changes in the law favored by Eisenhower and union leaders. But he has made unmistakably clear that he wants no tampering with what he considers the act's essentials.  
Some Senate sources were of the opinion that Taft's next move on taking over the Republican Senate majority leader post would show whether he really planned a showdown fight with Eisenhower.  
If Taft moves openly to grab that key job, it would be highly significant, these sources agree. A president must consult regularly with the majority leader to put over his legislative program.  
Taft has pronounced himself as "available" for the job, but he said at a news conference here after the Nov. 4 election he was not campaigning for it.  
Recommendations Ignored  
Senators at the Capitol were certain Taft has become increasingly irritated in the last 10 days at the trend of Eisenhower appointments. The Ohioan said he was asked to submit recommendations for Cabinet jobs and did so. But he has let it be known that not one of his first choices was selected.  
In contrast, some of the Cabinet selections and White House staff appointments were close associates of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, Taft's archrival in GOP affairs for years.  
Taft declined to say whether he would seek to block confirmation of Durkin. He would be in a key position to try to do so as chairman of the Senate Labor Committee starting in January.  
But Democratic senators predicted Taft could not do it if he tried. Some Republicans were inclined to agree.

### Wife Killer Bouse Sane, Psychiatrist Declares

Dr. statement that "you might think that a person has to be crazy to do such a thing, but I'm not insane."  
Haystead further testified that Bouse told him he and his late wife had been getting along for some time. Bouse said his wife told him twice that morning that she was "tired and wished she was dead." Haystead told the court.

During the entire day's proceedings, the defendant sat between his attorneys looking down at the table before him. He seldom looked up and apparently paid little attention to what occurred in court.  
In his opening statement to the jury, prosecutor Robert G. Davis said the state would introduce evidence to show that Bouse had threatened to kill his wife and children on several occasions.  
Davis said testimony would show that Mrs. Bouse had started divorce proceedings, but Defense Attorney Horn later said he thinks "the facts will show that Ethel said she would stay with Tom."  
"Ethel was very tired—she was very despondent," Horn said. He added that the defense would show that "the circumstances were such that on that day the parties agreed that they should end it all."  
Deed Confessed  
Roy Hebard, a next-door neighbor, testified that he had gone to the Bouse home to see if there was any trouble, and quoted Bouse as saying "Yes, I've done it—you have them take me away."  
Later Sgt. William Burke of the Roseburg police department said he knocked on the door of the Bouse house the evening of Oct. 8. "A voice invited me in," the officer related. "I asked what the trouble was and he (Bouse) said, 'She is in the bathroom. I finally did it.'"  
Assistant Police Chief James McAlpine told the jury that he had asked Bouse if he had had trouble with his wife and then quoted Bouse, "We've been into it for a long time—she isn't here any more."  
Patrolman Haystead, on cross examination, was asked if his investigation of the scene last Oct. 8 had revealed whether the water in the bathtub was discolored.  
"It was as clear as any Roseburg water I've seen," the officer answered.  
Haystead was also asked if he believed Bouse was telling the truth when he made his statement.

meht. Prosecutor Davis jumped up to voice an objection, then said "I think I'll let him answer."  
Haystead replied that he believed Bouse was telling the truth.  
The jury was completed Tuesday afternoon after the court had recessed to add more members to its depleted panel.

Other Testimony Heard  
Other persons testified this morning as to what the defendant had said about the case.  
City patrolman Deane Davis said Bouse told him he had written the note to his two daughters after he had killed his wife.  
Under cross examination, Davis also said Bouse told him that he and his wife had "agreed to die together," and that "he (Bouse) had agreed to kill her."  
City Patrolman Vernon Murdoch said Bouse had "turned to me and said, 'many times she wished she were dead. I didn't think I had enough nerve to do it.'"  
Mrs. Sally Lawrence, who works in Dr. A. N. Johnson's office, said Bouse had come in for lab work and that Bouse had said "the lab work was his wife's idea—that he wouldn't be needing it."

Dr. Homer Harris, director of the Oregon State Crime Detection Laboratory, testified that he found blood under one of the fingernails of Mrs. Bouse. And Dr. George Lenci said death was due to probable drowning.  
Others testifying included Charles Kash, who identified pictures; Shirley Brennan; Attorney J. V. Long, who said Mrs. Bouse had started divorce proceedings, and Mr. Albright of the Grand Hotel, who said Mrs. Bouse had requested a room for herself and daughters.

Purge Expansion Looms  
Trials now are expected soon in Romania, where Jewess Ana Pauker, former party boss, has fallen from grace with many others; in Poland and in the other satellites.  
In Czechoslovakia, it looked like only the beginning of a reign of terror among former party stalwarts who backed the wrong horse.  
The assignment of a new ambassador from Prague to Moscow and the arrest of the foreign trade minister, announced Tuesday by Prague Radio, hinted at more bloodletting in the purification of the Czech party.

### Producers Ask Boost In Returns On Milk

whereby retail milk prices at grocery stores would be lower than that charged by dairies for milk delivered to the homes.  
Differential Needed  
The grocers stated they realize that a differential must be established "only on the basis of the economies realized in wholesale deliveries to the stores," in comparison to those to the homes. The possibility that the number of deliveries per week to grocers be decreased in order to lessen the distribution cost to provide a differential was suggested.  
The milk marketing order sets the grocers' minimum margin at 1 1/2 cents, but this has been increased voluntarily by distributors to 2 cents, in line with that in other cities. It was brought out that the Oregon State College survey shows the average cost of handling milk in 31 stores was 2.02 cents per unit for labor and refrigeration, without profit.  
A distributor representative at the hearing stated that 80 percent of milk in this area is sold wholesale to grocery stores, restaurants and other wholesale outlets, and only 20 percent is delivered to the homes.  
William Weidel, assistant administrator of the Milk Marketing Agency, conducted the hearing.

Christmas Cookies taste better made at home with **Kitchen Craft Flour**

Christmas tree cookies  
Sift together 3 c. sifted Kitchen Craft Flour and 2 tsp. baking powder. Cream 1/2 c. butter or margarine and 1 c. sugar. Add 2 slightly beaten eggs and 1 tbsp. cream. Stir in sifted dry ingredients, grated rind of 1 lemon and 1 tsp. lemon extract. Chill.  
FOR THE "BOUGHS". Using pattern outline, trace out patterns of cardboard for cookies of 3 sizes. Roll dough to 1/4" thickness on a floured surface and use a cloth cover on the rolling pin. Cut out the cookies and place on cookie sheets. Pierce a hole in the stem of each "bough". From the scraps, cut small 1/4" rounds or stars, piercing a hole in the center. Sprinkle with green sugar. Bake in a hot oven (400°F.); boughs about 8 min.; stars about 5 min. Cool on a cake rack. Brush edges of boughs with confectioners' sugar icing and dip into tiny varicolored candies. Allow to set.  
TO MAKE CHRISTMAS TREE. A ring stand can be bought or use a pencil as the "tree trunk". Press pencil, eraser end down into a flower holder (the kind with the sharp needles is best).  
Start by putting on a small star. Then 2 of the largest boughs opposite each other. Then a small star or round followed by 2 more of the largest boughs, put on in the opposite direction. Now four more cookies with a round between each two to fill up spaces to form a symmetrical tree. Repeat this procedure using the smaller sizes of boughs gradually. Top with a small star, held upright with a bit of Scotch tape.
