and one locomotive was damaged.

**TOKYO** — Communist gunfire hit 21 U. S. Navy ships off Korea in 1952, the Navy said today in a year-end report. Sixteen officers and men were killed and 35 wounded by the Red attacks.

The only ship lost during the year was the tug Sarsi, which hit a mine in August. Two crew members were killed, three are missing and four were wounded.

The Navy said its planes and warships maintained an "absolute blockade of the enemy coastline" while hammering Red targets along the coast and far inland.

Listed as destroyed by Navy planes and warships during the year were 13,425 Communist buildings, 943 bridges, 24 factories, 771 gun positions, 1,915 sampans and other small craft, 34 machine-gun and mortar positions, 15 tanks, 35 ammunition dumps and 592 warehouses.

Anthony climbed behind the wheel, turned a key and pushed a couple of buttons, with results disastrous to the car and the home of Mrs. Helen Patenaude, his family's next-door neighbor. Anthony suffered only a bruised forehead.

### 'Hunch' From Holdup Dream Proves Timely

**PHILADELPHIA** — Stephen Stolarski, 44, clerk in a Western Union office here, dreamed he was a victim of a holdup.

So when he came to work last night he took \$10,000 in daytime receipts and deposited them. The "hunch" was timely.

Two hours later a pistol-carrying robber demanded "the big stuff." Stolarski turned over \$800 in cash—all late receipts.

It was the second time Stolarski was the victim of a holdup. The first time, too, back in May, 1950, the robbery followed a dream.

### FATAL SNEEZE

**VANCOUVER, B. C.** — Lum Sing, 68, standing on the curb, leaned over to sneeze and was hit by a passing trolley Nov. 21. He died Monday, raising Vancouver's 1952 traffic fatality toll to 74, three more than last year's total.

### 714 Americans Killed In 4-Day Yule Weekend

Accidents killed 714 Americans during the four-day Christmas weekend. Included in that number were 533 who died in traffic mishaps.

Neither figure represented a record, nor did the traffic fatalities for the 102-hour period between 8 P. M. Wednesday and mid-night Sunday local time come up to the Nat' Safety Council's pre-holiday rate of 590.

Bloody as the slaughter on the streets and highways was, it did not equal the 555 killed during a similar Christmas weekend in 1950. The all-time record for all accidental deaths during a four-day Christmas holiday period, 789, was set last year.

### Hunter Kills His Dad After Litter Kills Deer

**CROSS CITY, Fla.** — A 23-year-old hunter sighted a deer's antlers through the brush Sunday, fired and killed his father, W. H. Rosier, 51, Gainesville, Fla.

Rosier had just shot the animal himself and was bending over to cut its throat.

Sheriff L. E. Hatcher termed the tragedy an accident.

Hatcher identified the son as Bob Rosier, 23, who returned two months ago from duty with the Army in Korea.

### New Cardinal Named By Pope First For India

**VATICAN CITY** — The Vatican announced Monday that Archbishop Valeriano Gracias of Bombay is being named to the college of cardinals of the Roman Catholic church.

He takes the place vacated Sunday by the death of Carlo Agostini, patriarch of Venice.

He will be India's first cardinal and the surprise announcement of his appointment emphasized Pope Pius' determination to bring the college to its full strength of 70 members at the consistory here next month. The college has not had full membership in two centuries.

Archbishop Gracias was born in Karachi, then in India, now the capital of Moslem Pakistan, on Oct. 23, 1900.

He is one of a group of seven cardinal-designates whose average age is only 50—one of the largest groups of comparatively young cardinals ever named to the college.

Agostini died in Venice after having been ill for some time with leukemia.

He was to have received the traditional red hat of a prince of the Roman Catholic church at a secret consistory Jan. 12 along with 23 other designated cardinals.

### Firehouse Catches Fire, Neighbors To Rescue

**HARVEYSBURG, O.** — Red-faced volunteer firemen here swallowed their pride Friday night and helped in neighboring Waynesville volunteers for help. The Harveysburg firehouse was on fire.

The hose on Harveysburg's pumper also was blazing so the Harveysburg firemen couldn't do anything except pray for the fast arrival of the Waynesville department.

The Waynesville department gallantly raced the six miles and had the fire under control in about a half-hour.

### Pupils Aid Journey Of Teacher's Family

**BRUNSWIC, Ga.** — A retired high school English teacher will visit the English homeland of her literary heroes because of the generosity of her pupils of a half century of teaching.

Miss Jane Macon, 70, received cash gifts totaling \$2,400 from her former students following her compulsory retirement last June from Glynn Academy here. The purse resulted from letters sent to "Lady Jane," as she was affectionately known. Replies came in from all sections of the globe.

### QUEEN MOTHER DIES

**COPENHAGEN, Denmark** — Denmark's saddened populace went into a week of official mourning today over the death of Queen Mother Alexandrine, who reigned as queen during two world wars.

The dowager Queen died Sunday, 12 days after her 73rd birthday.
