only to reduce property taxes. Election Reforms. These include proposals to make it harder to put measures on the ballot, to have ballot titles on election measures written more clearly, to provide more rigid controls over campaign spending, and to make candidates for delegates to the national party conventions sign pledges to support the winner of the state presidential primary.

Many Smaller Jobs

While those are the big jobs, there will be many smaller ones. The Joint Ways and Means Committee will try to prune the governor's budget for the next two-year budget period. It will try to find money for new state college and institution buildings. These building requests total 20 millions, and are not included in the governor's budget.

As usual, there will be a fight over fishing and hunting laws. The two main bills in this class would transfer game law enforcement from the state police to the game commission, and give the governor power to postpone hunting seasons in the event of forest fire hazards.

Labor will want bigger unemployment compensation payments, and employers will ask for lower payroll taxes.

Patterson Submits New Balanced Budget

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Gov. Patterson recommended that the state's complicated tax system be simplified by allowing direct spending of income tax receipts.

Income tax receipts now can be used only to reduce property taxes, and there hasn't had to be a state property levy since 1940. The Legislative Interim Tax Committee will introduce a bill to accomplish this.

Variety Methods Of Dealing With Strikes Proposed

WASHINGTON (U. S. Rep. McConnell (R-Pa.) said today he favors legislating a variety of alternative methods for dealing with national emergency strikes to make it easier to deal with them. The new chairman of the House Labor Committee said in an interview that if unions and management are kept guessing over which technique might be employed by the government, that in itself would spur the parties to greater effort toward a settlement.

"If they don't know what might happen to them, there's more of a tendency for them to settle their own troubles," McConnell said. "I think the idea is fundamentally sound. No one yet has come up with a sure answer to handling these big strikes. And I think we should encourage the participants of these labor-management disputes to try to work out their own problems wherever possible."

"Leaving the situation flexible to meet the varying conditions of each case would provide more leeway for the interplay of human relations and might thus bring on more settlements and fewer strikes."

Important Highway Projects Up For Bid

ton Streets on the present Pacific Highway.

One of the major contracts to be let after the bid opening is the grading of a 4.96-mile strip from Deady to Winchester, starting about eight miles north of Roseburg.

Other projects docketed for the January bid openings are:

Production of 10,000 cubic yards of crushed rock on Endicott Creek. Mystic Creek rock production project on Coos Bay-Roseburg highway 20 miles east of Coquille.

Grading of 6.86 miles of Elkhead Road-Rice Hill unit of Pacific Highway east of Yoncalla.

And construction of two concrete viaducts on Elkhead Road-Rice Hill unit east of Yoncalla.

Two Units Remain

With these strips under contract, only two units will remain to be bid on the \$5,580,000 project from Deady to Shady Point.

The local Commission office reports that one of these strips from the Fairgrounds to Shady Point on the South Umpqua near the Green Lumber Co., should be ready for bids in the near future.

The second strip to complete the connection stretches from Winchester to the South Umpqua. The local office reports action on this section is being held up because of "rights-of-way difficulties." Predictions are that this section, too, will soon be ready for contract.

Additional bids which are to be called before June 30 will raise the projects inaugurated in the County to 11 during the first half of 1953. Money involved in these 11 immediate contracts will total \$3,672,000.

Other projects mentioned for contract bid openings in the initial half of 1953 are:

Grading and paving of the Elkhead Road section (south unit) of the Oregon Coast Highway.

Structuring of Deady-Winchester unit; Structuring of Elkhead Road-Rice Hill unit; Paving of a portion of the Pacific Highway on the Anlauf-Elkhead Road section; Grading and paving of the Sutherland section of the Elkton-Sutherland highway.

Swedish Tanker Breaks In Half

SAN FRANCISCO (U. S. A) — A Swedish tanker with a crew of 40 broke in half Thursday and three cargo vessels were in distress as 50 to 70 mile an hour winds whipped the normally calm Pacific into fury. The Swedish tanker, S.S. Avanti, sent an SOS reporting crisisly: "Ship broke in two. Eleven men on back part saved. Eight men on front part and 21 men on lifeboat still drifting. If any ships nearby please give help."

The British freighter King Edgar and the Panamanian freighter Santadespo both were reported out of control and drifting helplessly in the North Central Pacific.

A coastal lumber schooner, Cynthia Olson, jettisoned her deck cargo off Oregon and slowly made for San Francisco after earlier asking assistance.
