

Ida Jane Patchen, 88, Drain Resident, Dies

Ida Jane Patchen, 88, a resident of Drain for the past 49 years, died at her home in the south part of that city Sunday, Dec. 7, after a lingering illness.

She was born Ida Jane Dickson, July 17, 1864, at New Hampshire, Ill., and was married Dec. 14, 1879, at Philipburg, Ill., to Edward O. Patchen. They moved to Drain from Orofino, Ida., in 1903. Mr. Patchen died in 1929. Mrs. Patchen was a member of the Church of Christ.

Surviving are three sons, Roy D. of Springfield, Archie G. and Cecil J. of Drain; one daughter, Edna Kenney of Drain; five grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, one brother, Ben Dickson and one sister, Ina Dobson, both of Orofino, Ida.

Funeral services will be held in the Church of Christ at Drain on Tuesday, Dec. 9, at 2:30 p.m. with the Rev. Hubert Prather officiating. Vault interment will be in the Drain Cemetery. Mills Mortuary of Drain and Cottage Grove is in charge of funeral arrangements.

Kate Bell Moore, 78, Passes At Drain Home

Kate Bell Moore, a resident of Drain for 74 years, died at her home in South Drain Sunday, Dec. 7, at the age of 78 years.

strength and stability of our whole federal system."

He called attention to a statement by a special Federal Court in Charleston, S. C., that "if conditions have changed so that segregation is no longer wise, this is a matter for the Legislature and not for the courts."

Threat From South Carolina Davis will represent South Carolina, whose Gov. James B. Byrnes

says a ruling against segregation will result in the state's "reluctantly" abandoning its public school system. Byrnes is a former Supreme Court justice and secretary of state.

The other states directly involved in the arguments are Virginia, Kansas and Delaware. The case involving District of Columbia schools falls under the due process of law clause of the Constitution's fifth Amendment, which applies to the federal government. Congress makes the laws for the District of Columbia.

Lower courts have upheld segregation in public schools but have required that equal facilities be provided.

In Delaware, the state's Supreme Court ordered Negro children admitted immediately to two white schools. It said they could not be made to wait a year until the state provided them with school facilities equal to those available for white children. It told a school board to ask for modification of its order after inequalities have been removed.

Actions In Other States In Kansas, a special Federal Court refused to end segregation in elementary public schools in Topeka. It found there was equality of physical facilities in the schools and cited the Supreme Court's 1950 decision. But it then made this comment:

"Segregation of white and colored children. The impact is greater when it has the sanction of the law; for the policy of separating the races is usually interpreted as denoting the inferiority of the Negro group."

In the South Carolina case, the special court in Charleston found that school officials were doing everything possible to equalize school facilities. It said that "no good could be accomplished for anyone" by ordering immediate abolition of segregation.

In the Virginia case a special three-judge Federal Court in Richmond upheld segregation and said it rests "neither upon prejudice, nor caprice, nor upon any other measureless foundation."

"Rather," the Richmond court added, "the proof is that it declares one of the ways of life in Virginia."

years ago 100 percent of Roseburg teachers were OEA members.

"Up until last year they had to be to hold a job," Clarencebach reported. He related a meeting early in the year when a joint group of AFT and non-AFT members came before the board and requested that the requirement be lifted. It was at that time.

"We have no more right to require them to belong than to require a person to belong to the Chamber of Commerce before he starts a business," Clarencebach said.

Director Mary Roberts recalled that cost of membership had entered into the earlier discussion. Deller said cost is 5 percent of the salary, or \$18 per year from a \$3,600 salary.

"To me membership is one of the indications of how professional a teacher is," Dr. Marvin Smith, assistant superintendent, said.

Clarencebach ended the discussion by suggesting this be included in other salary schedule recommendations Deller and Smith are expected to bring forth in the future.

Meeting Minutes Wrong Clarification of the board's position on the Green consolidation was prompted by a request for interpretation from Deller.

Minutes of a recent meeting stated the board and administration would "take no part in any discussion" on the matter. Deller said people were coming to him for information and that he didn't like "to turn them away."

Board members hastened to state that the minutes were wrong. They claimed the motion they passed said they would make "no recommendations" as a board.

Director Earl Sargent said, "People don't understand it (consolidation) and if we don't explain it how can they understand?"

Chairman N. D. Johnson pointed out that "the individual can say anything he wants to."

The board unanimously rejected several requests for time extensions from the Riverside contractor and one on the shop building.

"There's no penalty so why bother about extensions?" Clarencebach asked. (He was referring to the fact that the board imposes no penalty upon contractors who run over their completion date.)

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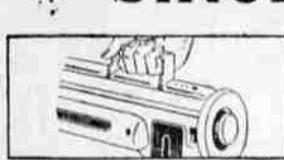
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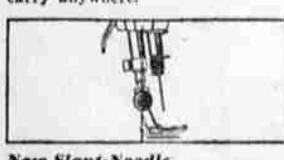
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
