LIFE OF HERSHEY GIVEN BY DR. S. L. DELAPP AT TOASTMASTERS MEETING

"The dreams, the fancies and the ambitions of childhood sometimes make deep and lasting impressions."

"While the battle of Gettysburg was being fought, a poor Mennonite family was moving from a Pennsylvania farm, on which the father had failed, to a smaller farm. Their little son of seven was sad and heart sick. He loved the old farm on which he was born and he didn't want to leave it. He didn't understand the financial reason for moving and to him it seemed a serious and an unjust punishment to fall on a little boy."

"His mother heard him say, as he kicked up the dust with his bare feet behind the wagon in which they were moving away, 'I betcha when I am a man and I get a million trillion dollars, I'll take care of little boys.'"

When Milton Hershey died in 1945, he had used all his savings, \$80,000,000 to take care of little boys. And in the life history of Milton Hershey lies one of the most heartwarming and amazing American stories of success against hardship together with unselfish philanthropy in all history of this country.

Did the name Hershey remind you of something? But perhaps you didn't know that each time you invested in a Hershey bar you were helping to support the Hershey Industrial School for Orphan Boys, the largest orphanage in America.

When Hershey died all his money was in the hands of the super orphanage he had created.

The model town of Hershey was built for the orphans it serves. It has its own housing units, stores, shops, bank, theaters, gardens, school system, swimming pool, athletic fields, hospital and churches.

These orphan boys live in cottages cared for by a house-mother for each group. Very effort is made to create homelike surroundings. They are given tests to determine what career each is fitted for. All learn farming and a trade. The more brilliant ones are given opportunity for further schooling.

They receive pocket-money and are taught thrift with American emphasis on sports and recreation. When they graduate each is given an outfit of new clothes and \$100. In cash. At the age of 18 they start out in life.

This school started in 1910 with 4 orphan boys. When Hershey died in 1945 more than 1200 boys were admitted that year.

Hershey and his wife, though fond of children, had none of their own. They found recompense in lavishing their affection, their time and their means on orphan boys. Like all good parents, the Hersheys have made their children their heirs and the number of

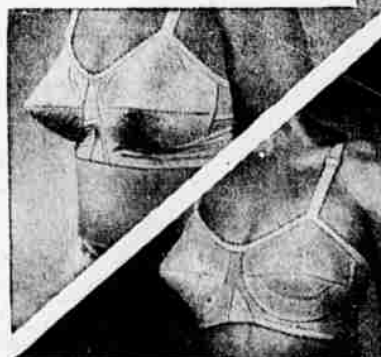
