With Forward Lee Leisinger chalking up 20 points, the Sutherland Bulldogs came from behind in the second half at Yoncalla to nose out the Eagles, 37-34.

The contest boiled down to a scoring duel between Leisinger and Yoncalla's Bill Fast. Fast missed a deadlock for scoring honors by one point. He tossed in 19 counters. Leisinger's basket-making talents reached a peak in the second half as he brought his Bulldogs from behind in the early seconds of the third panel. At the halftime juncture, Yoncalla was leading, 21-19. But as the second half opened, Leisinger raced under the basket for a lay-in to knot the score. Moments later, he again rolled off one to the backboard to run his hoop squad ahead for good, 23-21. The Bulldogs had extended the lead to six points, 32-27, by the game's third break. Yoncalla led at the first quarter, 13-10.

In running up his total, Leisinger scored six baskets and eight free throws. He split his total with 10 points in each half.

The Sutherland Jayvees also registered a win by topping the Eagles, 26-16. Wayne Card paced the victory with eight points.

Locals To Try For 4 Wins In Willamette Tilt Tonight

The Roseburg Indians whittled the tall Grants Pass Cavemen down to size in posting an upset 45-36 basketball win before a howling throng at the Roseburg villa Friday night.

Snapping back from their shoddy showing at Sutherland Tuesday, the Indians threw up a sharp, free-wheeling defense and matched it with enough scrap for two teams to start the Cavemen season off on a sour note.

Tonight, the Indians attempt to extend their record to four wins in five games when they invade Eugene for a criss-county tilt with the Willamette High Wolverines.

The story of Friday's foul-studded contest was told at the free throw line. Neither team was breaking any records from the field, but the Indians sank no less than 27 gifters. This was just nine more than the Cavemen could garner, and it was by just that margin that they won the game.

58 Fouls Called

A total of 58 fouls was called by the whistle-blowing arbiters, 25 against Roseburg and 33 against Grants Pass. The Indians took advantage of the extremely close calling to sink 53 percent of their free shots. They had 51 chances at the gift mark. Coach Ray Davis' less-cautious Cavemen crew hit their first shots, but didn't get enough chances.

From the field, the game was a disheartening frustration for both teams, but particularly for the visitors. The Cavemen took 64 shots at the Roseburg basket and hit nine for a starved 14.0 average. The Indians did slightly better, connecting on eight field goals in 48 shots, an average of .166.

In spite of the comparatively easy win and the definite signs of early-season lack of polish, the first half carried enough thrills to bring the jammed house screaming to its feet.

For spectacle, the highlight of this contest will have the partisan Roseburg fans talking a long time. It came just at the buzzer that heralded the end of the half.

Grants Pass' Norm Hedgpeeth had climaxed a Cavemen drive by putting the visitors ahead, 21-20, on a free throw with just bare seconds to go. Reserve Guard Nub Beamer took the ball from out of bounds and catching the chant of the crowd to shoot, he cast off. What a shot it was!

It seemed seconds as the ball sailed through the air over nearly three-quarters the length of the court. Just after the buzzer sounded, the radar-guided sphere rocketed into the hoop without so much as brushing the steel ring. That was a cue for a full-throated crowd ovation that lasted five minutes.

It put the Indians ahead, 21-20, and they never again lost the lead. They came from behind in the first three minutes in a free-throwing duel which Jim Gilbert climaxed by hitting three in a row. This pushed the Indians ahead, 4-3. By the end of the quarter, they were on top, 11-6. It took 5½ minutes

Walter Kraft, Oklahoma's faculty representative, visited the Southwest Conference faculty committee meeting here Friday and made a preliminary investigation of the possibility of rejoining the Southwest Conference "sometime in the future."

This was the first official contact, so far as known, made by the member of the Big Seven Conference, but it brought alive numerous reports of the past week that Oklahoma would seek to take up where it left off in the Southwest Conference in 1920.
