

Rifle Clubbers Pit 1509 Tally Against Grants Pass

Twenty shooters participated in the evening competition of the Roseburg Rifle Club Wednesday night following a business meeting in which the club voted to affiliate with the local Rod and Gun Club.

Firing in competition with the Grants Pass club, the local marksmen rang up a score of 1509—the total points scored by the top four members comprising the local team.

Harold Beauchamp was tops for the night with 386 points. Mac Wood totaled 380; Bill Jones recorded a 372, and Dean Paulson was one behind with 371. Others on the score sheet were Bill Bailey with 365, Roy Hill with 354, Paul Robinson with 380 and Ken Simons with 376.

Simons, a new RRC member, is a teacher at Roseburg High School and former Le Center, Minn., resident.

Whether the local shooters defeated Grants Pass or not will not be known for about two weeks, due to the procedure of sending the targets in for scoring and official recording. All records are handled under the rules of the National Rifle Association, of which the local club is a class one member.

The RRC won its last two matches. The marksmen won over Langell Valley by default and last week defeated the Medford No. 2 team by a score of 1523 to 1426.

The next shoot will be Sunday, Jan. 4, at the Armory.

Competition Will Resume Between W., E. Germans

FRANKFURT, Germany, (U.P.)—German sportsmen have ripped a hole in the Iron Curtain and agreed to resume competition between the Soviet Zone and West Germany. Relations were broken off last September because Eastern authorities refused to guarantee sports contests with West Germans would not be used for political purposes. Although both West and East Germany have held their own championships since 1949, athletes from both parts of the country used to meet in friendly rivalry until this year.

But when the West German track and soccer team went to the Eastern sector the stadiums were decorated with Red flags, huge Stalin pictures and banners called for friendship with Soviet Russia as "the only peace loving power in the world."

Last week end sports officials from both sections met in a west Berlin hotel and after hours of negotiating issued this statement: All international sports meets will be "Sports relations will be resumed. held in the true Olympic spirit. All international sports meets will be held in the true Olympic spirit. There will be no political speeches at the contests. No political banners or slogans will be displayed. The only flag raised will be the black, red and gold, which is the national flag of both the East and West German republics."

LaSalle, Oklahoma A&M, Navy, Notre Dame Remain Unbeaten

LaSalle, Oklahoma A&M, Navy and Notre Dame all retained their unbeaten status in college basketball Wednesday night. LaSalle, the nation's No. 1 team in the Associated Press poll, won its seventh straight, a 87-68 conquest of Arizona at Tucson. The Explorers from Philadelphia, NIT champions, are on a transcontinental tour.

Playing at home at Stillwater, Okla., the Aggies chalked up their sixth in a row, taking DePaul, 62-51, in a rough game. DePaul previously was undefeated.

Notre Dame made it four straight by trimming Chicago Loy-

ola, 53-45, at South Bend. Navy took Rutgers, 95-73, for the Mid-dies' fifth straight.

The Ivy League season got under way with Cornell taking a 64-56 overtime victory over Harvard at Ithaca. Lee Morton tossed in 31 points for the Big Red.

Red Holmes got off a 44-foot set shot in the last two seconds of an overtime to give West Virginia a 101-100 Southern Conference victory over William and Mary. Louisiana State beat Alabama, 58-45, in the Southeastern conference and Detroit whipped Houston, 74-64 in the Missouri Valley Conference.

In other games Siena beat Rhode Island, 79-70; Dartmouth trimmed Vermont, 71-60; Niagara humbled Syracuse, 65-45; Maryland took Virginia Military, 54-37; Nebraska downed Springfield (Mass.) 82-73 and Utah State tripped Washington State, 72-65.

Idaho Vandels Drop 61-52 Tilt To Peoria

MOSCOW, Idaho (U.P.)—The Idaho Vandels dropped a 61-52 basketball decision to the touring Peoria Caterpillars Wednesday night but gave the National AAU champions a rough time from the opening tipoff.

Idaho, ahead 13-11 at the end of the first quarter, trailed 28-25 at the half, but tied the game three times in the third period. The Cats didn't ice the game until after the three-minute rule went into effect. Leading 52-48 at the time, the Cats connected on nine free throws as Idaho piled up fouls in the closing minutes. Idaho's Tommy Flynn and the Cats' Dan Tippen shared scoring honors with 15 points apiece. Eleven of Tippen's points were on free throws, including eight of the nine in the last three minutes.

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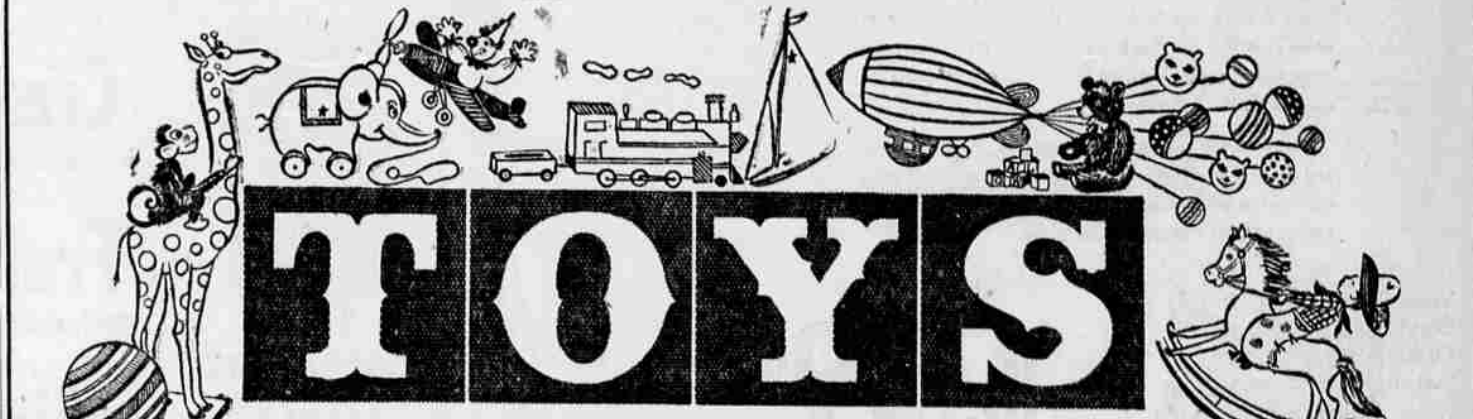
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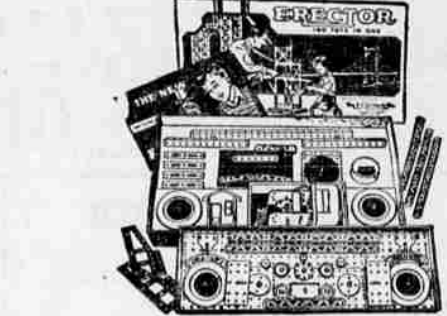


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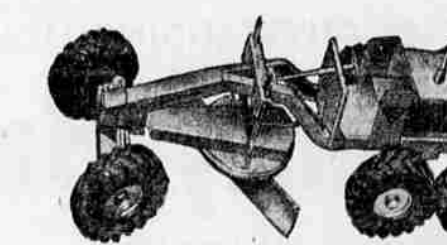


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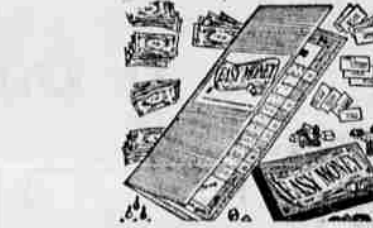
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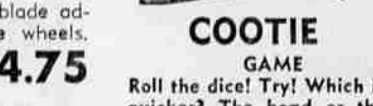
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
