

Sakata Smacks Tony Ross

Mr. Sakata, the Oriental Atlas, smacked Salem's Tony Ross to the canvas with a body press for the third fall and the match at the Armory Saturday night.

The big Japanese from Honolulu raked Ross with judo blows before delivering the final blow.

Sakata won the first fall of the main-event with a Japanese hip-lock and body press. Then, the 202-pound Ross came back to dump him with a backbreaker. But, the judo expert came back to win the match with a body press.

Sprague Resigns As U. N. Delegate

PORTLAND (U) — Charles A. Sprague, publisher of the Salem Oregon Statesman, said Friday night he was resigning as alternate delegate to the United Nations.

He is quitting the post, which he has held two months, because he thinks President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower should be permitted to select U. N. delegates of his own choosing, he said.

Sprague, a Republican, was appointed to the post by President Truman.

He said the resignation had nothing to do with the fact that he had been critical in the past of Eisenhower's handling of foreign policy questions.

Sprague said he was disappointed that the U. N. had failed to find a solution to the Korean War. Sprague, an ex-governor of Oregon, said he was pleased with the appointment of Douglas McKay as interior secretary in Eisenhower's cabinet and with the succession of Paul Patterson as governor.

East Nips West In 21-20 Thriller

SAN FRANCISCO (U) — QB Tom O'Connell and his East mates were drawing cheers Monday for their thrilling 21-20 victory over the West in the Shrine football game.

O'Connell, from Illinois, directed the entire East offensive. He sparked a 71-yard drive that produced the winning touchdown with 53 seconds remaining. And he set three passing records for the 23 year old game that pours more than \$100,000 annually into the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children.

O'Connell, No. 2 collegiate passer in the nation the past season, was voted the game's outstanding player.

Billy Reynolds himself had made the win possible. He blocked Nebraska's Bob Reynolds' first conversion try. That was the margin of victory.

Don Heinrich, University of Washington All-America quarterback, was both hero and goat of the game. Heinrich's passes to Ed Barker of Washington State and Billy Vessels of Oklahoma set up the touchdowns that put the West ahead 20-14 in the fourth quarter.

Despite the apparently safe lead, Heinrich tossed another pass later in the period. It was intercepted by the East which then marched

to the winning touchdown. Howie Odell, coach of the West team and Heinrich's coach at Washington, was one of the critics of Heinrich's signal-calling.

"We shouldn't have passed when we had a six-point lead in the fourth quarter," Odell said after the game.

Oregon State's Sam Baker was one of the West's standouts. His 71-yard punt in the third period was the second longest in the 23 year history of the game.

Push Button Device Mixes Matching Paint

NEW YORK (U) — A new push button device mixes paint to the precise color of a sample in less than 90 seconds. The mechanism, known as the automatic color carous, mixes paint to match a selected color chip, putting into a container just the right amount of various colors to match the original.

The machine takes about half the space of an office desk. It stores specially formulated lid colors in containers housed in a varicolored revolving drum atop its counter-high base and measures them with laboratory accuracy into cans of base paints, enamels or stains.

Through selective mechanical and electronic controls, code numbers on the color chips are transferred by dial settings into the matching color in flat, semi-gloss, gloss or deep-tone wall paints, floor enamel, decorative enamel or pigmented stain. The device was developed by Standard-Toch Chemicals Inc.

World's Largest Pump Turbine Authorized

NEW YORK (U) — The Tennessee Valley Authority has authorized construction of the largest electric motor and reversible pump turbine in the world for installation at the Hiwassee Dam in southwestern North Carolina. It is scheduled for completion in 1955.

The reversible pump turbine will operate as a turbine in one direction and as a pump in the other. The electric motor will serve as a generator for the turbine operation and as a motor for the pump. When motor-driven, the unit will be able to pump 3,300,000,000 gallons of water a day. This is three times the quantity used each day by the city of New York.

Rifle Club Hits Year's Highest Score Sunday

The Roseburg Rifle Club scored a 1527 total in its shoot Sunday night against the Scott Valley club, the last competitive shoot for the year and the highest score racked up during 1952 by the Roseburg club.

The local riflemen shot last night because their regular shooting time for the week falls on New Year's Eve, President Bill Jones said.

The Roseburg club's weekly shooting record, along with that of Scott Valley, will be sent in for certification. Results of the match will not be known for two weeks.

The team's individual scoring against Scott Valley was as follows: Harold Beauchamp, 338; Bill Bailey, 376; Mac Wood, 384; Bill Jones, 379; and Dean Paulson, 372. Alternate Paul Robinson recorded a 382.

The next regular shoot will be at the Armory on Wednesday evening, Jan. 7.

Truman Pardons Pair Sentenced For Contempt

SEATTLE (U) — A presidential pardon was announced Wednesday for two agents of the Central Intelligence Agency who were sentenced for contempt of court for refusing to testify in a federal court case.

The agents, Wayne Richardson and Miller Holland of Seattle, refused on orders of their superiors to testify in the trial of Harry A. Jarvinen, Seattle travel agent accused of giving a false tip that Owen Lattimore, Far Eastern expert, was planning a trip to Russia. Jarvinen was acquitted.

George Stuntz, attorney for one of the agents, said President Truman granted a full pardon for them on December 18.

The two agents were sentenced by U. S. District Judge William J. Lindberg to serve 15 days in jail on the contempt charge. An appeal was announced, delaying carrying out the sentence.

In sentencing Richardson and Holland last September Judge Lindberg said the government with one hand had instituted a prosecution

Seattle U. Hoop Squad Favored Over Georgetown

BOSTON (U) — Seattle University's Chieftains — led by collegiate basketball champion Johnny O'Brien — are favored to whip Georgetown's Hoyas Monday night in the opening clash of the second annual Boston Invitation hoop tournament at the Arena.

The nightcap matches Rhode Island and Boston College, with the winners and losers meeting Tuesday night in championship and consolation finals.

Seattle's record now is 8-1 after Saturday night's 90-77 triumph over St. Joseph's College in Philadelphia. The Georgetown quintet is undefeated in three games.

The 22-year-old Johnny O'Brien threw in 26 points against St. Joseph's to crack the four-year scoring mark of 2,582 set by Nate Delong a few years ago for River Falls, Wis., State Teachers.

Little 5-9 Johnny O. holds the record with 2,618 points and is shooting for 2,900 points before he ends his collegiate career. He has 22 regular season contests remaining.

Johnny has clicked off 232 points in nine games this season and teamed with his talented twin Eddie O'Brien for a 62-point total as the Chieftains edged New York University 102-101 last week in New York's Madison Square Garden.

In that thriller Johnny tallied 29 markers while brother Eddie capped scoring honors with 33. Against St. Joseph's Saturday night, Eddie tossed in 21 to Johnny's 28.

Georgetown, under new Coach Buddy Jeannette, former pilot of the Baltimore cub in the National Basketball Association, hasn't been pressed so far this season except by Loyola of Baltimore, which the Hoyas edged 68-66.

Five Hoop Tournaments Get Underway Over U.S. Today

This is tournament week in college basketball and it behooves the mighty to look to their laurels.

Three tournaments opened over the weekend and in one of them—the Holiday Festival at New York's Madison Square Garden—No. 1 ranked LaSalle of Philadelphia bowed out in the first round.

Five more tournaments got underway Monday with five of the nation's first 10 bidding for top honors. Another member of the select group—fifth ranked Kansas State—already is in the semi-final bracket of the Big Seven tournament at Kansas City.

North Carolina State, No. 6 nationally, is the host club in the Dixie Tournament at Raleigh, N. C., which includes such teams as unbeaten Holy Cross, No. 4, Brigham Young of the Skyline Conference, and Princeton and Penn. of the Ivy League.

Louisiana State, No. 8, plays in the Sugar Bowl tourney where undefeated St. Bonaventure is the choice over the Southeastern Conference five, Villanova and St. Louis.

The once-beaten Oklahoma Ag-

gies and Western Kentucky, No. 9 and 10, respectively, show their brands of ball in the tournament at Oklahoma City along with Tulsa winner of seven straight, Wyoming, Oklahoma City, the defending champion, also with a perfect record, Bowling Green, Idaho and Penn. State.

Here's the status of the major tournaments which started over the weekend:

Madison Square Garden — DePaul, 63-61 conqueror of LaSalle, vs unbeaten Manhattan and Utah State vs Miami of Ohio in semi-final round. Manhattan trounced Cincinnati, 75-60; Utah State beat NYU, 67-61, and Miami edged St. Johns, 68-65.

Big Seven — Yale, victor by a 56-54 margin over Colorado, vs Kansas State and Kansas vs Missouri in semi-final round. State moved into the semi-final bracket by walloping Oklahoma 93-69. Kansas and Missouri reached the same stage of the tourney on Friday night.

Alabama, Syracuse Back On Practice Field

MIAMI, Fla. (U) — Alabama and Syracuse, who meet in the Orange Bowl football game New Year's Day, return to the practice field Monday after a Sunday layoff but neither team plans contact work.

Alabama's Coach Red Drew changed his mind about having a scrimmage and said he believes his team has had enough rough work.

Syracuse Coach Floyd Scharzwald, who said he'd like cooler weather so he could use some of his men on both offense and defense, had his wish granted — on Monday, at least. The weatherman said highest temperature during the afternoon would be about 70 degrees.

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
