point, in Stalin's expressed willingness to co-operate in any new diplomatic gestures looking toward peace in Korea.

This reply, it is true, created the most interest in Washington, but some skepticism was expressed privately as to whether the Russian leader was sincerely interested in a new approach to the peace problem, or whether this was more of the same Kremlin propaganda.

Eisenhower, during his successful campaign for the presidency, did pledge that he would go anywhere if it would promote peace. "There is nothing that I would not do," he said at June 7 news conference. "To promote the whole cause of peace and security for the United States in this world."

Lloyd Olson On Ship That Brought Eisenhower

LONG BEACH, Calif. (Delayed) (FHTNC) — Arrived here Dec. 16 aboard the heavy cruiser USS Helena from the Korean combat zone was Lloyd D. Olson, storekeeper second class, USN, of 702 Fullerton St., Roseburg.

The Helena brought President-elect Eisenhower from Guam to Hawaii following his tour of the Korean front. She was used by Eisenhower and his advisors to hold several top-level conferences.

The Helena departed Long Beach in May when she began her third tour of Korean duty. She served as heavy support ship for fast carrier Task Force 77 and gave gunfire support to UN ground troops.

While in the Far East, the Helena visited the ports of Nagoya and Kobe, Japan and held "open house," marking the first time that an American man-of-war had been visited by Japanese since the beginning of World War II.

Lawrence H. Leach Home From War Zone

Lawrence H. Leach, seaman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Leach of Gardiner, arrived Dec. 19 aboard the destroyer USS Richard B. Anderson, which docked at San Diego.

The Anderson has spent seven months on her second tour of combat duty in Far Eastern and Korean waters. She provided many and arduous duties for carrier Task Force 77; bombarded the rail and supply targets of the Communists; gave support for ground troops; patrolled the coast, denying the enemy the use of shipping and fishing facilities, and exercised with hunter-killer teams.

Although the days at sea outnumbered the days in port, the crew became familiar with the foreign ports of Yokosuka, Sasebo and Hadodate in Japan and Hong Kong in China. The ship has also visited Pearl Harbor, T.H.

Blowout Of Bus Tire Causes Seven Deaths

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — A holiday-crowded Rio-Sao Paulo bus blew a tire and careened over a cliff into the Poangaba river Friday, killing seven persons and injuring 23. The accident occurred near Sao Jose Dos Campos, 135 miles south of here.

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
