(Continued from Page One) tion order, on charges that he entered the U. S. on a Portuguese passport obtained through fraud, was reversed by the Board of Immigration Appeals.

On the current deportation order, he has exhausted all his appeals within the immigration service and Justice Department. He still can go to the courts, however.

Sentence Served He has served a 2 1/2-year federal sentence for draft dodging, imposed in 1947. A few years ago he was tried and acquitted in Federal Court in New York on charges of violating the Securities and Exchange Act.

In his financial dealings, Rubinstein put to use the advice his father, Dmitri, had given him, as an observant youngster in the days before the Russian Revolution. The young Rubinstein had his first real "experience" with securities during the family flight from Russia— they were seen in the lining of his clothing to hide them from border guards.

"With the salary situation as it is," Carter said, "it's almost impossible for a deputy to stay unless his wife is also working. You can't build up a good police department with a continuous turnover of deputies. I think the salaries should be attractive enough so that good men can be retained. As it is, we just get a man trained so that he knows the county and then because of finances he has to go."

Carter says he has no particular plans for the future — he'll wait and see what comes up.

Truman Budget Shows Reduction In Spending

(Continued from Page One) to social security funds.

In calculating the "budget deficit," all social security tax collections are charged against the Treasury and credits entered to the accounts of social security trust funds.

However, the actual cash remains in the Treasury except for such social security payments as are made from it.

Since social security payments are far less than social security tax collections, the difference means a "cash deficit" lower than the "budget deficit."

Defense Outgo Reduced The Truman administration source said defense spending this fiscal year will not exceed 47 to 48 billion dollars, instead of the presently estimated 51 billions, and that total government outgo will be around 75 billions, instead of 79 billions.

He said that in the new budget, Truman will place defense expenditures for fiscal 1954 at approximately 51 billion dollars, including money already voted by Congress, and will ask for new defense appropriations of about 41 billions.

These figures do not include atomic energy expenditures, or money for construction of bases and replacement of material losses in Korea.

Thus, Truman would be recommending defense spending in fiscal 1954 of approximately three to four billion dollars more than the source estimated it will run in the current fiscal year.

Angler Asks Damages For Coos Bay Boat Upset

PORTLAND — A Los Angeles lumberman, aboard a sports fishing boat which capsized on the Coos Bay bar last August, sued Monday in Federal Court asking \$6,175 damages from the boat's owner.

Richard I. Schiller of Los Angeles is the plaintiff. He names Sportsman's Dock, Inc., of Coos Bay as the owner of the Virgeo, the boat which capsized. In his complaint he says he was injured by floating debris.

The suit stems from a mishap that put seven occupants of the boat into the water. All were picked up. All passengers but Schiller were Coos Bay-Empire area lumbermen.

Vibrations Fail To Rout Otter At Bonneville

PORTLAND — Three otter turned the fish collection system at Bonneville Dam into a snack bar over the weekend.

Donaldson, fish biologist for the Corps of Engineers at the dam, gave this report Monday of the goings-on: Friday the fishway operator, Gene Lovell, looked down from the level where he was working and saw about 40 feet below him, what appeared to be a 14-inch snoutfish moving along a wooden float on which workmen stand at times.

Then he saw that the fish was being pushed by an otter. Soon, his report went on, a second otter appeared on the float and brought up a sucker. The two other, each 24 to 30 inches long, then ate their fish.

Sunday the two otter showed up again, and with them was a small er otter, Lovell said. Donaldson said this was the first time that otter had ever been seen in the powerhouse, and the unusual aspect, he said, was their bravery in venturing in despite an "ominous vibration."

At the point where they swim in, at the lower side of the powerhouse, the fishway water runs directly above the point where water is discharged after going through the turbines. The vibration when under water there, has a frightening effect, Donaldson said.

From the fishway, fish go upstream either through the special fish locks inside the powerhouse or by way of a fish ladder. The Donaldson surmises, swam outside again through one of the many openings in the lower face of the powerhouse.

Loosley also mentioned the possibility of including some business property to the south of the present city limits in the sewer district. The property includes Neilson's Market and Pierce Auto Freight Terminal and other businesses on Highway 95.

That area, Loosley said, could be provided with sewers for an additional \$8,500 and has a valuation of \$50,770.

Other Matters Disposed Of In other action last night, the council: 1. Referred to the city manager and the street committee a request of L. B. Hicks to construct a driveway for parking purposes wider than permitted under existing ordinances. The location would be at Harvard and Balfr streets, in connection with construction of a business building.

2. Granted waiver of bond for new business—the "I.M.O. Store" at 501 N. Jackson—to Water Well-enbrock.

3. Granted liquor license renewals to the Shallman, the Idle Hour Tavern, the Loyal Order of Moose and Fairhaven Market.

4. Passed an ordinance providing for assessments for Chapman Street improvement.

5. Passed an ordinance providing for the one-way street grid City Attorney Paul Geddes said the measure was necessary to "make everything legal," and to provide penalties for violations of the new one-way system. The penalties, in line with penalties for other traffic violations, provide for maximum fines of \$100 and 30 days in jail for the first violation, and \$200 and 50 days for the second.

The present council will meet again Jan. 5 to clean up miscellaneous material and to seat new members and the new mayor.

Mother's Love Doubted, Alleged Firebug Says

BALTIMORE — A man who said he thought his mother didn't care for him is accused of burglarizing her home and setting it on fire on Christmas Day.

Dallas C. Cullison Jr., 26, pleaded innocent to the charges at a police court hearing and was ordered held for the grand jury without bail.

"I might have set the fires in a fit of temper because I didn't think my mother cared for me," Cullison told the magistrate.

'Silent Night' Remark Causes Ban From TV

NEW YORK — Playwright George S. Kaufman has been dropped from the CBS television program "This Is Show Business" because he remarked: "Let's make this one program on which no one sings 'Silent Night.'"

He made the remark on the Dec. 21 show. "This was not wittingly an anti-religious remark," Kaufman said. "I was merely speaking out against the use and overuse of this Christmas carol in connection with the sale of commercial products."

Attempted Test Of TV Fatal To Albany Man

ALBANY, Ore. — An attempt to test television reception in a suburban area here killed Everett Schlegel, 30, Albany, Monday.

An employee of a music company here, he was elevating a test antenna in the Oak Grove Acres suburb when it touched a 12,000-volt power line.

Schlegel was killed at once. Another employe on the truck with him, Richard Lindley, suffered burns. Lindley was hospitalized, but was not in serious condition.
