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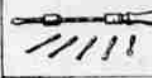
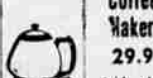
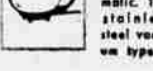

Woman Fugitive May Escape Deportation

PORTLAND (AP) — A Portland woman is in this country illegally—but the immigration service hearing examiner said he would recommend that she be allowed to stay.

She is Mrs. Aino Karm, 26, a native of Estonia. She fled that country in 1944 when Russians moved in, and went to Germany. After the war she was admitted to Canada as a displaced person, then came here and overstayed a temporary permit. She married an Estonian seaman after arrival here.

Louis Hifferman, the hearing examiner, said he was recommending a halt to deportation proceedings on the ground she is a stateless person.

Student Drowns in Willamette

ALBANY, Ore. (AP) — State police continued to drag the Willamette River near Harrisburg Thursday for the body of a Salem man drowned Tuesday when a boat capsized. A companion swam to safety.

The victim, Bob Moore, 28, a Willamette University law student, was trying to recover a shotgun lost Saturday by Fred Snider, Salem businessman, while duck hunting.

Snider, accompanied by Moore, returned Tuesday to recover the gun, using a motor boat with a heavy magnet attached to the cable. The boat overturned. Snider said he held the boat while Moore was swept downstream.

Snider said he swam to Moore to try to rescue him but Moore went under before he reached him. Snider then swam ashore.

Snider said Moore had only recently taken out a \$5,000 life insurance policy with double indemnity for accidental death. Moore's widow survives.

Snider said he lost his gun when his boat overturned Saturday while hunting with Milton Thomas, Salem. Both were able to reach shore at that time.

Stiffer Penalties Cut Truck Weight Violations

SALEM (AP) Log truck weight violations have decreased greatly as a result of the 1951 law providing stiffer penalties for overloads, the State Highway Commission said Thursday.

During the first 11 months this year, only 1.55 per cent of the log trucks weighed were found to be overloaded. In the similar period of 1950, the percentage was 6.03 per cent.

During the first 11 months this year, the commission weighed 213,622 log trucks, and found 3,302 of them overloaded.

In the similar period of 1950, 167,388 log trucks were weighed and 10,000 were overloaded.

Nunan Pleads Innocent To Tax Evasion Charge

NEW YORK (AP) — Joseph D. Nunan, Jr., 54, former U. S. commissioner of internal revenue, pleaded innocent Thursday to an indictment charging he evaded \$91,000 in income taxes from 1946 through 1950.

Judge Mortimer Byers in Brooklyn federal court set the trial for Jan. 5 but said a postponement could be asked then if Nunan needs additional time. Meantime, Nunan is free in \$1,500 bail.

Nunan resigned as head of the Internal Revenue Bureau in 1947 and resumed private law practice.

U. S. Judge Raps Long Detention Of Jail Inmate

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — The highest U. S. judge in Germany issued "an open and emphatic protest against the continued confinement" of a German citizen Thursday and demanded his immediate release on bail.

In a written statement to news correspondents, Chief Justice William Clark of the U. S. High Commission Court of Appeals complained about the case of Robert E. Bowen of Spokane, Wash.

"He has been held in German prisons in Rastatt and Kaiserslautern in the French zone of Germany for more than three months without trial and without a opportunity to offer reasonable bail for his release," Clark said.

"It is not my function to ascribe blame for the deprivation of Bowen's liberty. I simply say that in my opinion he should be released on reasonable bail and at once."

Bowen is charged with illegal possession of classified military program of the U. S. Army in Western Germany.

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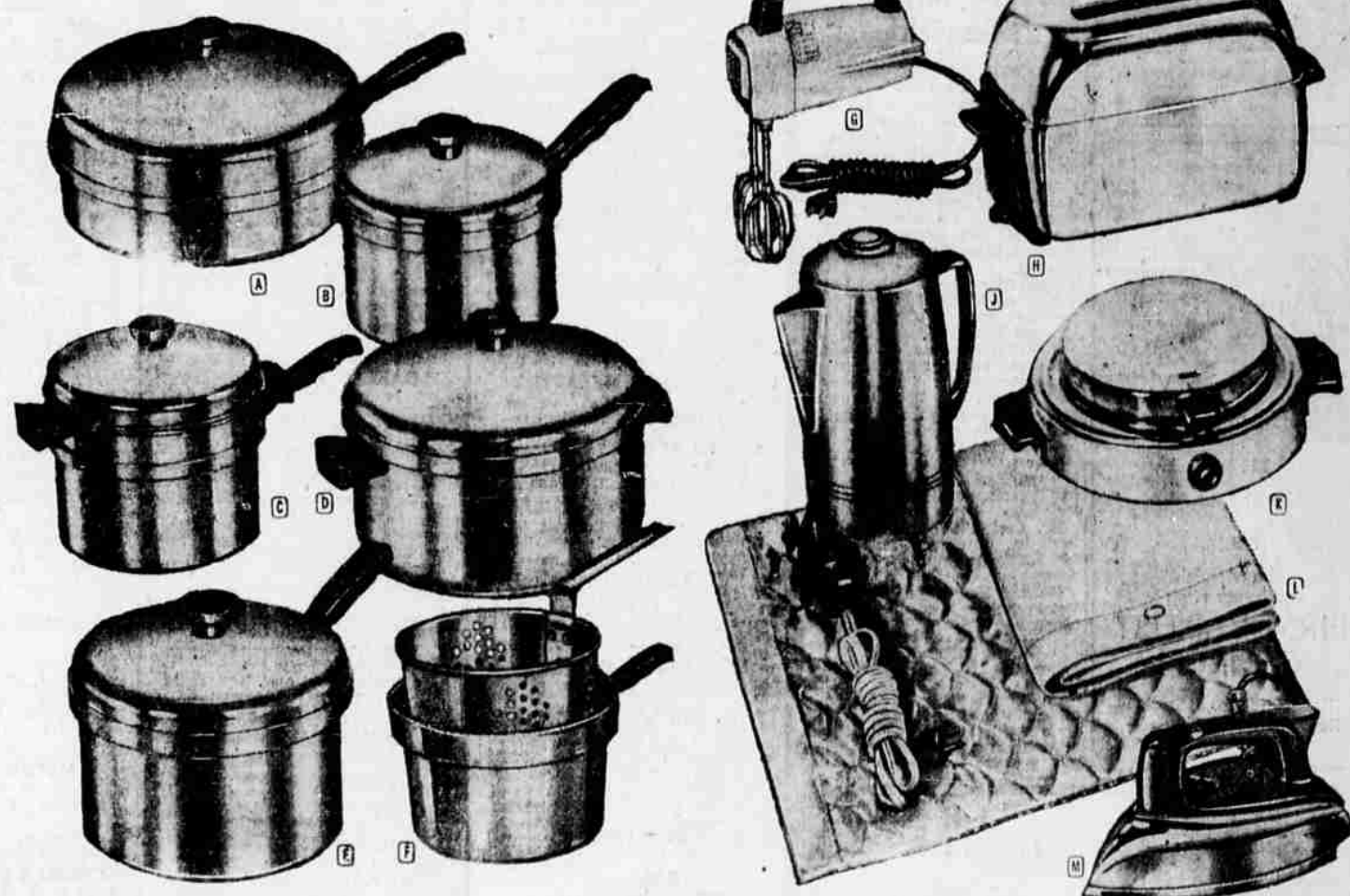

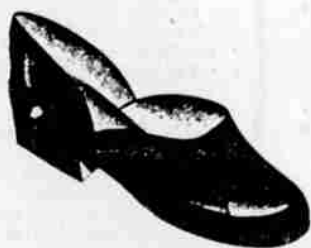
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
