Taft May Have Ruined Chance To Lead Senate

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two Senate Republicans were in disagreement today on whether Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio ruined his chances for GOP Senate floor leader by his attack on President-elect Eisenhower's choice for secretary of labor.

One Republican lawmaker, a staunch Taft backer who asked not to be quoted by name, foresaw as a result the "draft" of Sen. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire, the present floor leader, for another term.

But another Taft supporter, also requesting anonymity, said an organized effort would be made to elect Taft to the post. He would not predict the outcome, but said the drive would be stopped only if Stewart removed himself from consideration.

Bridges spread word soon after the Nov. 4 election that he wanted to pass the leadership job to other hands and take over the less burdensome duties of the temporary president of the Senate.

In case of a dispute over his successor, however, Bridges has been regarded as available for another term as floor leader.

Sen. Morse Not To Oppose O. K. Of Gov. McKay

PORTLAND (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse has no intention of trying to block the appointment of Gov. Douglas McKay as Interior Secretary, the newspaper, The Oregonian, said Thursday.

Morse was quoted after a telephone conversation as saying, "A president has the right to have whoever he wants in his official family."

"There can be no question that McKay is qualified from the standpoint of character and loyalty, and he is certainly qualified to carry out the political philosophy of Eisenhower," Morse was quoted.

Last month, Morse described McKay as "a stooge of the tidelands oil thieves, the private utilities gang, and the selfish interests of the country."

Morse will return to Oregon Sunday for a series of talks. He will visit his daughters in Eugene that day, then confer with a Eugene group that night on veterans' problems. He will speak at Sheridan Monday, at Eugene, Ashland and Forest Grove Tuesday, at Pendleton and Baker Wednesday, and at Portland Friday.

Heroic Marine Gets Decoration

BREMERTON (AP)—An Oregon Marine who killed three of the enemy in Korea while his ammunition held out, then went after others with his rifle as a club, won the Silver Star Medal here Wednesday.

Pvt. Carl S. Johnson, route 1, Dayton, Ore., was the marine honored for conspicuous gallantry in action last Aug. 13.

Capt. C. G. Clegg, commanding officer of the naval hospital here, presented the medal to Johnson, who is being treated for wounds suffered in the battle.

Johnson was taking part in a raid on an enemy fortification. The official citation said: "During the battle he fearlessly moved into an enemy bunker, killing three of the enemy, and when his ammunition ran out used his rifle as a club to kill another. Although seriously wounded in arms and legs, he covered the platoon's withdrawal by hurling hand grenades at the counterattacking enemy."

State Loans Now Ready For Korean War Veterans

Oregon veterans of service since the start of Korean hostilities may apply now for state home and farm loans through the Oregon Department of Veteran's Affairs, Ernest J. Smith, loan supervisor, announced.

The four percent loan program, originally restricted to veterans of World War II, was extended to veterans of the current emergency by the Oregon electorate on Nov. 4 and the amendment became effective Monday when the ballot count was officially certified by Governor McKay.

To be entitled, Smith said, the veteran must have had at least 90 days of service between June 25, 1950, and the termination of the current emergency, must have been honorably discharged, and must either have been an Oregon resident when he entered active duty or have come to Oregon and lived here for two years or longer following his discharge.

World War II veterans must have served 90 days or more honorably between Sept. 1, 1940, and Sept. 2, 1945, and must have been Oregon residents when they entered active duty or have come to Oregon and lived here for at least two years between date of discharge and Dec. 31, 1950.

The Oregon loan entitled a veteran to borrow up to 75 percent of the appraised value of the home or farm being acquired, in an amount not exceeding \$6000. More than 9000 World War II veterans have borrowed in excess of \$38,284,000 under the program since 1945. Application is made through the Salem or Portland office of the state veterans' department, or through local county service officers or real estate brokers.

Faithful Horse Saved By Welsh

CARMARTHEN, Wales (AP)—A thousand kindly Welsh have come to the rescue of an old grey mare. Airborne had pulled a dust cart through the streets most of her life and done her work well. But a veterinarian recently found her broken-winded, lame and no longer able to haul the cart.

The Municipal Council voted to sell her to a horseless dealer. That was last week. Then 1,000 residents signed a petition to reprieve Airborne and the Council decided to postpone its fateful decision. Meanwhile, the mare kept working.

A plot quickly developed to rescue Airborne from further degradation. The news reached the ears of the municipal fathers. They were convinced.

Now, with a "reasonable expectation of life" and sold to the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, Airborne will end her days doing light work on a farm.

Oregon Traffic Deaths Apace With 1951 Toll

SALEM (AP)—Oregon's traffic death toll in the first 11 months this year was 406, or two more than in the same period of 1951. The November total was 45 killed, greatest for any November in 16 years.

There were 3,351 persons convicted of traffic violations during November. These include 211 convictions for drunk driving.
