Woman Charged With Beating, Starving Boy

YREKA, Calif. (AP)—Miriam Zumwalt, 39-year-old boarding school operator charged with starving and beating a 9-year-old boy, faces two additional counts of mistreating children.

Miss Zumwalt, who has been free on \$1,000 bail since her arrest a week ago for allegedly starving Gary Glover of Grants Pass, Ore., and whipping him with a coat hanger, was named on the new counts at her preliminary hearing in Yreka justice court Friday.

District Attorney Floyd Merrill amended the original complaint to accuse her of similarly mistreating Bobbie Grand, 8, and Floyd Brewer, 9, like Glover students at Miss Zumwalt's boarding school at nearby Etna.

tribute anything to easing world tensions.

Stalin said recently in a statement to The New York Times that he was agreeable to a meeting with Eisenhower, and British spokesmen have indicated the possibility of such a meeting would be discussed by Eisenhower and Churchill.

Churchill appeared pale as he sat before the packed room of reporters, his eyes blinking against occasional flares of camera flash bulbs.

He said there was "nothing extraordinary" in his meeting—probably Tuesday—with Eisenhower. He said he had met Eisenhower perhaps 100 times during World War II.

"And even though this may be our 101st meeting," he said, "it doesn't follow that anything should go wrong any more than at any of the previous meetings."

Rubinstein Wins Delay In Deportation Battle
WASHINGTON (AP)—Serge Rubinstein, Russian-born financier fighting deportation, Monday won a fresh court order barring his arrest and detention at Ellis Island.

The U. S. Court of Appeals directed that the order remain in effect pending a decision in U. S. District Court on Rubinstein's application for an injunction against deportation.

Rubinstein has been fighting moves to deport him for almost 10 years. He won the first round, based on an allegation that he entered the United States from Canada in 1938 on a fraudulent Portuguese passport.

The present proceeding grew out of his 1947 conviction on draft-dodging charges.

High School Girl Kills Herself, Blaming TV
TACOMA (AP)—Blaming her troubles on television, a 16-year-old high school girl ended her life Sunday afternoon with a single shot from a .22 rifle, according to police reports.

Continuous "blasting" of her parents' set, she claimed in a farewell note, kept her from her studies and "made my head hurt."

The girl victim, Leona L. Schaffer, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Schaffer, was dressed in green pajamas and lying across her bed, when discovered by her mother.

Ex-Senate Aide Admits Guilt In Loans Scandal
WASHINGTON (AP)—Charles E. Shaver, former general counsel of the Senate Small Business Committee, pleaded guilty Monday to accepting money from three firms seeking Reconstruction Finance Corporation loans.

Leonard H. Cooper, a Miami, Fla., businessman, pleaded guilty in connection with the same case. Cooper admitted inducing Shaver to accept the money.

salary of \$15,000 a year. Dodge as budget director will be paid \$17,500. All four are Republicans.

An aide to Eisenhower said his request that Dodge sit in at Cabinet meetings was the tip off that the President-elect wants the new budget director to have a free hand in shaping fiscal policy for the new administration.

Eisenhower reportedly feels that under the Truman administration the budget chief has been only a sort of super-accountant with little policy-making authority.

COLLEGE HEAD DIES
LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP)—Dr. Frank Leroy McVey, 83, president emeritus of the University of Kentucky, died in Good Samaritan Hospital Sunday.

A native of Wilmington, O., Dr. McVey was president of the university from 1917 to 1940. He was a former president of the University of North Dakota.
