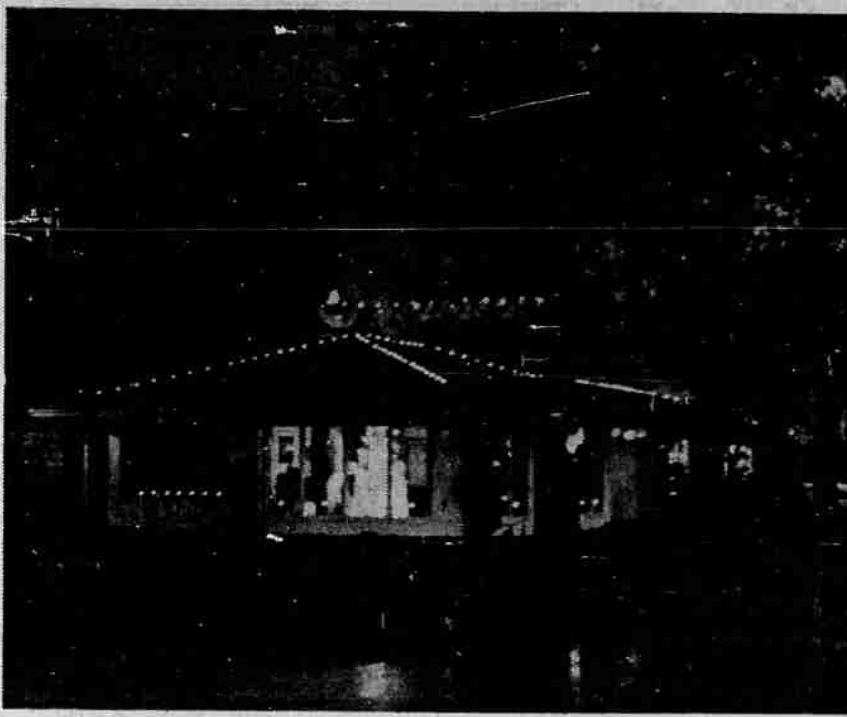
Helen Busenbark arrived this week from Newport, Wash., where she is employed, to spend the holidays with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dave Busenbark.

Oregon-California Area Lashed By Heavy Storms

A fierce storm hit Southern Oregon and Northern California Friday night with lashing rains, winds of gale velocity and heavy snow. U. S. 99 was blocked for nine miles near Yreka by huge drifts of snow, and Highway 97 was closed at Dorris, by a heavy snow near the Oregon border.

Chains were mandatory on all trans-Sierra routes. Southern Pa-

cific trains ran through the area with the help of snowplows. The Weather Bureau predicted rain squalls would move inland and southward.
