Second Dividend On Insurance Due Vets Next Year

WASHINGTON (AP)—Another dividend will be paid next year to about five million veterans holding National Service Life Insurance policies, the Veterans Administration said today.

The first payments will be made in February. The size of the individual dividends for most policyholders will be the same as this year's dividend, with the vast majority of men getting a flat \$60.

The dividend is the second regular one on NSLI policies—the first was paid this year—and will total 180 million dollars. Two special dividends also have been paid. The four total nearly four billion dollars.

Payments to individual policyholders, the V. A. said, will be made from 30 to 40 days after the anniversary date of the policy. That's the date the policy first went into effect.

To be eligible, the policyholder must have paid premiums for any three or more months between the anniversary date of his policy in 1952 and the same date in 1953.

Three Choices Open
The method of payment will be the same as this year unless the policyholder informs the V. A. he wants to be paid differently, by writing to the V. A. office to which he pays premiums.

If he holds a term policy, he can get the dividend in cash or he may tell the V. A. to apply it as advance premiums to his policy. If he has a permanent plan policy, he may ask the V. A. to put the dividend on deposit. That way it will draw 3 per cent interest and will be added to the cash value of the policy.

The rate of dividend payment on most policies will be 50 cents for each \$1,000 of insurance for each month it was in force between the 1952 and 1953 anniversary date. Most term policies are for \$10,000.

There are nearly 3,000 rates for dividend payments for permanent plan policies, the V. A. said, and it's impossible to give a simple formula on them.

Tape Recording Of Nagging Fails To Win Divorce
SWANSEA, Wales (AP)—A Cardiff photographer lived up things in Divorce Court with a 45-minute recording of his wife's nagging—made on a tape recorder hidden in a bureau drawer—but all it got him was a bill for 100 pounds (\$280) in court costs.

Justice A. Davies admitted it was "a remarkable piece of evidence" but declined to accept the 45 minutes as typical of any substantial part of the married life of John Hedley Robinson.

"The husband was hardly able to get in a word edgewise," said Justice Davies, commenting on the record. "If he did open his mouth, he was told to shut up and listen. There is no doubt that the record gave a remarkable example of the force, vigor and venom with which Mrs. Robinson was addressing her husband."

"It is equally true that the one or two observations the husband did manage to get in would have served to pour oil on flames rather than on troubled waters."

The court observed that the recording of the oral attack was made for the purpose of getting evidence for the divorce action and added:

"He had made up his mind to leave his wife and by implication expressed preference for a younger woman. The wife was afraid

Federal Control Over Radio, TV Not Approved

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Congressional committee expressed belief Monday that there is overemphasis on crime in radio and television programs, but declared further government control is not the solution.

In a report to the house, it said "the potential evils inherent" in even limited government censorship "might be even greater than the evils that such controls might be designed to remedy."

The comments and conclusions came from a special House Interstate Commerce subcommittee created last May to try to find a way to "eliminate offensive and undesirable radio and television programs." The group was headed by Rep. Harris (D-Ark.)

Making the report public, Harris noted that the subcommittee had held lengthy hearings and heard many complaints against "beer and wine advertising" and "the number and character of crime programs."
