Appeals Scheduled For 2 Oregon Slayers

SALEM (AP) — Attorneys for the two men scheduled to die in the state prison on Friday will appeal to Gov. Paul L. Patterson to commute their sentences to life imprisonment.

The men are Morris Leland, 26, convicted of slaying a 15-year-old girl in Portland; and Frank O. Payne, 50, who killed a Portland grocer in a holdup. Neither has denied his guilt, and both used insanity as a defense.

Six Killed In Cuban Police, Gangster Fight

HAVANA, Cuba (AP) — Police said six men, including a Cuban military intelligence officer, were killed Tuesday in gun battles between police and "various persons on the wanted list."

Authorities said the shooting occurred when police attempted to round up known criminals. They said their raids had no anti-revolutionary significance.
