that the American delegation called off the peace talks until the Communist delegation could come up with definite answers.

During the 18 months of the peace talks, Gros said, the Communist forces doubled both in manpower and air strength.

"We should set a time limit," he said on any further talks. "If nothing is decided then, we should get on with the business of the war."

The talented speaker named two possibilities in the Far East. Without details, he stated one as an action to end the war soon and the other as the present war of "attrition" which may last 10 or 20 years.

"It will get worse before it gets better," Gros warned sternly. Immediate action to end the war will incur "infinite risks and astronomical costs." But the war of attrition will be even costlier "without hope of victory," were Gros' alternatives.

Gros berated the present administration for failing to use the Chinese nationalists on Taiwan (Formosa). Of the nationalists, he said, "I have never seen a more dedicated people." He stated that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek has offered to put 40,000 troops on the front lines of Korea, but we have refused. The reason for the refusal, he scoffed, is because "we are afraid it would infuriate the Chinese Communists."

Law Proposals Would Affect Libel, Paternity

SALEM (AP) — A single publication act restricting libel or slander actions and a uniform blood test act to make paternity determination foolproof might be before the Oregon Legislature next week.

James Deszendorff, Portland attorney and member of the Commission on Uniform State Laws, outlined provisions of the two proposed measures at a joint meeting of the House Statute Revision Committee and the Senate Law Committee.

Under the single publication act, any newspaper, magazine or motion picture that has wide distribution could not be subjected to multiple damage suits resulting from alleged libelous material.

Actions would have to be started at the point of original publication, and involve only a single copy of the offending issue.

Laws now permit suits to be brought wherever a copy of the alleged libel is found.

night for the inauguration, and will come back next Wednesday night.

Gov. Patterson's No. 1 recommendation—to call a convention to write a new Constitution—is being considered by committees in both houses.

The Joint Ways and Means Committee, which writes all the appropriation bills, is working this week on a bill to finish its big job in 60 days.

The tax committees, also, have started, with the House Tax Committee working over the main tax bill. It would put all income tax revenues in the state general fund, instead of complicating things by using them to reduce state property taxes.

This bill, which applies only to counties having two or more senators or representatives, would make it easier for voters to elect their legislators, because each voter would have to vote only for one senator and one representative.

In Multnomah County, each voter has to vote for 13 representatives and five senators at one election.

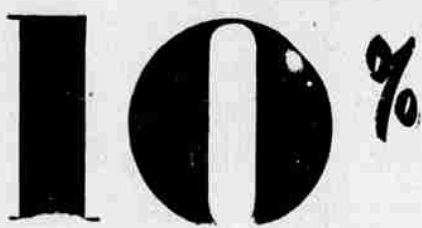
