Everyone and Everybody Should take some time in their life to enjoy the trip by Lurline to "Paradise of the Pacific," the Hawaiian Islands, which the Islanders themselves so proudly inform you "is a part of the United States." Matson Navigation Company has gone to every length to assure Lurline passengers of every attention and enjoyment during the trip both to and from the Islands.

The Lurline is considered one of the finest and smartest luxury liners in the world. It is completely air-conditioned; has 400 telephones; is fire-proof and is beautifully decorated in the Polynesian motif executed by leading California artists. It carries 72 passengers and 144 crew members; more than one crew member for every two passengers. The ship is in charge of Frank A. Johnson, Captain, USNR (Ret), who was introduced to every passenger during the trip.

Chief Engineer W. N. Lindholm, a resident of Oxnard, Calif., headed the table my husband and I were assigned to. He had traveled to most parts of the world as had two other passengers at the same table, Hugh G. Petersen Sr., of Chicago, and Carl Duhrsen, of Santa Barbara and the Island of Kauai. Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Jones of Honolulu (who had been on the Mainland for two months) and were returning home and Dr. and Mrs. Grover Bradley of Reno completed the table. (Mr. Jones is manager of Liberty House, largest department store in Honolulu).

All types of entertainment for the guests makes the four days at sea fly altogether too quickly. Besides, two days after sailing from San Francisco, the sun was out and the passengers donned summer clothes. The ship's newspaper, "The Polynesian" is delivered to every stateroom daily.

Of interest too was Chief Deck Steward Jack Abramson of San Francisco, whose wife was formerly a Smith River, Ore., girl.

The morning the Lurline sailed around Diamond Head to Honolulu, we were hanging out the port holes of our stateroom at dawn. A mile out from the pier, the ship docked to allow the members of the press and friends to come out to the ship in launches and present gorgeous leis to those arriving. This was one of the biggest and happiest surprises.

Mrs. Neal (Lois) Stewart, formerly with the Klamath Falls Herald and now a staff writer for the Honolulu Advertiser newspaper, was in the first launch to reach the ship. She presented leis to us and had our pictures taken for her paper. I think she is a little partial to Oregonians.

Blue Skies, white sands and the castle-appearing pink Royal Hawaiian Hotel formed a scenic view for all of the amateur photographers.

Hundreds of Honolulu residents were on deck to welcome the incoming passengers. A Hawaiian floor show was presented at the dock, after which taxi cabs took the passengers to their hotels.

The Royal Hawaiian Hotel is more beautiful than even the travel books describe. The welcome there was over-powering. We were photographed again wearing the leis as we stepped out of the cab. The three assistant managers, Colonel Stanford Cost, Gill Wright and Robert Jollow, introduced themselves and then introduced us to Mrs. Hope Kellerman, the very charming hotel hostess, and to Dorothy Mahoney, who is in charge of public relations and who is equally charming. Upon being taken to a most attractive room, a fresh pineapple was brought in and since the weather was warm, it certainly was most enjoyable.
