Glendale Board Studies Budget, Consolidation

The Glendale School Board met Monday evening at the school to discuss the possible consolidation election and to make plans for the school budget.

According to Superintendent James Pate, plans for the new high school building will be completed about the end of the 1st week in February. Contractors will then have 30 days to figure their bids. Mr. Pate spent Thursday and Friday of last week in Eugene where he conferred with the architect, Clair V. Hamlin, on details of the plan.

Engineers made percolation tests Tuesday, on the Glendale High School site so as to make plans for the sewage system. Two-foot holes were dug and filled with water. In all cases, the water disappeared within 45 minutes. To allow for plenty of margin, plans will be worked out on the basis of one hour percolation of the water.

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Reclaimed Lands May Be Opened This Summer

WASHINGTON — Reclamation bureau officials estimated Thursday that some of the land set aside for homesteading in the Tule Lake-Klamath Straits area of California and Oregon will be opened to entry in the summer or fall of this year.

Early this month retiring Secretary of Interior Oscar Chapman ordered 6,700 acres of the 59,000-acre tract opened for homesteading as soon as possible. The remainder is a wildlife refuge.

Reclamation bureau officials said construction of laterals and additional flood protection works must be completed before the homesteaded lands can be sold for farms.

It is not yet determined how many farm units will be carved out of the area, 2,500 acres of which lies in California near Tule Lake and the remainder in Oregon north of the California-Oregon boundary.

Present indications are that the lands will be offered to applicants in two or more sections over the next year or two, as they are prepared for entry.

When the lands are available for settlement, public notices will be issued. Persons desiring to receive the public notices are being invited to address their request to the Bureau of Reclamation district office at Klamath Falls.

Applicants for the limited number of farm tracts opened for settlement by the Reclamation Bureau have been so numerous in recent years that drawings have been held to determine the order in which applications are examined.

Veterans who meet other homesteading qualifications are given preference in the purchase of farms.

Top Military Aides Assembled By Eisenhower

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower assembled his top military, foreign affairs and intelligence officers today for a full-day review of the foreign situation and a discussion of cold war strategy.

He has expanded the conference with the National Security Council, bringing the heads of several agencies to the White House.

Along with the regular council members, Eisenhower called in Gen. Omar Bradley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, retiring chief of the Central Intelligence Agency; and Allen Dulles, designated to succeed Smith as CIA boss.

Vice President Nixon, Secretary of State Dulles, Secretary of Defense Wilson and Mutual Security Director Harold Stassen will attend the conference as members of the council. The President is chairman.

Dulles and Stassen leave tomorrow for a 10-day tour of Western Europe. Their itinerary calls for meetings in Italy, France, England, Western Germany, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg.

Atomic Power Plant Could Service 100,000

SAN FRANCISCO — An atomic power plant could supply electricity for a city of 100,000 if Congress approved the plant, Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) told 4,000 delegates of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association Wednesday.

He predicted such plants, supplying electricity to homes and factories, would be established within two or three years.

Jackson Disappointed In Milk Law Changes

SALEM — The State Board of Agriculture wants only slight changes in the milk control law, and Rep. V. T. Jackson, Roseburg, chairman of the House Food and Dairy Committee, is disappointed.

After the board made its wishes known at a Tuesday meeting of the board and the Legislative Agriculture and Food and Dairy Committee, Jackson said:

"I hoped awfully that something would come from the dairy industry to change the law. I'm pretty much disappointed."

Jackson opposes milk control. The people voted last November to retain it.

Top Generals Confer For Strategy Talks

TOKYO — Three of America's top generals met in Tokyo today for strategy talks on the Korean War.

Within an hour Gen. J. Lawton Collins, U. S. Army chief of staff; and Lt. Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, commander-in-chief of the Eighth Army, flew in from opposite directions for conferences with Gen. Mark Clark, the U. S. Far East commander.

The meeting came amid continuing speculation that the war soon will take a new turn—either in a full-scale Allied offensive or in greater direct pressure against the Chinese Communist mainland.

Morse To Run As Independent; Predicts Win

WASHINGTON — Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon said Wednesday night he expected to be nominated as an independent in 1957 and "re-elected by the people of my state."

But he said there was "no doubt" that Republicans would "gang up on him."

Morse spoke on the ABC radio program "Crossfire." He said he was removed from the Senate Armed Services Committee because the "Republican Party is accommodating the Pentagon."

"The Pentagon-Eisenhower crowd does not want me on that committee because I know too much about Pentagon inefficiency," the Oregon senator said. He did not go into detail, but said he would speak on the subject later in the Senate.

Morse said he would welcome Interior Secretary McKay as an opponent for senator in 1957 after being told there are reports that the former Oregon governor would be the Republican candidate.

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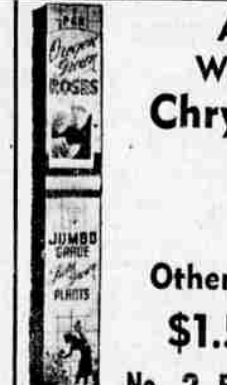
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
