

Junior College, Cigaretts Talked By Deller, Citizens

City School Superintendent M. C. Deller was bombarded by questions ranging from "Will Roseburg ever have a junior college?" to "What about the smoking problem at the Junior High?" at a coffee hour with PTA, dad's club and community club presidents Friday morning.

Deller said the coffee hour — the first of its kind here — was held to discuss District 4's problems directly with the citizens rather than through school principals.

On the junior college, Deller said he didn't foresee one within the next eight or nine years. The question hasn't been studied, he said, but it depends on the wishes of the people.

To Study Problem

The superintendent said he would make a study of the smoking problem at the Junior High, which was brought to his attention at the meeting.

He brought out the fact that some parents have no objection to children buying cigarettes. It's probable that business firms are selling to underage children here, he said. He also cited the possibility that vending machines are not carefully enough supervised.

Among other things brought up by citizens attending the meeting was a question of discipline in one school and the foreign language program at the Senior High. It was the opinion of several, Deller said, that more languages should be offered.

Other Needs Discussed

Some of the other main problems discussed in the session were the Senior High curriculum and care of the cafeteria and parking needs at the school. Deller brought the people up to date on the status

of the District's building program and outlined future needs.

He pointed out to the group that District 4 is the fifth largest school district in the state.

The meeting was "very, very well accepted," Deller said. The group asked for another meeting and a date was tentatively set for Mar. 5. Nine men and women attended the meeting.

Dester Cooper, 49, Dies In Glendale

Dester Cooper, 49, of Glendale died Thursday at his home shortly after suffering a heart attack while at work at the Robert Dollar Lumber Co. He went home to rest but died before the doctor arrived, reports said.

Cooper was born Apr. 24, 1903, in Oneida, Tenn. He came to Glendale on May 23, 1941. He was married in March 1925, to Audi Bowden.

Surviving, besides his widow, are four sons, Dester Jr., Milford, Charles and Paul Dennis all Glendale; two daughters-in-law Mary and Louise, Glendale; two grandsons, Timmie and Steven, Glendale; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Cooper, Glendale; three brothers, Fred, Glendale, Ed, Medford and Howard, Tillamook; and five sisters, Mrs. Zellie Vance and Mrs. Virginia Jones, Glendale; Mrs. Dorothy Freytag, Medford; Mrs. Zonia Larson, Salt Lake City, and Mrs. Bonnie Pennycook, Oneida, Tenn.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday in the Glendale Presbyterian Church. Burial will follow in the Glendale Masonic Cemetery. Graveside services will be conducted by the Glendale Odd Fellows Lodge, of which Cooper was a member.

Morse Admits Introducing Bill Asked By Duke

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) said Saturday that Russell W. Duke represented some builders who requested him to introduce a bill in 1949 to enable them to recover war contract claims.

Duke, a Portland, Ore., public relations man, was questioned behind closed doors this week by a Senate investigations committee looking into alleged influence peddling.

Morse told a reporter he introduced the measure only after the Public Works Administration studied the case and drafted and recommended the legislation.

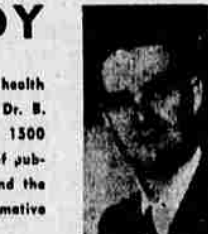
President Truman vetoed the bill, Morse said, on the ground that he did not know how many contractors might be affected and that it would set "a bad precedent."

Morse said he did "nothing wrong" in introducing the bill and added he would be glad to turn over any of his records relating to it to any congressional committee that wanted them.

Pimples, boils and carbuncles are quite common skin involvements often difficult to differentiate between in the early stages. Pimples and blackheads are both caused by inflammation around the glands of the skin which secrete oily material. The opening of the gland becomes plugged, thus retaining the oily secretion and causing the papule. If these glands are then invaded with the ordinary skin bacteria usually of the staphylococcus type, a pimple results. The bacterial invasion however is considered a secondary involvement.

Acne appears chiefly on the face, but often also seen on the ear, the back, shoulders, and chest. It is a disorder which is found mostly in young people of both sexes at about the age of puberty that accompanies the development of the secondary sex characteristics, which is the underlying causative factor. Some cases of acne are a result of ingestion of bromides or iodides or from blood infections, gastrointestinal disturbances, anemia and malnutrition.

Boils are the result of an inflammation which usually has its beginning in an infection of a hair-sac but may be indefinitely localized. A pustule usually surrounds the shaft of the hair, and the pus-infected boil develops. Boils are usually on the neck, armpits, face, buttocks and legs. The basic infection is caused by staphylococcal infection of the skin.

Carbuncles are similar to boils in cause and structure. It is, however, usually a much more serious matter, since it has a tendency

to spread at the sides and involve the deeper layers of the skin. It occurs most frequently on the neck, back, shoulders face and abdomen. Carbuncles are particularly dangerous when attacking the back of the neck, upper lip or anywhere on the face or scalp.

Carbuncles often begin as a pimple, with a chill and fever, but increases rapidly in size to form a hot, dusky red, rounded lump which may grow until it is three inches in diameter, some severe cases up to six inches in diameter. Occasionally it runs a mild course, remains small, begins to discharge at the end of a week, and heals rapidly. More commonly, there is pain of a burning, throbbing character, which soon becomes intense, and the carbuncle continues to enlarge for a week or ten days; then softens and breaks open at various points, discharging shreds of dead tissue and pus.

The skin over the whole top of the carbuncle dies and separates from the underlying matter, leaving an excavation or crater-like ulcer. This ulcer slowly heals from the edges and bottom, so that the entire period of healing takes from a week to two months or even six months.

Carbuncles differ from boils in their much larger size, in having rounded or flat tops instead of the conical shape of boils, in having numerous sieve-like openings, in the occurrence of death of the skin over the top of the carbuncle with more intense pain and fever accompanying the carbuncles. House members pulled the rug out from under President Truman's suggestion to ease Eisenhower's income taxes.

Chairman Reed R-N.Y. said the Ways and Means Committee voted in closed session to table the proposal. It called for a bill to allow the new President income tax deductions up to \$50,000 for special expenses, and incoming Vice President Nixon and House Speaker Martin R-Mass up to \$10,000.

Both chambers were out of session Saturday, the House until Monday, the Senate until Tuesday. Sen. Morse of Oregon, former Republican turned independent, made it clear that even if the Armed Services Committee approves Wilson's appointment, he may raise the issue in the Senate. The Oregon senator said he is "disturbed by the fact that as of last July 1 General Motors had \$2,300,000,000 of defense contracts and of Dec. 1 close to five billion dollars."

Not Wanted—Tony Accardo

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Chicago gangster Tony Accardo enjoyed an interlude today at a desert hotel outside the city limits, by invitation of the police.

Accardo, 46, reputed successor to the late Al Capone, and two companions, Michael Mancuso and Dr. Eugene J. Chesrow, flew into Los Angeles from Chicago early yesterday, and flew right out to Las Vegas, also by invitation of the police.

However, conflicting versions developed in Las Vegas. L. W. C. Hull of the intelligence squad told newsmen that he and his men met the trio and saw to it that they took the next plane to Las Vegas. But Capt. James E. Hamilton of the same squad said that the trio were simply "observed" upon arrival, watched as they drove to a Wilshire Boulevard restaurant with two local friends, then back to the airport, where they were interrogated.

Dulles, Kennan Split On Policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — An open break over policy toward Russia and its satellite countries developed Saturday between Secretary of State-designate John Foster Dulles and the State Department's top expert on Soviet relations, George F. Kennan.

Kennan is assigned as U.S. envoy to Moscow but has been unable to fill that post for many months. The Soviet government barred him after he publicly compared its isolation of foreigners in Moscow to the practices of the Nazis before World War Two.

The policy break has developed over Dulles' declared intention to use all sorts of peaceful measures — he has not specified precisely what he would do — for the promotion of the spirit of liberty in Soviet satellite countries and eventually the liberation of those countries.



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Nickel Mountain Project Gets Go-Ahead Signal

than two years of exploration by the Hanna company, which, until this time, has engaged exclusively in production of coal. The study was undertaken at the request of the federal government which is desirous of increasing the supply of nickel for defense uses. Contracts with the government run until June 30, 1962.

The Nickel Mountain deposits, largest known nickel ore beds in the United States, are of low grade and are intermingled with iron. Because of the low grade, commercial mining and smelting would not be profitable, it is claimed, except as an emergency defense measure, which accounts for the financial assistance being given by the federal government.

The bulk of the scheduled output, although sold to the government under prices specified by contract, actually will be delivered directly to the American steel industry through regular trade channels of the Hanna Coal and Ore Corporation.

Development and construction work, already well advanced in engineering, will start immediately, it is expected, and will furnish employment to large numbers of workers as the program advances.

Nurse Recruit Program Lags

Efforts by the County Civil Defense office to survey the nurse pool in Douglas County are lagging, according to a report from the Courthouse.

The CD office has issued an urgent request to all graduate nurses in the county to fill in and mail questionnaires sent them in December.

"This survey is essential to our preparedness effort, and to date, about 50 percent of the questionnaires have been returned to us," the office states. "In the event of a disaster, either national or local, we must have this information," it says.

The questionnaire was sent to all known graduate nurses in the county to form a survey of the resources. The questionnaire does not obligate the nurses, but determines willingness to serve and specializations involved. The information cards will be filed and used for reference in case of disaster.
