

Oregon State Hits Stanford Men, 58-46

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Oregon State Beavers came from behind with a fourth-quarter surge Monday night to gain a 58-46 basketball decision over the Stanford Indians.

Center Tony Vlastelica put the Beavers ahead 36-35 on a free throw with one minute remaining in the third quarter and from then on the game was all OSC's.

Stanford's tight zone defense had stymied the Beavers in the first two quarters and the half ended with the Indians ahead 23-21. OSC was held to only four points in the second period while Stanford tallied 13.

Oregon State's Ron Robbins was high scorer with 15 points.

The kings-x game featuring the two Pacific Coast Conference teams was played in the Cow Palace.

Wis. Mentor Gives SC Edge

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The man who will guide Wisconsin into the Rose Bowl New Year's Day, Coach Ivan B. (Ivy) Williamson, said Tuesday he thinks the Trojans of Southern California rate the edge accorded them by the experts in pre-game calculations.

Southern California's coach, Jess Hill, sticks to another view. He feels this clash between the champions of the Big Ten and his Coast Conference titleholders is "strictly even."

Williamson bases his belief mainly on the ground that "USC has a more impressive record than we have"—nine straight victories, including such victims as Northwestern, Army, California and UCLA, and one defeat, to Notre Dame, in the season's windup.

"And," Williamson continued, "the possible absence of our left halfback, Harland Carl, makes a definite difference."

Thus far, Southern California has had no casualties on its offensive platoon. Hill's main worry has been mending the hole in his defensive secondary occasioned by the loss of halfback Jim Psaltis through an ineligible ruling by the Coast Conference.

ADELAIDE, Australia (AP)—America's Davis Cup debacle became complete today when Vic Seixas and Tony Trabert collapsed under the fierce pressure applied by Ken McGregor and Frank Sedgman and lost the deciding doubles match by scores of 6-3, 6-4, 1-6, 6-4.

The blistering defeat will go down as one of the most one-sided in cup history.

Numerous times in the past teams have dropped the first three matches in the Challenge Round but research fails to uncover when one side was able to win only one set in two days.

Seixas and Trabert really never had a chance against the brilliant Aussie pair today. From the moment Trabert dropped his opening service to give the Aussies a 3-0 jump it was completely obvious to the capacity crowd of over 15,000 that they were sitting in for a slaughter.

For the second straight day McGregor probably the most brilliant tennis of his career, he so dominated the court that there was no place for the Americans to go but out.

Santa Clara Quits Ranks Of Intercollegiate Ball

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) — The University of Santa Clara, once a national football power, has quit intercollegiate football because it cost too much.

Officials of the Jesuit school, last of the Pacific Coast's Catholic Colleges to succumb to the financial strain, said the school lost about \$80,000 this season on the sport and \$72,000 in 1951.

Santa Clara's president, the Rev. Herman J. Hauck, S. J., said Tuesday the move was made regretfully "in deference to the general economic welfare of the university."

The Broncos had scheduled eight games for 1953, including Stanford, Texas, Rice, California, Miami, Idaho, San Jose State and College of the Pacific.

Santa Clara's head coach, Dick Gallagher, had resigned last month to rejoin the professional Cleveland Browns as scout. Three assistant coaches now lose jobs.

The university has fielded football teams since 1902, except in world wars. It went twice to the Sugar Bowl, in 1937 and '38, and upset Kentucky 21-13 in Miami's Orange Bowl in 1950.
