

## Airplane Makes Forced Landing Near Glendale

A light plane, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Vilas and their 3 children of Sparks, Nev., was forced down on an unimproved air strip at Fortune Branch near Glendale Dec. 3. With heavy clouds and severe storm conditions closing in on them at either end of the valley, Vilas, who had been following the railroad tracks much of the time since taking off from Eugene, planned to set his plane down on the CAA air strip, still marked on his map at Glendale. He flew over the field but could see that it was no longer in use, with a fence across it and what looked like standing water in one portion of the field (CAA discontinued the Glendale air strip Oct. 1). Vilas then prepared to land his plane, a new Piper Pacer, 4-seat

model, on the road, but each time he was ready to attempt the landing, cars approached, and he had to retain altitude. He continued to fly about, and finally spotted the field near Fortune Branch which local fliers are readying to take the place of the discontinued one near Glendale. Howard Vaughn, a Glendale pilot seeing Vilas predicament, went down the field and flagged him in. The field is still rough and muddy. It was expected that it might be Tuesday or Wednesday before the Vilas family could take off again to complete their journey to Nevada, where Vilas is a professional crop duster.

Vilas, dogged by bad weather ever since the family left on a vacation trip for Vancouver, Wash., on Nov. 26, expressed himself as "glad we saw him flagging us. Otherwise, we'd have wound up on some mountain top." The family planned on spending Thanksgiving with the children's grandparents in Vancouver but were first delayed by bad weather which grounded them at Redmond for a couple of days. After finally reaching their destination and visiting with relatives for a few days, the Vilas family started home again. Tempted by clear weather, they flew down the Pacific Coast, but were soon grounded at Astoria. On their next try they got as far south as Coos Bay but were forced back to Newport by a storm. They remained there for several days but, already overdue back home, they took advantage of a brief break in the weather to hop to Eugene. Luck seemed to be with them, and they took off from Eugene for Grants Pass, but the storm closed in again. Mrs. Vilas, in commenting on their trip, said, "Thank God for railroad tracks." They followed them, when things

## Farm Federation Asks Wage, Price Rules' End

SEATTLE (AP)—Elimination of wage and price controls, a curb on the federal sale of electric power and return to tidelands control to coastal states were demanded in closing sessions of the American Farm Bureau Federation convention here Thursday. The delegates also endorsed flexible farm price support and criticized monopolistic power by "industry, labor, agriculture or the government itself." Labor came in for a separate going over in a report on labor-management relations which noted what it called the trend toward labor monopoly. And, the delegates agreed, when the government constructs a dam, the right to generate power at the dam site should be sold to private enterprise or to states or their political subdivisions.
