Testimony In Staggs Trial Begins Today

the two for 10 to 15 minutes, the Eppersons testified.

A girl in the bar then told Estrada he'd have to behave or get out, the elder Epperson testified.

"I said (to Staggs) let's go home and get out of this," he (Staggs) was trembling. "Tears were on his cheeks."

The Eppersons and Rheta testified they left the tavern.

"Ex went to the car," Rheta said. "The door (to the tavern) hadn't quite shut completely. Then he (Estrada) was outside," she related.

"Pop" Epperson stated Estrada said, "Okay, we'll forget about it. Come on in and have a beer." But nobody made a move.

Then, "He (Estrada) made a run for Staggs. I grabbed for him," Epperson said. His son testified that he didn't see Estrada run toward the car Staggs was said to be entering.

"He grabbed me out of the way, shook Epperson off and headed for Estrada," Rheta testified. She said she saw Estrada strike at Staggs "about four times."

"Estrada hollered and said, 'to go back. I'll go home' as Estrada was coming for him," Pop Rheta said. Staggs ran to the back heard Staggs say, "leave me alone."

The Eppersons said they ran to the two and separated them. "In the scuffle 'Fuzzy' fell," the elder Epperson said. "I helped him up. I said 'Look Fuzzy, blood.' He (Estrada) grabbed his side and just rolled around."

Rheta said Staggs ran to the back from Estrada. "I didn't have to use force. It was closed," Rheta testified. "I kept it until Estrada asked for it (on the way into town)," she said.

Donald Epperson in the meantime was hurrying Estrada to a local hospital, but he was dead on arrival, Epperson said.

The defense was continuing cross examination of Rheta Smith at press-time.

GADSDEN, Ala. (AP) — The fatal shooting of a white farmer by an elderly Negro has been ruled justifiable homicide.

Coroner W. W. "Red" Morris handed down the verdict yesterday in the shooting of Johnny Dobbins of Boa by Will Veasey, 70-year-old Negro, Sunday night at the Negro's home in East Gadsden.

Reckless Drivers' Light Penalties Arouse Concern

Oregon courts fined reckless drivers, arrested by state police, an average of \$40.31 and sentenced them to an average of four days in jail during November, the secretary of state's traffic safety division reported Friday.

The November average fine was slightly below 1951's \$44 average for reckless driving, but the jail sentence inflicted was up from three to four days.

The office also reported that convictions for violation of the basic rule totaled 379, resulting in an average fine of \$11.09. The 379 convicted drivers were sentenced to a total of eight days in jail.

Driving while intoxicated cost drivers the most cash during the month. Seventy-three convicted on this charge paid an average fine of \$207.15. Jail sentences averaged 16 days.

The safety division expressed concern at the seemingly light fines and sentences inflicted on reckless drivers. This, the division said, is the one traffic offense which takes into consideration a driver's "willful and wanton disregard" for the safety of others, yet the average fine for November and all of 1951 was only slightly above the minimum permitted by law, and the average jail sentence was below the minimum.

Oregon law says a driver can be fined a minimum of \$25 and a maximum of \$500 for reckless driving, and can be sentenced a minimum of five days to a maximum 90 days in jail. Subsequent conviction on this charge can bring a fine as high as \$1,000 and 6 months in jail.

In releasing the figures, the division pointed to the need for making drivers realize the seriousness of a traffic violation, and suggested stiffer fines and sentences might impress erring drivers with the need for more care behind the wheel.

which he expects the GOP to rally later — a measure seeking to discourage racial discrimination in employment without providing for criminal prosecution of offenders. Its details have not been made public.

In that connection, Rep. Sam Rayburn of Texas, dean of all Democrats in Congress, said yesterday he expects that any civil rights program which Eisenhower proposes will help unite the Democrats.

"Some Democrats who hated President Roosevelt and Truman because of their civil rights proposals will now start hating President Eisenhower for the same reason," Rayburn said in an interview on the eve of his 71st birthday today.

Rayburn, speaker of the House in the last session, said he thinks his party will be more united as a minority than it was during the nearly 20 years it ruled the government.

Telephone Books Distributed In Roseburg Area

Mail delivery of the new green-covered January 1953 telephone directory for Roseburg and vicinity was started Monday.

Copies of the new book, which totals 245 pages and is the largest ever distributed in this area, will be in the hands of all customers by Wednesday, according to Pacific Telephone Manager Jack McGuire.

Larger by 51 pages than the last edition, the new directory shows an increase of three pages in the white alphabetical section and 48 pages in the yellow classified section.

The increase in the number of yellow advertising pages in the directory, representing the largest gain of any telephone book in Oregon, serves as a yard stick for measuring business progress in this community, McGuire said.

As always, the many changes and additions since the last issue make it advisable for telephone users to check listings in the up-to-date directory before making calls. Also, customers are reminded by McGuire to shake out their old books before discarding them to be sure no valuables are rested between the pages.

From 14,250 copies of this year's total printing, 9,100 books are being distributed initially. The balance are for use throughout the year. In addition, 2000 copies of just the alphabetical section have been produced for users in connecting company exchanges.

Size of the directory production job is indicated by the fact that 215 pounds of ink and better than 8200 pounds of paper were used in getting out this year's record addition.

'Hell To Pop' If Ike Commits U. S., Dirksen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Dirksen (R-Ill.) predicted today that "hell will pop" in Congress if any proposal for U.S. support of British currency comes out of the Eisenhower-Churchill conference.

Dirksen told a reporter he does not believe President-elect Eisenhower made any commitments in his conversations with Prime Minister Winston Churchill yesterday.

"Nevertheless," the Illinois senator said, "I shall be interested to see whether Mr. Churchill subsequently makes any proposal for a gift of American gold to support the convertibility of Britain's currency."

"If anything of that nature comes up, hell will pop in Congress, I'm sure."

Eisenhower and Churchill met twice after Prime Minister's arrival from England aboard the liner Queen Mary yesterday morning.

Eisenhower called first at the Bruch home on the way from his Commodore Hotel headquarters to his Columbia University residence. That session started a few minutes after 5 p.m. and lasted an hour and three-quarters.

The general then went home, changed to dinner clothes and was back at 8 p.m. to dine with Churchill, Baruch and a few others. That get-together lasted three hours.
