Evangelist Graham Plans Korea Revivals

TOKYO — Evangelist Billy Graham arrived Tuesday en route to Korea, to conduct revival meetings.

Seventy-five American men, women and children met Graham and sang a hymn in the airport terminal building after he arrived from the U. S.

Graham told newsmen he planned to ask President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower to "call a day of prayer for Korea."

He said he did not believe there was any easy solution to the Korean War, "but by prayer and trust and faith in God a way can be found."

Graham, leader of the Youth for Christ movement, said he would leave for Korea Sunday. He plans five-day revival meetings in Pusan and Seoul. He was invited by Korean churches.

Oregon Seed Growers Seek Cut On Imports

PORTLAND — Oregon Seed Growers plan to ask the Republican administration for protection from foreign imports.

That was decided here Monday at the opening session of the organization's annual meeting. James Jenke of Albany reported that imports from Europe were forcing down the prices paid for Oregon growers' crops. This has

resulted in surpluses of red clover, ladino, alsike and alfalfa seed, he said.

European growers are increasing production of crops to compete with Oregon's. H. A. Scoth, agronomist at Oregon State College, told the meeting.
