Bill Introduced To Dispose Of District Funds

State Senator Paul Geddes has introduced a bill in the Oregon Legislature to dispose of funds still credited to the Umpqua Highway Improvement District.

The district was created in 1921 to further construction of the North Umpqua Highway. Tax funds were collected for a few years and were spent in cooperation with the state and federal government.

The organization remained dormant for a number of years prior to 1949 when the legislature repealed the special highway district act.

District funds, under the law, were deposited with the state treasurer who still holds \$7,619.01 to the credit of the district, Senator Geddes reports. As the board has been dissolved, there is no way to disburse these funds without legislative authority.

The bill now before the legislature would require a showing that no indebtedness exists against the district, whereupon the state treasurer would be authorized to surrender the money he now holds to the general road fund of the county.

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Rep. Norblad Protests Japanese Lumber Deal

a sawmill, although the possibility of a pulp mill is being given long-range consideration.

Norblad, who said he wrote as a representative "from the great timber-producing state of Oregon," told Dulles:

Adequate Lumber Supply

"Certainly there is an adequate supply of lumber produced in the Northwest which is available for shipment to Japan and which has been shipped there over a period of years.

"With reference to pulp, we not only have major producers in the United States who are able to supply the Japanese markets, but American capital is currently investing 50 million dollars in a new pulp mill at Ketchikan to augment our present supplies."

Norblad said that although there was a severe lumber shortage several years ago, none exists at this time.

"Many small mills in Oregon are running on irregular schedules because of the lack of markets," he declared.

"If the proposed Japanese agreement is put into effect and this entire market withdrawn from our American producers, particularly in the Pacific Northwest, it would be very injurious to the economy of that part of the country."

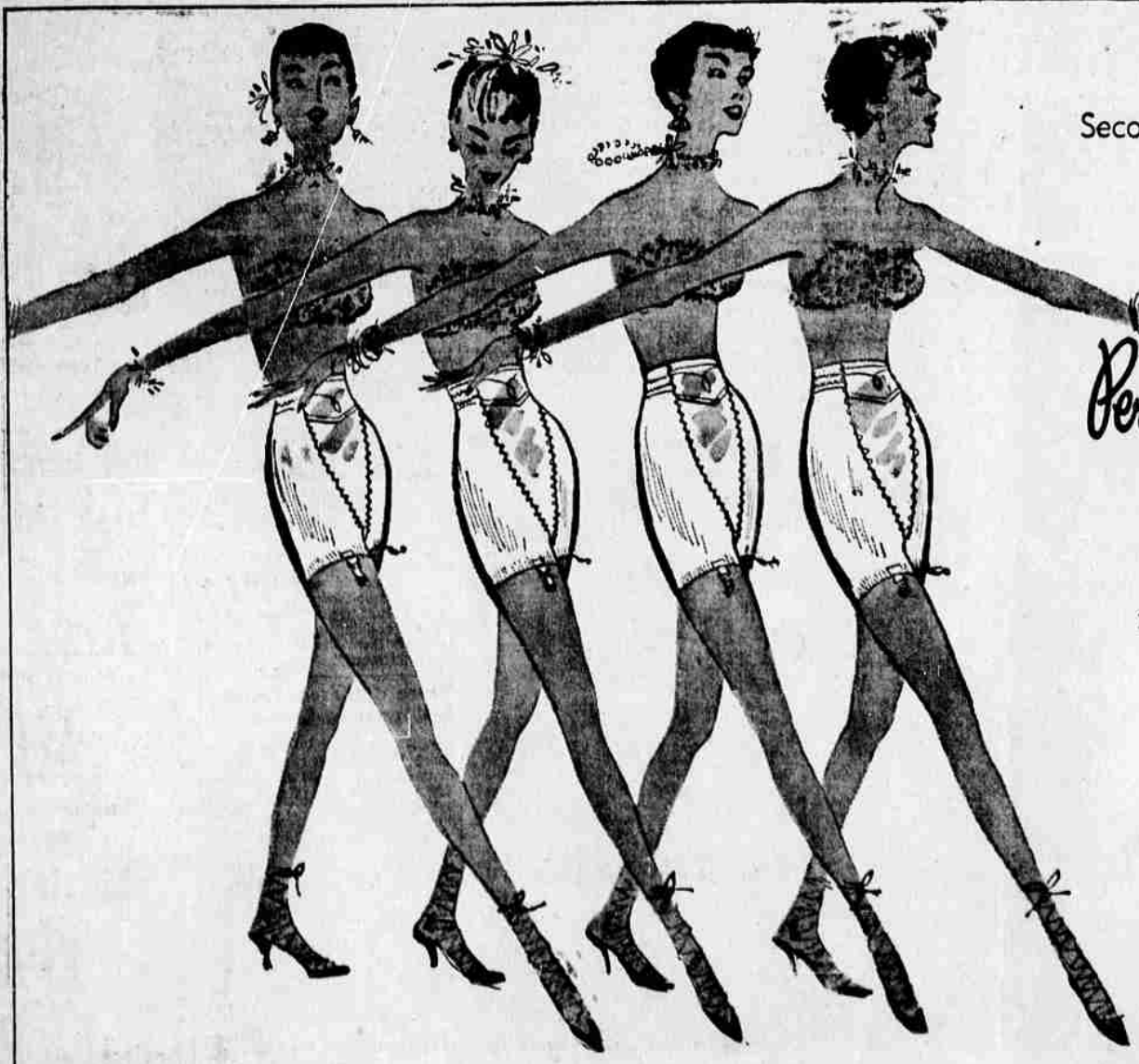
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
