



Electric Co-op Nominates Meyers At Lookingglass

At their meeting in Lookingglass School on Friday, District Two of the Douglas Electric Co-op nominated Neal Meyer for re-election for the three year term as a director of the organization. The election will be held at the annual meeting of the Co-op on Feb. 2.

Manager Harold Backen Jr. gave a comprehensive report on the work of the Co-op during the past year with a glimpse of plans proposed in the near future. Included was completion of the transmission line from the Lookingglass sub-station to Tennille, providing a good, firm source of power with enough available for projected

growth in the next three to four years.

As a matter of statistics, Manager Backen noted that in 1939 the Co-op carried a 30 KW load whereas during the past year the load totaled 1550 KW and that the power used in this western district school alone at the present time equalled the load of the entire district in 1939.

Referring to the moot question of taxes paid by co-operatives in general, Backen said, "Covering all types of taxes, we pay from \$750.00 to \$800.00 each month. Of course," he continued, "we do not pay income taxes—we leave that to you individual members."

It is proposed to build a three phase line from Tennille to Camas Valley to give improved service in the near future, Backen said. He also noted that there are now 118 irrigation plants in operation in this area, which he pointed out is a rapidly growing industry.

Following the business meeting, a sound, colored moving picture of the development of the Columbia Basin project was enjoyed by the group. Refreshments of pie and coffee were served by the ladies of the Home Economics club of the grange. W. H. Niebaum won a portable electric mixer.

Truman Promotes Aide Assailed By McCarthy

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman Wednesday promoted Philip Nash, once described by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) as a Communist sympathizer, to the rank of administrative assistant to the President.

Nash has denied McCarthy's charges, which included the statement that he once was a member of the Communist party.

Truman at the time, last Jan. 31, called McCarthy a character assassin and said he never knew him to tell the truth.

The 43-year-old Nash, a Wisconsin native and one of the nation's largest cranberry producers, has been on the White House staff since 1946 as an adviser on minority problems.

The promotion means a salary increase from \$11,000 to \$15,000 a year although Nash will get this only for the few remaining weeks of the Truman administration.

War Service Period To Release GIs Cut

WASHINGTON (AP) — After Jan. 1, Army draftees rotated home from Korea will be released if they have completed at least 20 months of active service, Secretary of the Army Pace announced.

The normal service for draftees is 24 months. The Army previously had said those with active duty in Korea would be released after 21 months, because of that service.

The new policy also applies to draftees who return to this country before Jan. 1. If they have not left a reception center for reassignment to a new station by that date.

Adenauer Asks Ike To Appoint 'Strong Man'

BERLIN, Germany (AP) — West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has urged President Eisenhower to appoint a "strong man" as new U.S. high commissioner to Germany as soon as possible, Allied sources reported today.

They said he asked that the job be given to a forceful figure who could give a much-needed boost to lagging plans for German rearmament and West European unification.

Adenauer's request is regarded as actually a distress signal. He needs to get ratification of West Germany's treaties of alliance with the West. And he thinks France and other partners of the six-nation European army project need jogging from the United States to get on with the job.
