Columbia River Reclamation Cost Nears Half Billion

WASHINGTON (AP) — The \$21,600,000 appropriation asked by the Bureau of Reclamation for the Columbia Basin project in the year beginning July 1 would bring the outlay for the huge reclamation undertaking close to the half-billion dollar mark.

In statements accompanying its request, the Bureau estimated overall cost of the basin project at \$737,650,000. It said \$483,879,819 of this already has been available.

The Basin request, as usual in recent years, accounted for the bulk of construction funds which the Bureau proposes to spend in Oregon and Washington in the next year.

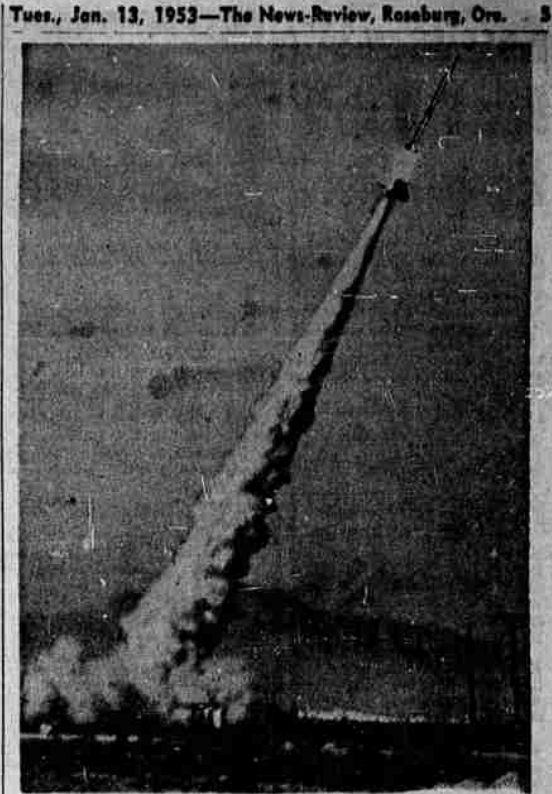
The total Northwest proposals run to \$7,720,594, including four million dollars for the Yakima project's Kennewick division; \$335,000 for the Klamath project in Oregon-California; and \$893,000 to start building the power plant of the Yakima's Roza division.

STREAKING FOR THE STRATOSPHERE—Leaving the earth, to attain speed of more than 1500 miles per hour, this "GAPA" (Ground to Air Pilotless Aircraft) will be tracked by radar, theodolite cameras and special radio instruments. It is some of more than 100 such missiles built by Boeing Aircraft for the U. S. Air Force to explore new type defenses against possible bomber attacks. The missiles were fired at Alamogordo, N. M., in a program that started in 1945 and ended in 1949. They provided valuable knowledge now being utilized by Boeing in a new advanced missile program. Official Impersonator In Grand Jury's Hands

SEATTLE (AP) — John E. Thomas, 42, charged with impersonating a federal official in attempting to delay the execution of Utah and Turman Wilson last week, was bound over to a federal grand jury Friday.

Thomas, a Seattle furniture dealer, is charged with sending a fake telegram bearing a name similar to that of Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) to the Washington State penitentiary shortly before the Wilsons were hanged for the 1950 murder of JoAnn Dewey at Vancouver. The telegram was received by prison warden John Cranor a few minutes after the Wilson brothers were pronounced dead.

The telegram caused a flurry of excitement at the prison until it was learned Magnuson was not the author.

SCOTCH RAISE REINDEER

NEW YORK (AP) — Scotland is raising its own reindeer in the hope of supplementing its food supply, reports the British Information Service here. The experiment was started this year with eight reindeer living off the sparsely vegetated moors of Northern Scotland, where other cattle would perish.

The herd, three of whom have died, is expected to increase the milk and meat supply. Ten more Norwegian reindeer are to be imported, the report said.
