Woodruff to construct a car port was turned down as not complying with limitations of the building ordinance.

About 50 of a proposed 750 acres of logged over and burned Umpqua National Forest land has been replanted so far this fall, Forest officials report.

Now that the rain has come officials expect the replanting work to be speeded up. The ground has been frozen at higher elevations and men have been busy with slash burnings, they explain.

Last year over 2,000 acres were replanted. "The total is smaller this year because the nursery is unable to produce trees due to increased orders and disease, officials said. The 750 acres is scattered throughout the forest.

**Leftist Party Leading In Venezuela Voting**

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—A leftist party seeking a greater share of revenue from the government was leading by almost 2 to 1 Monday in unofficial returns from Sunday's election of a 103-member Constituent Assembly.

The latest count from all over Venezuela gave the leftist Nationalist Union for a Democratic Republic (URD) a surprising 172,987 votes compared with 91,361 for the pro-government Independent Electoral Front (FEI). The Social Christian party (COPEI) ran third with 67,598.

FEI, is supported by the military-backed Junta which seized control of the government four years ago.
